TWO ELECTED TO BOARD OF DIRECTORS - Patricia P. Bailey, a member of the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) and a 1959 alumna, and the Rev. Robert R. Collins, minister of the First Presbyterian Church in Mexico, MO, have been elected to the Lindenwood College Board of Directors.

Bailey was nominated by former President Jimmy Carter in 1979 to fill an unexpired FTC term. From Lindenwood, she went to Tufts University where she received an M.A. degree in 1960, and to the American University Law School where she received a J.D. with honors in 1976. She began her government career in 1960 as an editor for the State Dept. She has worked for the Agency for International Development, on the presidential campaign staffs of Nelson A. Rockefeller and Gerald Ford in 1976 and for the Justice Dept. She joined the staff of the Merit Systems Protection Board in 1979 as executive legal assistant to the general counsel, where she remained until her FTC appointment.

The Rev. Collins, a former member of the college's Board of Overseers, is a graduate of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and holds a Divinity Degree from Union Theological Seminary in Richmond, VA. Minister of the First Presbyterian Church since 1958, he is a trustee of the Allen P. and Josephine B. Green Foundation in Mexico, MO. He has served as a moderator of the Synods of Missouri and the Missouri Union Presbytery, as a trustee of the Mountain Retreat Association and Montreat-Anderson College in Montreat, NC, and as a representative of the Presbyterian Church at the World Alliance of Reformed Churches in Nairobi, Kenya. He is the recipient of the Mexico Jaycees "Outstanding Citizen Award" in 1972 and the "Community Service Award," presented by the Mexico Kiwanis Club in 1982.

The appointments fill vacancies created by the recent resignations of Robert J. Baer of St. Louis, newly-elected chairman of the St. Louis Board of Police Commissioners, and Mrs. Dorothy Warner of Laconia, NH. During the recent board meeting, members adopted a resolution citing Warner for her 13 years of service to the college's board of directors.

ATTIC SALE' SET JUNE 8 - The second annual "Mrs. Sibley's Attic Sale," an arts and crafts, antique and flea market event, will be held from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday on campus. Sponsored by the St. Charles Lindenwood Alumni Club, the six-hour sale is a fund-raising project. Proceeds from the rental of booths will be earmarked for scholarship awards to deserving students attending Lindenwood.

The event is named in honor of Mary Easton Sibley, cofounder of the college. Last year, more than 50 vendors took part in the sale, which attracted several hundred persons to the campus. All items for sale will be displayed outdoors near the front gates off Kingshighway. Food and beverages will be available, and a performance by the St. Charles Municipal Band is slated from 1-2 p.m. Rain-out date for "Mrs. Sibley's Attic Sale" is June 15.

CHAIRMAN DELIVERS COMMENCEMENT SPEECH - Robert E. Peffers, Ph.D., professor of theatre and chairman of the Performing Arts Dept., was the speaker for the ninth commencement of the Visual & Performing Arts High School of St. Louis, held May 31 at Kiel Opera House in St. Louis.

SYMPOSIUM ON ARTS AND ANTIQUES - The LCIE and members of the American Society of Appraisers (ASA) will present a "Symposium on Arts and Antiques" June 8 at 9 a.m. in the FAB Auditorium. Open to the public, the day-long symposium is designed for art historians, collectors and dealers in arts, antiques and decorative arts.

Presenters will discuss Renaissance and Renaissance-Revival art, midwestern silver, 19th century genre and western paintings, antiquities and related arts. Lectures by LCIE faculty and ASA members will cover aspects of history, identification of pieces and styles, connoiseurship, appraisal and current markets.

PHYSICAL PLANT REORGANIZED - Jerry Rufkahr, vice-president of administration, has announced a reorganization of the college's Physical Plant. In a related announcement, Rufkahr said Wayne Daugherty, former director of the Physical Plant, has been named Special Projects Coordinator for the college. He will report directly to Rufkahr and be responsible for energy grants and related special projects. Daugherty's office is 200 Roemer and his extension is #282. The reorganization went into effect May 28.

CIRCLE K CLUB CITED - Lindenwood's Circle K Club has been cited by the Lindenwood Student Government as "Organization of the Year" for its numerous service to the college and community, such as sponsoring the recent Dance-a-Thon to raise funds for the USA in Africa Foundation and the community forum that featured U.S. Sen. John Danforth (R-MO). The 40-member club was formed last fall and is sponsored by the Kiwanis Club of St. Charles (Noon Day).

\$3,250 RAISED FROM DANCE-A-THON - The Circle K Club raised \$3,250 from its recent 20-hour Dance-a-Thon for the USA in Africa Foundation, the organization addressing the starvation problems in African countries. Nearly 150 people took part in the fund-raising project, which attracted sponsors for individuals as well as couples and groups.

According to Jim Thompson, advisor to the 40-member club, the college received nearly \$10,000 worth of free advertising from KWK Radio, which provided live broadcasts during the 20-hour event. Of the total amount raised, \$1,000 was contributed by the Kiwanis Club of St. Charles (Noon Day), the sponsoring organization for Lindenwood's Circle K Club.
