Campus Upgrades Continue

While some students may have spent their summers working on their tans and staying in shape, Lindenwood also has been working on its appearance and condition.

The college made and is continuing to make a number of improvements to the campus. Some improvements are visible and some aren't.

One of the most noticeable improvements is the work on the stadium behind Parker hall. Crews worked over the summer on refurbishing the stands with new concrete steps and walkways. Also, the old turf was uprooted and crews are now working on putting the new turf on the playing field.

James Spainhower, president of the college, said they are also planning to repaint the entire stadium and the project should be finished by Sept 16.

The improvements made to the stadium are result of a \$600,000 gift to the college which Harlen C. Hunter made last spring.

Another project which is near completion is the pool, plus locker rooms and showers that are being refurbished in the basement of Butler.

The pool has been in Butler hall since its founding decades ago. However, it has not been in use for many years.

Spainhower also said a new roof has been put on Butler gymnasium and bathrooms in the gym are being renovated.

Some residents in Cobbs Hall went without hot water last semester and Spainhower said the workers have fixed the problem. He

added that the reason for the loss of hot water was due to calcified pipes. He said new pipes were installed to correct the

A sidewalk and steps have been constructed behind Parker hall leading to the parking lot. A sidewalk was also constructed between Parker and Niccolls.

Spainhower said work will begin on the old arena near the physical plant and stadium. The arena is located next to the old stables and will house storage items from Ayres hall and other buildings. After all items have been taken out of Ayres, then work can be done on the building. Spainhower said the college is trying to clean the arena and make sure it is under cover.

Alterations and waterproofing were done to two storage rooms in the lower level of Roemer hall. These rooms are used as storage of costumes for the performing arts department. The department will also be using the green metal shed behind Sibley as a workshop.

The college installed a new air conditioning compressor in McCluer hall and the elevator is also in the process of being fixed., Spainhower said.

New floor tiles were to be installed around the post office in Roemer and extensive tiling was done in Irwin hall as well.

These are among some of the improvements made to the college over the summer. Spainhower also said work has been done to all of the residence halls so that they will be ready when students move into their rooms.

New Equipment, Productions for Jelkyl Theatre Season

The Jelkyl theater, scheduled for four mainstage productions during 1988-89, is currently receiving a face lift, including a new lighting system, new sound system, carpeting and other improvements.

Kathi Jones, administrative assistant for the Performing Arts Department, said the reason for the improvements is to upgrade the facilities to professional standards.

"We hope to make Jelkyl the cultural arts center of St. Charles," Jones said.

The theater will host its first mainstage production of the season in October. The season begins with a musical by Walton Jones entitled "The 1940's Radio Hour." Kathi Jones said the musical provides a behind-the-scenes look at a 1940's radio production. She also said the musical provides a wide variety of entertainment including drama, comedy, romance and lots of music.

"It's a very swinging musical and it's lots of fun," Jones said.

The musical has eight to 10 male parts, two to four females and many band members. When auditioning for the production, actors will be required to perform a cold reading from the script, made available in the performing arts department office on the first floor of the Fine Arts Building (FAB).

Singers must prepare a ballad of their choice or sing "Over the Rainbow," which is also available in the office. Dancers do not need any preparation because the director will brief them at the audition.

Auditions will be held Sept. 1 from 3:30 to 5 p.m. and 7 to 10 p.m. in the downstage theater on the lower level of the FAB. Jones said auditions will be open to both the Lindenwood community and communities outside the college.

Jones said the department's first priority is to encourage Lindenwood students, faculty and staff to participate and attend the production. She added that people of all ages are needed for the musical. Performances will be held Oct. 6-8, and 13-15 at 8 p.m.

The second mainstage production will be the classic Charles Dickens' "A Chirstmas Carol." School performances will be held Nov. 21-23 and 28-30 at 10 a.m. Public performances will be held Nov. 30, Dec 1-3 at 8 p.m. and on Dec. 3-4 at 2 p.m.

Two more productions are scheduled for the spring semester. "The Little Foxes," by Lillian Hellman, will appear on stage Feb. 23-25 and March 2-4 at 8 p.m. "The Nerd," by Larry Shue, will be the last production of the season and is scheduled for April 13-15 and 20-22 at 8 p.m.

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Getting With KCLC Programs

There are many people on campus who claim that KCLC employees have too much fun. However, I believe that those who work for the station are dedicated and hard workers, except when we play limbo in the hall or when we make promos imitating Mr. Rogers and Darth Vadar.

KCLC is a non-commercial station, located at 89.1 on the FM dial. Like most non-commercial stations, KCLC has several formats: jazz, blues, alternative rock, bluegrass, and gospel.

Jazz is the main format, with almost 100 hours of it programmed each week. Many students take advantage of what KCLC has to offer, either by working at the station or by tuning in.

If you're a communications major at Lindenwood, working at KCLC is an opportunity you don't want to miss. KCLC offers hands-on experience that most other college radio stations don't allow their students. Of course, you do learn a lot from classes, but practical experience is necessary. What you read in textbooks you practice at KCLC.

"We have such a great opportunity to learn in a real situation," said KCLC Promotions Director Randall Siefert. "We get to make tough decisions, and experience the same joys and frustrations that occur in jobs later in life."

To say that working at KCLC is a real situation is almost an understatement. KCLC is located in one of the top 15 markets in the country. The signal reaches the entire St. Louis metropolitan area (population 2.2 million), and has tens of thousands of listeners.

Even if you're not a communications major, you can still work at KCLC. There are several people at the station who had no interest in radio when they started at Lindenwood, but eventually got bit by the radio bug.

In my opinion jazz is one of the most underrated musical styles in existence. It's simply spicy instrumental music, with instruments such as guitars, keyboards, drums, saxophones, trumpets, and more. You might want to start by using it as background music, while you're doing homework. Try Lindenwood's own Dave Powell with jazz in the mornings on KCLC!

Now if you're a rocker, try starting out with "Nightwave," our alternative rock show. It's on every Friday and Saturday night from 8 to midnight.

If you like country music, check out the bluegrass show from 6 to 9 every night from Monday through Thursday. It's an acoustic alternative to country, and guaranteed to keep your toes tapping.

For inspirational music, try KCLC's gospel programming on Saturday and Sunday mornings.

Sunday evenings from 8 to midnight features the blues. The blues has roots in jazz and influences in rock. It's a great way to finish any weekend.

You're probably thinking, "I don't like that stuff," but wait! I didn't like any of KCLC's music when I started working there either. In fact, I can't think of anyone I work with who did. In time however, it grows on you. Learning to appreciate new types of music is an important part of a college education, just like doing your laundry and going to Human Community class.

Parking 101: A Crash Course

Does the early bird really catch the worm? Well, at Lindenwood the early commuter certainly catches the parking space.


Locating a parking space on campus can sometimes be difficult for everyone including commuter students, residents, faculty and staff. Dwayne France, chief of campus security, said Lindenwood has more than 1000 students alone but only 400 parking spaces around the campus.

So the question arises, "Where can you or can't you park?"

Commuter students often choose to park along the college side of Watson Street, Gamble Street or in lots J and M. However commuters may also park in lots D, E, F, or G.

Commuters should be aware that parking along the residential sides of Watson Street, Houston, Lindenwood, Anderson and Gamble streets is prohibited and carries a \$25 fine from the city of St. Charles.

Residents of McCluer, Irwin, and Cobbs may park their vehicles on lots D, E, F. Parker residents may park in lot G. Parking is prohibited on all roads or on any street having a red curb. However, temporary parking is allowed in front of buildings for



loading and unloading only, as long as traffic is not obstructed.

Lots A, B, C, the row along Cobbs hall in lots E and F or in front of the Memorial Arts Building (MAB) are restricted to faculty and staff during weekdays from 6 a.m. to 5 p.m. After 5 p.m. and on weekends, any vehicle with a valid parking sticker may use the restricted lots.

All motor vehicles parked and operated on campus must be registered in the security office. Parking stickers are \$10 and may be paid for at the Business office in Roemer hall. Residents do not have to pay for a parking sticker but each vehicle must have a valid permit. Permits are valid from Sept. 1 through Aug 31 of each school year.

Those who choose to park on campus without a permit are subject to a \$3 fine. Other violations include, parking in restricted lots, handicap spaces, blocking other vehicles or occupying more than one space. Each violation is \$3.

Tickets must be paid within seven days at the business office and appeals must be made in writing to the chief of security.

If someone does not pay the fine within that time period, then they are subject to an additional penalty, having their grades or transcript withheld, or an automatic salary withdrawal.
