



## PLOT SYNOPSES

Lysander loves Hermia, and Hermia loves Lysander. Helena loves Demetrius; Demetrius used to love Helena but now loves Hermia. Egeus, Hermia's father, prefers Demetrius as a suitor, and enlists the aid of Theseus, the Duke of Athens, to enforce his wishes upon his daughter. According to Athenian law, Hermia is given four days to choose between Demetrius, life in a nunnery, or a death sentence. Hermia, ever defiant, chooses to escape with Lysander into the surrounding forest.

Meanwhile, in the forest, Oberon and Titania, King and Queen of Fairies, are locked in a dispute over a boy whom Titania has adopted. By way of revenge, Oberon instructs his servant Puck to bring him a magic elixir, which Oberon will sprinkle on the Queen's eyelids as she sleeps. When Titania awakes, the potion will cause her to fall in love with the first creature she sees and in this state, Oberon plans to convince her to give him the boy.

Meanwhile, in another part of the forest, Demetrius has chased after Lysander to retrieve Hermia, with Helena hot on his heels, pleading her love. Oberon, overhearing Demetrius' rejection of Helena, takes pity upon her and tells Puck to place the magic drops upon Demetrius' eyes as well, so that he will fall in love with Helena. Puck, however, mistakenly casts the spell on Lysander. When Helena stumbles over Lysander in the forest, the spell is cast: Lysander now loves Helena and renounces a stunned Hermia.

And in yet ANOTHER part of the forest, a group of craftsmen are rehearsing a play to be performed for Theseus and Hippolyta on their wedding day. Puck impishly casts a spell on Bottom, giving him the head of a donkey. The terrified screams of the other Mechanicals awake the sleeping Titania (you see where this is going, right?) and she falls instantly, hopelessly in love with the assheaded Bottom. Oberon enjoys this joke, but is less amused when it becomes apparent that Puck has botched the attempt to unite Demetrius and Helena. Oberon himself anoints Demetrius with the love potion and ensures that Helena is the first person he sees. Helena, however, feels that she is being mocked by both Demetrius and Lysander (who is still under the influence of the love potion).

Finally, Oberon decides that all good sports must come to an end. Puck puts the four lovers to sleep and gives Lysander the antidote for the love potion so that he will love Hermia again when they all wake up (but the spell is never taken off Demetrius...yeah, I know: creepy). Next, Oberon gives Titania the antidote, the two reconcile and Puck removes the spell from the sleeping Bottom. Theseus and Hippolyta arrive to discover the four lovers asleep in the forest and, over

the objections of Egeus, Theseus invites the two couples to join them back in Athens where all three couples will be married. Bottom returns to his friends, and they perform their play, "Pyramus and Thisbe." at the wedding feast. As everyone retires, the fairies bestow their blessings on the happy couples.

# GLENN MILLER ORCHESTRA



The legendary Glenn Miller was one of the most successful of all the dance band leaders back in the Swing era of the 1930s and '40s. A matchless string of hit records, the constant impact of radio broadcasts, and the drawing power at theaters, hotels, and dance pavilions built and sustained the moment of popularity. Glenn disbanded his musical organization in 1942 at the height of its popularity, volunteered for the Army and then organized and led the famous Glenn Miller Army Air Force Band. It went to Europe to entertain servicemen, and then, on December 15, 1944, Major Miller took off in a single-engine plane from England to precede his band to France, never to be seen again.

Due to the popular demand, the Miller estate authorized the formation of the present Glenn Miller Orchestra in 1956, and it has proven its staying power by still being popular today. Indeed, the Glenn Miller Orchestra today is still the most sought after big-band in the world, just as it was in Glenn's day.

Being known and recognized for his accomplishments and high standards, Gary Tole became the leader and director of the Glenn Miller Orchestra in January of 2011.
