PUBLIC RELATIONS OFFICE EXPANDS, RELOCATES

Patricia A. Burns of St. Louis has joined Lindenwood College as an assistant in the Public Relations Office. Graduating in May from St. Louis University, she holds a bachelor's degree in communications, majoring in journalism. At SLU she served as a writer and associate editor of THE UNIVERSITY NEWS where she received two first-place awards for news and editorial writing from the Missouri College Newspaper Association. Miss Burns also is the recipient of a first-place award in multi-media advertising from the Advertising Federation of St. Louis.

During college, she served in an internship program at KMOX-TV and was employed full-time as a secretary, sales representative and general manager of Omega Products, Inc., a St. Louis-based medical supply firm. She also has served as a bank teller at United Postal Savings Association and as a work-study student in SLU's Sociology Department.

JAY McSHANN JAZZ TRIO TO PERFORM SUNDAY

The Jay McShann Jazz Trio will perform in concert September 16 at Jelkyl Theatre beginning at 3 p.m. His performance will open this year's Visiting Artists Series, which will feature Bob Kramer's Marionnettes October 14, Charles Leader as Mark Twain October 23, the St. Louis Brass Quintet in February, 1985, and the St. Louis Black Repertory Co. and Flemenco guitarist Ronald Radford in March, 1985.

Free admission is available to full-time students, who must pick up tickets this week at the Box Office in Roemer Hall from noon to 4 p.m., Monday through Friday. Tickets for part-time students and others are \$5 each, if available. Season tickets, representing a

40% savings from individual tickets, are available for \$18 each at the Box Office. In the heyday of the jazz era, Jay 'Hootie' McShann led the swinging Kansas City big band that included Charlie Parker, Gus Johnson and Gene Ramey. Renowned as a boogie-woogie pianist and a master of the blues piano, McShann will play a repertoire at Lindenwood that includes the blues, Tin Pan Alley favorites and traditional jazz originals. His contributions in Kansas City combine with the New Orleans and Chicago jazz styles that have had great influence upon the growth of American jazz in the world of music.

His performance next Sunday is made possible by support from the Missouri Arts Council and the National Endowment for the Arts through their participation in the Mid-America Arts

Alliance, a regional arts organization based in St. Louis.

STUDENTS, FACULTY IN SMITHSONIAN PRODUCTION

Lindenwood was represented when "The Buck Stops Here," a musical drama based on the life of Harry S Truman, ended a five-performance run September 9 at the Smithsonian Institute Theatre in Washington, DC. Based on the life of the former president from Missouri, the play is conceived from the book by Norman J. Fedder with music and lyrics by Richard A. Lippmann. First produced in New York City, the play was staged in the nation's capital by the National Truman Centennial Commission for America's 100th anniversary celebration of Truman's birth.

The play featured set design by Mel Dickerson and costumes by Niki Juncker, assistant professors of theatre, and lighting design by Keith Polette, adjunct instructor of speech and theatre. Lindenwood students involved in the production were Ed DeLeal, a 1984 alumnus; Michele Spears and Lisa Olliges, juniors majoring in performing arts; Tom Meurer, a senior performing arts major; and David Hoover, a graduate student at Lindenwood. All recently were involved in a one-week production of "The Buck Stops Here" which was performed at the Lyceum Theatre in Arrow Rock, MO.

HOFFMEISTER TO HEAD CAMPUS SCHOOL

Kay J. Hoffmeister, former head teacher and assistant director of the Campus Laboratory School, has been named director of the school. A 1967 graduate of the University of Missouri-Columbia, Mrs. Hoffmeister has a bachelor's degree in elementary education with an emphasis on preschool and kindergarten child development. She also has a master's degree in education from Lindenwood College.

In announcing the appointment, Gene Henderson, Ph.D., chairman of the Education Dept., said, "During the past year, Mrs. Hoffmeister as teacher of the pre-kindergarten/kindergarten program has fully developed and implemented the unique curriculum for gifted children. Her

new appointment as director is in addition to her teaching role."

The Campus Lab School's program for gifted children is one of the few programs of its kind in the United States and has been cited by the National Association of Gifted Children.

PARKING PERMITS AVAILABLE FOR STUDENTS, STAFF

Parking permits for faculty and staff employees as well as full and part-time students are available at the Security Office. Permits, priced at \$10 each, can be obtained by paying the fee at the Business Office, then taking the payment receipt to Security for issuance of permits and a campus map that explains parking.
