MUNICIPAL ANNEXATION DISCUSSION - "The Experience of Maryland Heights is the topic of a discussion on incorporation and annexation tomorrow at 7 p.m. in Sibley Chapel. Speakers include Judith H. Barnett, one of the organizers of the campaign to create a new city in St. Louis County, and Edwin Dirck, Jr., chairman of the interim committee appointed last year to construct the institutions of government for the proposed new city of Maryland Heights. A businessman, he is the son of Missouri Sen. Edwin L. Dirck (D-24). A member of St. Louis Women in Leadership, Barnett also is a member of the committee.

Discussion will center on the origin of the idea to create a new city, financial problems in municipal creation, the importance of the recent Missouri Supreme Court decision regarding local government annexation and the effect of Maryland Heights in annexations in St. Louis County. There will be a question-and-answer period following the talk. The event is free to all community residents as well as Lindenwood students, faculty and staff.

AFA ART DISCUSSION, DINNER SET - Richard Gasperi, director of the Gasperi Folk Art Gallery in New Orleans, LA, will present an informal talk on the "Southern Folk Images" exhibition currently on display in the Hendren Gallery of the FAB, March 25 beginning at 7 p.m. in the gallery. A number of art works in the exhibit are on loan from the Gasperi Gallery. BECOME A DONOR - During National Organ & Tissue Awareness Week, April 21-27, the St. Louis Regional Transplant Association (RTA) urges you to consider becoming an organ donor. Anyone 18 years of age or older can sign a Uniform Donor Card similar to those found on drivers' licenses. In St. Louis, such organs as kidneys, livers, hearts, pancrea, cornea, bone or skin are needed. VOTE "YES" ON PROPOSITION 1 - President James I. Spainhower and Jane Crider, a member of the Lindenwood College Board of Trustees, are cochairpersons of the Friends of Family & Youth Counseling, a group that urges passage of Proposition 1 on the April 2 ballot.

Passage would establish a community mental health fund to maintain and expand treatment, intervention, rehabilitation, counseling, education and preventive services in St. Charles County. The fund would generate about \$920,000 per year from an eight-cent tax on each \$100 of assessed valuation (for an average \$60,000 home in the county, the yearly tax increase would be about \$9). Funding would be earmarked for professional treatment for such family problems as stress, alcoholism, child abuse, domestic violence and drug abuse.

FLAMENCO GUITARIST TO APPEAR - Ronald Radford, one of the few American masters of the Flamenco guitar, will appear in concert March 31 in Sibley Chapel. Sponsored by the college's Lectures & Concerts Committee, the concert is funded in part by a grant from the Missouri Arts Council. Tickets, priced at \$5 each, are available at the Box Office in Roemer Hall, 946-2004.

Called "a miracle of natural art," Flamenco is the traditional folk art of southern Spain where singing, dancing and guitar playing are a way of life. Radford is the only individual ever to be awarded a Fulbright Scholarship in Flamenco. He has been received enthusiastically at concerts throughout the country, and his performances have evoked standing ovations on four continents. Besides his concert engagements, Radford conducts numerous master classes and residencies throughout the country.

At the March 31 event, he will develop variations on themes as well as spontaneous improvisations within the strict traditional patterns of Flamenco songs and dances. He also will combine classical guitar techniques with intricate Flamenco rolls, finger percussion and syncopated strumming.

His appearance at Lindenwood completes this semester's Visiting Artists Series by the Lectures & Concerts Committee.

Prell, Ph.D., chairman of business administration and director of the Babcock Center for the Study of Modern Business, participated in discussion sessions at the American Marketing Association's fifth annual Academy for Health Services Marketing Symposium, held recently at the Las Vegas Hilton Hotel.

The conference is Saturday from 8:30 a.m.-noon in Young Hall. Students as well as faculty and staff are invited to attend.

Taking the place of the LCIE's popular Colloquium series, the conference will attract educators from high schools, colleges and universities throughout the metro area who will hear AMS practicing managers tell what they are looking for in educational backgrounds and curriculum course offerings and contents. Traditionally, St. Louis University is the host for the AMS meet.

CHAMBER SINGERS CONCERT MARCH 30 - Music featuring selections by Rossini, Brent Pierce, Stephen Foster and Duke Ellington are among works to be presented by the Lindenwood Chamber Singers in their annual spring concert, March 30 at 4 p.m. in Sibley Hall Chapel. The performance will present both sacred and more popular works, including Ellington's famous "Mood Indigo."

The 23-chorus group, under the direction of Nancy P. Fleming, director of choral music, features both graduate and undergraduate students from a variety of studies at Lindenwood. IT'S "ON THE ROAD AGAIN" FOR CHAMBER SINGERS - The college's Chamber Singers are scheduled for an in-state tour tomorrow through Saturday that will take the group to high schools and junior colleges in Jefferson City, Mexico and Sedalia, MO. Under the direction of Nancy P. Fleming, assistant professor and choral music director, the four-day trip will enable the group to inform students about the college's Performing Arts Dept. and the various opportunities available for those who want to study music at Lindenwood.

"The trip also will give the Chamber Singers an opportunity to perform their current repertoire several times," she said. The music covers a wide variety of styles ranging from 16th century madrigals and motets to music by Stephen Foster and Duke Ellington.

Students, faculty and staff as well as local residents can hear the group perform March 30 when the Chamber Singers presents their annual Spring Concert, beginning at 4 p.m. in Sibley Hall Chapel. The free concert along with this week's road trip are the principal performances this semester for the 23-member Chamber Singers.
