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TIGERS TO HIGHLIGHT APRIL 20 'CELEBRATION' - The Mizzou Football Tigers will hold their annual spring srimmage at the Lindenwood Stadium Saturday to kick off the college's "Celebration of New Beginnings." The event will honor Woody Woodenhaufer, who is beginning his first season as head coach of the Tigers, and President James I. Spainhower. With practice beginning a noon, the scrimmage will start at 1:30 p.m. Admission is free to all community residents as well as faculty, staff and students.

Following the scrimmage, a reception for Woodenhaufer will be in the stadium, followed by a banquet at 6:30 p.m. at Noah's Ark Motor Inn. The reception and banquet are being sponsored by the St. Charles Lindenwood Board of Associates and will be for ticket holders only. The board is comprised of 50 civic and business leaders who personally and financially support Lindenwood.

Woodenhaufer is former head coach of the USFL's Oklahoma Outlaws and assistant coach of the AFC's Pittsburgh Steelers.

According to Ed Watkins, vice-president for institutional development, the event will enable the community to meet and greet Woodenhaufer as well as Spainhower. "Woodenhaufer is the new coach of the Tigers, and this is the college's way of showing support for the new beginning of the Tigers. At the same time, Spainhower is relatively new to Lindenwood, but his accomplishments during the past two years have returned the college to its prominent place among leading educational institutions in the United States. This will provide a chance for the community to acquaint itself with the president and show its support," he said.

Tickets for the stadium reception and banquet, which will feature Dan Dierdorf as master of ceremonies, can be obtained by contributing \$150 or more to the college's St. Charles County Fund Drive. Tickets for faculty and staff are priced at a reduced rate of \$25 each. All proceeds from the event will go for scholarship awards to students from the county. ANOTHER RECORD YEAR FOR ALUMNI GIVING? - Initial results from the first phase of the Alumni Phone-a-Thon indicate the college could be on its way to setting another record year for alumni giving. The recent four-week campaign generated nearly \$70,000 in cash and contributions, a drastic increase from the \$28,000 raised during a similar 1984 event. Last year, the phone-a-thon raised about \$100,000. Based upon initial results from this year's first phase, the college expects to raise \$60-70,000 from the second phase, April 23-May 30, which would surpass last year's record.

Nearly 150 volunteers spent an estimated 1,000 man-hours telephoning more than 2,600 alumni during the first phase. Another 2,500 will be contacted during the second phase.

STIFF COMPETITON FOR PHONE-A-THON PRIZE - Darlene Jemison, assistant manager of the Bookstore, is in first place for the grand prize of a weekend for two at the Lodge of the Four Seasons that will be presented to the top volunteer in the Alumni Phone-a-Thon that secures the most in cash and contributions. These figures are for the first phase of the phone-a-thon; they will be combined for the second phase, April 23-May 30, to produce the top volunteer. The grand prize was secured by Peter N. Brown, a menmber of the Board of Overseers and president of Four Seasons Lakesites in Lake Ozark, MO.
