DIRECTOR'S NOTES

A Christmas Carol has become such a familiar part of an increasingly excessive Christmas season in America that its message is in peril.

When Dickens wrote A Christmas Carol in 1843, it was an urgent response to a society permanently altered by the industrial revolution. Faced with an England frighteningly overcome by poverty, adults and children alike overworked in factories, disease, illiteracy, and ignorance, Dickens was consumed by a need to reach those in a position to take action on behalf of those who could not do so for themselves.

Dickens felt strongly that society had an obligation to help those in need, and implored those with wealth and status to cease their judgment of the poor and assist them instead. By providing a main character who awakens to the possibility of leading a more compassionate life through directly confronting his own sources of pain and suffering, Dickens hoped that his readers would be inspired to see that they too could reawaken their own hearts.

When preparing to mount a theatrical production, two questions need to be asked regardless of any other reasons driving its inception: "why this play?" and "why this play right now?" For better or worse, we continue to face problems similar to the ones that drove Dickens to write A Christmas Carol in the first place. In order to bring its principle message to the foreground, updating and adjusting was necessary. We chose to do away with attempts at recreating London accents and the feel of a comfortable, stereotypical Dickensian Christmas with the intention of bringing its message closer to home. This effort also included re-introducing uncomfortable scenes and interactions from the novella that are often ornitted from theatrical productions.

We are all touched by adversity, illness, old age, and death; not one of us is exempt. Not one. Dickens asks us to see the ways in which our own pain has armored us against the pain and suffering of others, showing us the possibility of uniting through the experience of suffering, and the transformation that results. If, instead of turning away from our own suffering, we could embrace it and take care of it, we too could become the catalyst for healing countless others.
