'THE PRESIDENT'S PREFACE' - To all faculty, administration and staff, the following is the program of events in connection with commencement:


Wednesday, May 15, 3-4:30 p.m., commencement rehearsal on the front steps of Roemer Hall.

Friday, May 17, 7:30 p.m., Baccalaureate, Lindenwood College Chapel, St. Charles Presbyterian Church, Gamble and Sibley streets, featuring the Rev. William Shoop, minister of Webster Groves Christian Church. Immediately following baccalaureate, the Alumni Association will host a reception for seniors, their families and guests in the FAB. All faculty and staff members are invited to attend this reception.

Saturday, May 18, 10 a.m., Commencement on campus in front of Sibley Hall (in case of inclement weather, Lindenwood College Chapel). Rep. Richard A. Gephardt (D-MO) will be the commencement speaker. A reception in the campus quadrangle will follow commencement.

I also want to remind all employees that all college offices will be open from 8:30 a.m. until noon on the day of commencement. There will be no compensatory time granted, and the administration appreciates the time given for this special once-a-year event.

All employees are requested to park in Lot H across from the Stadium where they will be shuttled to the Roemer Hall Parking Lot. Parking in faculty and staff lots, particularly Roemer, is reserved for seniors, families and guests attending spring commencement.

REFERENCE LIBRARIAN POSITION - Notice is given of a vacancy for Reference Librarian at Lindenwood. The Reference Librarian's responsibilities include general reference service, bibliographic instruction, on-line database searching and management of government documents. The Reference Librarian

OFFICE OF RESEARCH & PLANNING CREATED - James W. Swift, assistant professor and faculty advisor in health administration in the LCIE, has been named director of the Office of Research & Planning. In the newly-created position, Swift will report to President Spainhower and be charged with coordinating all research and planning activities, both internal and external.

A former adjunct faculty member at Webster University, Swift joined the LCIE faculty last fall. He has served as an instructor at Oakland City College in California and as an assistant professor and research associate at Washington University. In addition to teaching positions, he has worked on strategic planning and feasibility studies for a number of organizations, including the Monsanto Fund, United Way of Greater St. Louis and the American Red Cross. He also has served in health consultant positions for several area firms, including Olin Corp. and Anheuser-Busch Co. A 1951 graduate of Pomona College in California, he has master's degrees from the University of Chicago and the University of Colorado and a doctorate from Washington University.

'THANKS' TO BLOOD DRIVE DONORS - The Rev. George Wilcox expresses a "thanks" to those who participated in the recent Red Cross Blood Drive as well as those faculty, staff and students who took part in the Voluntary Fast for World Hunger Relief last month.

The chaplain reports that 67 pints of blood were collected, 22 more than the 45-pint goal. More than 132 students signed up for the fast and, together with contributions from faculty and staff, \$360 was raised. The money will be divided equally for FISH, a local hunger relief agency, and OXFAM, an international famine relief organization, Wilcox said.

STUDENT DANCE CONCERT SET - To end a diverse season of concerts, plans and special event, the Performing Arts Dept. will present its annual student dance concert on May 9 and 11 at 8 p.m. in Jelkyl Theatre. Both are free of charge to the public as well as the Lindenwood community. Dance instructor Robbie Scoggins is directing the concert, which will include many dance styles and approaches, including jazz, modern, tap, black spiritual, humorous and an original Indonesian work. Choreographers for the concert are Scoggins, dance instructor Jane Conzelman-Horvath and students Carol Richi, Violet Horvath, Cindy Nigley, Karen Long and Brenda Eisenbeis.

NEW BOOKS AT BUTLER LIBRARY - Recent acquisitions of new titles at Butler Library that have been received from Government Documents include INTERNATIONAL NEGOTIATION and MULTINATIONAL PEACEKEEPING IN THE MIDDLE EAST from the U.S. State Dept., and SOCIAL SCIENCES AND SPACE EXPLORATION from the National Aeronautics & Space Administration.

COLLEGE ADVERTISING CAMPAIGN - Lindenwood is cosponsoring high school interviews now through June 1 with KWRE-AM Radio in Warrenton as part of an advertising campaign directed to traditional students. The 60-second spots, recorded at KCLC and featuring Barry Freese of the Admissions Office, are being aired at the close of newscasts throughout the day for "Senior Spotlight." The program highlights outstanding seniors at high schools - Ft. Zumwalt, St. Dominic, Silex, Elsberry, Francis Howell, Warrenton, Troy and Wentzville. Produced by the Public Relations and Admissions offices, the radio spots are part of this year's increased marketing campaign to build student enrollment, both nontraditional and traditional students.

FUNDING RAISED FOR VALUATION SCIENCES - Members of the St. Louis chapter of the American Society of Appraisers have contributed \$1,350 toward scholarship funding for valuation science students at Lindenwood. Several alumni of the LCIE program are members of the chapter, which advises the program. The fund-raising campaign was spearheaded by Ray Tenholder, a senior member and past president of the chapter. The donation was made during a recent chapter dinner on campus. Accepting for the college was Richard Rickert, Ph.D., director of the LCIE Valuation Sciences program.

Rickert reports that recruiting of students for the fall trimester is under way. Students with bachelor's degrees in any field are welcome to apply to the master's degree program, which will lead to internships and careers in valuation sciences. The program is working with Arthur Anderson, Inc., an international accounting firm, to supply graduates in appraisal. Several hundred jobs are available, Rickert said. THREE JOIN ADMISSIONS STAFF - Paul J. Boschert Jr. of St. Charles, Rebecca A. Stauffer of Ballwin and Susan Thomas of Indianapolis, IN, have been named admissions counselors. Two of the three fill vacancies on the admissions staff while the third replaces Marilyn A. Morris, former counselor, who recently was named assistant dean of College Life. (Morris, who has relocated to Niccolls Hall, has a new box number, #732, and a new telephone extension, #222.

A 1981 Lindenwood alumnus, Boschert taught speech and physical education and served as football, basketball and baseball coach at Duchesne High School prior to joining Lindenwood. A board member of the St. Charles Junior Baseball/Softball Association, he frequently appears on a weekly sports digest show produced by First Capitol Cablevision. Since 1981, he has served as a player and umpire for the St. Charles City & County Slow-Pitch Softball Association.

A 1982 graduate of Marietta College in Ohio, Stauffer has served in medical records and reception duties for the Physicians Multispecialty Group in Chestfield since 1983. Prior to that, she was a receptionist and medical records supervisor for Group Health Plan of Greater St. Louis. A former resident of Switzerland, she has traveled extensively in Austria, Canada, England, France, Germany, Greece, Italy, Spain and Turkey.

A 1981 graduate of Indiana University in Bloomington, IN, Thomas has served as personnel auditor at Pizza Hut of America in Indianapolis since 1984. She was a restaurant manager and area trainer for the firm prior to being named personnel auditor.

The three appointments replace vacancies created by Morris' promotion and the recent resignations of Counselors Ruth Bartlett and Teresa Roark.

STUDENTS BID ON SCHOLARSHIPS - Undergraduate students Mary Brandt of Granite City, IL, and Laura Muckerman of St. Louis are the high bidders for \$1,000 and \$1,500 scholarships, respectively, donated by the college to KETC-TV for the station's recent community auction.

Both are enrolled for the fall semester, and tuition will be reduced by the appropriate amount for each.

The college received widespread publicity from on-air promotions on Channel 9 during its auction. An estimated audience of 800,000 viewers saw the Lindenwood spots that were shown 12 times during the four-day auction.

For the second year, Lindenwood has shown its support for public television by being the only institution in the metro area donating scholarship awards for Channel 9's annual fund-raising auction. The college's participation in the April 25-28 auction was arranged through the PR Office in cooperation with the Scholarship Committee, chaired by Larry Sackman, director of financial aid. The KETC-TV donations are part of more than \$600,000 that will be awarded this fiscal year to deserving undergraduate and graduate students.
