Capacity enrollment this fall leaves no space on campus to house alumnae. Rooms may be reserved through the alumnae office at the St. Charles Hotel, the Monarch Motel, and a limited number in a nearby private home. Hotel prices range from \$3.50 to \$6 (air conditioned) for singles and \$5 to \$8 (air conditioned, twin beds) for two. Motel prices are \$7 for rooms with a double bed, \$8 for twin bed rooms, and \$9 for rooms with two full beds. Private home prices are \$5.50 for two (double bed) and \$3 single. Please specify first and second choices in making room reservations.

Alumnae Gifts Total \$3,262; More Contributions Sought

Lindenwood alumnae had responded to the alumnae association officers' appeal of last April 20 for payment of dues and gifts to the college with a total of \$3,262 by Sept. 5, when this bulletin went to press, Donalee Wehrle Hood, association president, announced. The total breaks down as follows: Chapel gifts, \$1,587; Scholarship fund donations, \$135; unrestricted gifts to the college, \$945, and dues in the alumnae association, \$595.

A Record of Devotion

Many alumnae show their loyalty to Lindenwood in many ways, but we wish to record the special devotion of Elizabeth Walton Pickett (1923-24), whose death on June 17 is recorded in the In Memoriam column of this bulletin. On the first of each month for 22 months before her death, she had sent to the college a payment on her pledge to the Lindenwood chapel fund. The last payment came on June 4, just 13 days before she died during a vacation trip in Nevada.

In a letter informing the college of her death, her husband, W. D. Pickett of Richland, Wash., said of Elizabeth: "She was unable to finish her schooling there; but always kept fresh in her memories the wonderful time she had there. I am sure had we a daughter, she would have been a Lindenwood girl."

Elizabeth Walton Pickett not only had her memories. She established her own memorial in the bricks of the new Lindenwood chapel.

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Lindenwood Opens 130th Year

*493 Students from 29 States, 10 Other Countries;
Ayres Hall Reopened; Three Men Enrolled*

Lindenwood opened its 130th year this fall with a capacity enrollment of 450 boarding students and 43 day students. Thus, so far as Lindenwood is concerned, the anticipated college "bulge" has arrived. Last year college opened with 363 students, as compared with this year's total of 493. Students come from 29 states and 10 other countries. They arrived on Sept. 9 for a week of orientation and registration. Classes started on Sept. 17.

The day student total includes three men who have been admitted as juniors on special dramatics scholarships. They will act in plays, thus easing the ever-present problem which Director Robert Douglas Hume faces of providing male actors in a women's college, and they will assist with stage craft. Two of them are from Texas, and one from Kansas.

All six dormitories are filled with students this fall. Ayres Hall, which has stood empty for the past three years except for housing visiting alumnae and weekend out-of-town dates, has been remodeled, redecorated, and refurnished completely. Ayres parlors are done in contemporary decor and furniture, in beige, brown, and black chiefly, with some high color accents. A new recreation-television room and adjoining kitchen are provided for informal living. Bedrooms are painted in pastel shades and have grey maple furniture. Some old timers claim that Ayres now is the handsomest dormitory on campus, but loyal residents of other halls challenge that opinion. The truth is that the redecorating and refurnishing program of the last three or four years has resulted in six beautiful residence halls

on campus.

Sibley Hall bedrooms were redecorated and refurnished this summer and its bathrooms were remodeled. Ayres dining room got new paint and draperies and — most important of all — an acoustical tile ceiling.

Orientation week was crammed full of activity — from aptitude and placement testing to dormitory parties and the first campus mixer, with men as guests, of the year. President F. L. McCluer addressed all new students one evening; Dean Paulena Nickell spoke at a freshman convocation another; students held group meetings with faculty counselors, and they were introduced to the entire administration and faculty at an informal reception. In dormitory conclaves, campus officers explained the Student Government, Student Christian Association, Honor Board, and the Social Council. A special feature was a trip by bus one evening to the Mid-America Jubilee in St. Louis, which is being held on the riverfront during the month of September.

The week long program ended on Sunday, Sept. 16, with a church service in Roemer Auditorium, sponsored by the Student Christian Association, at which Dr. McCluer spoke; afternoon sessions in which students met with St. Charles ministers, and a picnic supper and college sing in the evening.

Cynthia Coatsworth, senior of Mexico, Mo., is chairman of freshman counseling, and the counseling and orientation week program is under the direction of Miss Mary Lichter, director of guidance and placement.

Five Join College Faculty; Betz Ver Kruzen Among Departed

Five new faculty members and three new head residents have joined the staff of Lindenwood this fall. The faculty members are the Reverend Dr. Robert L. McLeod, Jr., who came to Lindenwood from the pastorate of First Presbyterian Church in Fort Lauderdale, Fla., to be dean of the chapel and professor of religion; Walter M. Beattie, Jr., of Madison, Wis., professor and chairman of the department of sociology; Miss Betty Barbee of Louisville, Ky., assistant professor of physical education; Miss Dorothy Schneider, St. Louis, instructor in English, and Miss Judith Glover, Park Ridge, Ill., instructor in art.

Lindenwood has lost five members of its faculty. Dr. Siegmund A. E. Betz, professor of English and classics who had been at the college since 1935, resigned to become professor of English and classics at Our Lady of Cincinnati College in his home town of Cincinnati. Miss Marguerite L. Ver Kruzen, assistant professor of physical education and director of sports, who came to Lindenwood in 1943, left for a position at Chatham College in Pittsburgh.

The departure of the Reverend Dr. Theodore A. Gill, former dean of the chapel, last February to become managing editor of the Christian Century magazine was announced previously in the bulletin. Dr. Marian Froelich of the sociology department has joined her husband, who is in military service, and Betsy Severson of the art department was married in July to J. Knox Nimock of Clayton, Mo.

Previous bulletins have carried information about Dr. McLeod and Mr. Beattie. Miss Barbee, who holds the B. S. degree from Indiana University and the M. S. degree from the University of Wisconsin, formerly taught at Modesto, Calif. She is assistant program director of Chickagami Camp, Winter, Wis.

Miss Schneider received the B. S. and M. A. degrees from Washington University in St. Louis. She has taught in St. Louis and St. Louis County public schools and has served with the American Red Cross, in 1945-48 in Germany and the Pacific area, and in 1954-56 in North Africa and France. Miss Glover was graduated from Lindenwood last June. This summer she studied at the Chicago Art Institute. She was awarded a Lindenwood graduate fellowship which will be available later for advanced study.

Three new head residents are on the staff this fall. Mrs. Leonard Steger, whose late husband was superintendent of schools in Webster Groves, is in Niccolls as successor to Mrs. J. V. Gaddy of St. Joseph, Mo., who resigned. Mrs. Elizabeth Foreman of Evansville, Ind., is in charge of the newly opened Ayres Hall. Mrs. Nell Martin of Paducah, Ky., succeeded Mrs. Evalyn Crosby, who resigned to be married, in Cobbs Hall.
