WILSON AIDS IN NEW HEART SERIES - KCLC-FM is one of 20 radio stations in the metro area airing a six-month-long series produced by the St. Louis Heart Association (SLHA). The series of 60-second segments of heart health education feature the voice of Robert R. Lynn, a well-known media personality and announcer. The series, which airs at 7:33 a.m. on KCLC Monday-Friday, is offered through the 20 stations' public affairs and commercial programming, according to Jim Wilson, KCLC general manager who created the series with the help of SLHA committee members.

Wilson has recorded a number of interviews with health professionals and residents for materials used in the series. The messages serve as reminders to fight becoming victimized by cardiovascular disease. Called "Heartbeat," the series covers such preventive measures as weight control, regular exercise, not smoking and having blood pressure checked. It also tells of the importance of being able to save a life by knowing basic life-support techniques, such as cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR), Wilson said.

<u>BLACK REPERTORY COMPANY TO PERFORM</u> - The St. Louis Black Repertory Company will bring the realism of writer Phillip Hayes-Dean to campus March 3 with its production of "Sty of the Blind Pig." To be performed at 3 p.m. in Jelkyl Theatre, the presentation is part of this year's Visiting Artists Series, sponsored Lectures & Concerts Committee and funded in part by a grant from the Missouri Arts Council. Tickets are \$5 each and available at the Box Office, 946-2004, from noon to 5 p.m. daily.

The "Sty of the Blind Pig" centers on the activities of the Warren clan, a poor Black family struggling to survive on the south side of Chicago in the mid-1950s. The drama, directed by Ron Himes, is part of Lindenwood's month-long celebration of Black cultural history highlighted during this

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month's observance of "Black History Month." Founded in 1976 and incorporated as a nonprofit theatre organization the following year, the St. Louis Black Repertory Company presents a variety of experimental one-act plays, touring programs and childrens' theatre productions throughout the metro St. Louis area.
