

STUDENT RECEIVES ACCOMPLISHMENT AWARD - Connie R. Scrivner, a sophomore majoring in communications, is the first recipient of the Sophie Wagner Urman Award for Individual Accomplishment, a \$250 annual scholarship presented to an outstanding coed at Lindenwood. The award is named in memory of Mrs. Urman who died in 1983 at the age of 93. It was established by her granddaughters, Rose Lyn Zanville, a 1966 alumna, and Dr. Holly K. Zanville, a 1968 alumna, both of Dallas, TX.
