15 Students Receive President's Scholarships

FIFTEEN students—five each from the freshman, sophomore, and junior classes—were awarded President's scholarships for next year at a recent student assembly.

Dr. F. L. McCluer, president, presented the scholarships to the five freshmen who headed their class scholastically during the fall semester, and to the five sophomores and five juniors who led their classes during the past two semesters.

Scholarships to freshmen are valued at \$200, to sophomores at \$250, and to juniors at \$300.

Freshman winners are Heather Armour, Brentwood, Mo.; Jacqueline Burton, Fort Worth, Tex.; Barbara Erdmann, Omaha, Neb.; Patricia Long, Nashville, Tenn., and Ann Stewart, Fort Smith, Ark.

Sophomores are Chloe Burton, Fort Worth; Jane Graham, Memphis, Tenn.; Carol Ratjen, Park Forest, Ill.; Constance Richards, West Plains, Mo., and Ann Sawyer, Caruthersville, Mo.

Jean Gray, who made straight A as a Washington Semester student last fall, was omitted from the list of students with A records in the February Bulletin.

Cobbs Hall won the Scholarship Cup, with a two-semester grade point average of 2.96, breaking Sibley's three-year record as top dormitory scholastically. After three years of ownership, Sibley was eligible to keep the cup permanently, and a new one was given to Cobbs.

Rating second this year, with a 2.83 average, was Butler Hall, and the Day students placed third with 2.82.

President McCluer awarded the cup at the noon assembly, and the exultant Cobbsites staged an impromptu victory parade in Ayres dining room at lunch and had a party in the dormitory that night.

As a friendly gesture, Butler Hall students sent over a box of Tootsie Rolls and a rhymed note about the cup:

The Lindenwood faculty and administration in February established a new senior honorary society known as the Linden Scroll, and 11 seniors were "tapped" as charter members at a convocation in Roemer Auditorium on March 10.

Membership is based on service to the college community, good scholarship (cumulative 2.75 grade-point average), and leadership. Each year's membership will consist of from six to 12 students who have completed five-eighths of their college work.

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Dr. Scherer Elected President of Board

THE Rev. Dr. Harry T. Scherer, pastor of the Webster Groves Presbyterian Church, Webster Groves, Mo., was elected president of the board of directors of Lindenwood at a meeting of the board on Thursday, Feb. 24. Dr. Scherer succeeds the Rev. Dr. James W. Clarke, who resigned when he left the pastorate of Second Presbyterian Church in St. Louis on Jan. 1 to join the faculty of the Princeton Theological Seminary.

Dr. Scherer has been a member of the Lindenwood board since 1943. He also has served as synodical chairman in Missouri for the college's campaign for funds for a new chapel.

A native of Illinois, Dr. Scherer is a graduate of Millikin University, Decatur, Ill., and the McCormick Theological Seminary in Chicago. Millikin also awarded him the degree of Doctor of Sacred Theology.

His first church was in Hamilton, Ill., and next he was assistant pastor of Second Presbyterian Church in Chicago. During World War I he was a first lieutenant and chaplain. After the war he was pastor for nine years of the First Presbyterian Church in Niles, Mich., and for nine at First Presbyterian Church in Hutchinson, Kan., from which church he came to Webster Groves in 1937.

Understanding of Others, Mark Of Great Person, Says Dr. Wright

Eloquence, wisdom, and zeal do not make the great person, but rather the ability to appreciate and serve others, the Rev. Dr. Paul S. Wright of Portland, Ore., told Lindenwood students in the last of seven talks during Religious Emphasis Week in February.

"We erect false standards of greatness," he said. "Patience and kindness, understanding and appreciative treatment of other persons are the characteristics of the great person. They are the marks of the mature person."

"Let us measure life and its success," he continued, "not in accord to what we have received and appropriated from it for ourselves, but rather in the degree that we have in us the spirit of Christianity and according to the measure of our service in that spirit and in His Name."

Theme for the week's talks was "A Time for Greatness." Life today, in a "unique period of history," is a challenge, Dr. Wright said, and only consecrated souls can achieve a victory.

Reason, he said, tempered by good judgment, should be used as a tool to achieve the great life. Persons should use their minds for truth, not to establish a prejudice. They should form opinions thoughtfully. It is not true, he said, that everybody is entitled to his own opinion. "No one has a right to an opinion heedlessly formed," he asserted.

Art Popular with Lindenwood Students

*Emphasis on Painting, Graphic Arts, Art Education, and History of Art;
Many Majors Do Graduate Study, Have Careers*

THE art department at Lindenwood is a popular and busy place. Although art is not required, about a third of the student body is enrolled in one or more art courses, and this year there are more majors in art than in any other department on the campus.

Majors may specialize in creative art—painting, drawing, sculpture, printmaking—or in art history, or they may combine creative art and history. The department offers emphasis in painting, commercial and graphic arts, art education, and history of art. Art majors meet all academic requirements for a Bachelor of Arts degree. The art faculty believes in a general education for all young women.

Courses most popular with non-majors are those in crafts (wood, metal, textiles), basic art (understanding art in its various forms), and history and appreciation of art. Students in home economics, education, and physical education in particular take these courses.

The department's faculty is composed of two artists

—Miss Mildred Fischer, chairman, and Mr. Arthur L. Kanak—and an art historian—Mr. Harry D. Hendren.

Miss Fischer and Mr. Kanak, who have exhibited in countless shows all over the country, had a two-man show in St. Louis in February. Writing about their exhibit, Mr. Howard Derrickson, art critic of the St. Louis Post-Dispatch, said, "The show, most important of seven that opened here over the weekend, is marked by quality throughout and reflects rare versatility in a small college art department. Together the artists have earned 22 awards all over the country, 14 of them going to Miss Fischer, who has been exhibiting the longer and has won international awards in textile design."

Students in both creative art and history of art go to St. Louis for outstanding exhibitions and lectures at the St. Louis Art Museum and other galleries. Lindenwood students also have exhibited at shows in the city and in Springfield, Mo., from time to time, and they have taught Saturday classes for children in St. Louis.

The department has an exceptionally good slide

collection for use in teaching art history courses, and the collection was enhanced considerably this year by colored slides from pictures which Mr. Hendren took in Europe last summer. Many of the pictures are of art masterpieces in museum collections on the continent.

Although Miss Fischer's primary work is in painting—oil, gouache, especially—she also has made a reputation in the design and weaving of textiles. A graduate of Mount Holyoke College, Miss Fischer studied art for one year in Vienna and for a year in the Scandinavian countries. She has made eight trips to Europe for study and travel. She also has studied at the Boston School of Interior Decoration, Harvard University, the Chicago Art Institute, and Cranbrook School.

Painting also is Mr. Kanak's first interest, although he has done considerable print work. He holds the A. B. and M. F. A. degrees from the University of Iowa, where he also has done further graduate work in painting, drawing, and prints. He has served two stints with the United States Marine Corps, during World War II and after, rising from private to first lieutenant.

Mr. Hendren holds the B. S. degree from Murray (Ky.) State College and the M. A. in history of art from Ohio State University. As a graduate student he did special study in 19th century architecture. He served for four years during the war as a lieutenant, jg., in the U. S. Navy. At Lindenwood he is faculty sponsor of Kappa Pi, and each year he gives several lectures on art history to students in the large freshman course in History of Civilization.
