

# Friendship Across the Seas

Dear Lindenwood Alumnae:

Mrs. McCluer and I arrived back home on the Lindenwood campus from our three month visit to Europe on September 1, and on Sunday, September 12, the 1954-55 students began to arrive and the campus was again a lively and friendly small world of its own. It was good to be home again, and it is a temptation to write to you about the start of this new year, about the old and new students, about the old and new students, about the old and new plans and programs and aspirations.

But I shall resist that temptation, and tell you fleetingly about some of our impressions gained from traveling in ten countries on the European continent and in the British Isles and from talking with the people of those countries and in many instances visiting in their homes

Some of the most heartwarming experiences we had were those of being guests in the homes from which a number of our Lindenwood students have come. The hospitality of these people and their affection for Lindenwood College was a source of great happiness to us and a challenge to be worthy of their very great confidence in our program.

Perhaps our most lasting and satisfactory impression from the trip generally (and I do not speak with a tone of authority, but only of our personal experiences) is of the spirit of friendship to Americans which we found. This spirit of helpfulness and warm and courteous friendship we found in taxi drivers, shop keepers, strangers in the streets and in the trains and busses, as well as among the persons whom we met more formally. Often we found through conversations with the people that we did not share the same judgments about the problems of the world and possible solutions of them, but the heartening discovery was that friendship did not depend on agreement. There was a display of a fair-minded respect for difference of opinion which bodes well for the international understanding so essential to a peaceful world.

> Mrs. Arthur Stockstron Founders' Day Speaker

M RS. ARTHUR STOCKSTROM of St. Louis, member of the Lindenwood Board of Directors, is the speaker for the 1954 Founders' Day Convocation. The convocation, at 10:30 a.m. Saturday, October 16, celebrates the 128th year since the founding of Lindenwood and appropriately is one of the major events of the annual alumnae weekend, October 15-16. Because the October Bulletin will be ready for mailing at about the time of Founders' Day, a report of the weekend will be published in the November Bulletin.

This live-and-let-live attitude was not limited to Americans. We found a Dutch burgomaster, who had been a hostage of the Germans and whose brother-in-law had been shot by the Germans, who still expressed the belief that all European countries, including Germany, must work together and their peoples must be friends. He said the European Defense Committee is the best defense against Russia, and his views prevailed among other persons we talked with in Holland, in Denmark and in England.

We watched the progress of a strike of agricultural workers in northern Italy. It was said to be Communist-inspired, but a spokesman for the strikers put their cause succinctly: They were striking for a wage of \$32.50 a month, because they could not support their families on the current pay of \$29.50. The owners, he said, could hear the cries of the neglected cattle, but not the cries of the hungry children of the workers. This economic struggle bore out an impression I gained elsewhere, that many so-called Communists in France and Italy did not appear to sympathize with Russian Communism, but were protesting against some local policy.

I attended an international educational conference in Oslo, where educators from all over the world were exchanging views on what the content of education should be and on the training of teachers. We visited cathedrals, market places, shops; motored through the countries, observing the architecture and the gardens and agricultural methods; we attended theatres and concerts; in short, we did all the things tourists do when they go abroad.

But best of all was our associations with the people, and our opportunity to know and understand them. We can only hope that our experience multiplied many times, with visitors to and from America, will help chart the course to a better international understanding.

## Dr. Kate L. Gregg

LINDENWOOD ALUMNAE of several generations do not have to be told of the loss to society and to scholarship in the death of Dr. Kate L. Gregg. She was a genuine and vital person, a warm friend and teacher, a thorough and exacting scholar, a lively and disciplined writer.

Hers was a full and productive life to the very end. Since her retirement in 1946 from the English faculty at Lindenwood, where she had been since 1924, she had been busy at research and writing. In 1952 the University of New Mexico press published her well-received book, Road to Santa Fe, based on the journal and diaries of George C. Sibley, co-founder of Lindenwood, about the charting of the road from the Missouri frontier to New Mexico.

For the past year and a half she had lived in St. Charles and worked daily at the Missouri Historical Society in St. Louis on another book, on the prairie and mountain life of Mathew Field. On June 10 she wrote "finis" to that work and sent it off to the University of Oklahoma press. The next day she set off with Miss Mary Lear, professor of chemistry, on a leisurely motor trip to her home in Chehalis, Washington. There for several days she enjoyed her family and friends. Suddenly on July 9 she became ill, and that night she died at the age of 71. It was fitting that there should have been no long period of inactivity and unproductivity in her life.

# Three New Members of Advisory Board

Three new members, one an alumna of Lindenwood, have been appointed to the advisory board, which meets in an advisory capacity with the college's Board of Directors, President F. L. McCluer has announced. The alumna is Mrs. David W. Hopkins (Esther McCarrell Saunders), B. M. 1923, who lives at 2404 Francis, St. Joseph, Mo. The other new members are Dr. Clem E. Bininger, minister of Second Presbyterian Church in Kansas City, and Mr. Sidney Studt, business man of St. Louis County.

Other members of the advisory board are Mrs. James T. Robison of Texarkana, Texas, and Mrs. Horton Watkins of St. Louis.

Mrs. Hopkins is active in civic and church affairs in St. Joseph. She is president of the Women of the Church, First Presbyterian Church; past president (1951-54) of the Fortnightly Musical Club, and a member of the Civic Music Association.

Dr. Bininger has been in Kansas City since February, 1951, and previously held pastorates in Cleveland, Pittsburgh, and Richmond, Va. An honor student at Princeton Theological Seminary, he received his Master of Theology degree from the seminary, an M. A. degree in philosophy at Princeton University,

Historical research and writing had been important to Dr. Gregg during her years of teaching at Lindenwood, and before that at the University of Washington, 1917 to 1922, and Elmira (N. Y.) college, 1922-24. In 1937 she had published Westward with Dragoons, the journal of William Clark on his expedition to establish Fort Osage in western Missouri in 1808. She left a completed manuscript of a history of Lindenwood College. And in recent years she had amassed materials on another projected work, a historical study of Joseph Walker, discoverer of the Yosemite.

A native of Chehalis, Dr. Gregg received the B. A. and Ph. D. degrees from the University of Washington and her master's degree from Yale University. She was a member of Phi Beta Kappa, scholastic honorary.

Writing about D. Gregg in her hometown Chehalis paper, a feature writer mentioned her work in the church, in A. A. U. W., in a wartime munitions plant, as well as her educational and literary achievements, but stressed the human quality of "Dr. Kate," describing her as "a keenly humorous, wise and lovable woman who made friends all over the United States and never said an unkind word about one of them."

Her death brings sorrrow to her many associates at Lindenwood, who are grateful to have had her friendship, and undoubtedly to many of her former students who will wish to join, we are sure, in expressing sympathy to the sisters and brothers who survive her.

The Following Autobiographical Accounts Make Up the Fourth Installment of the Roll Call of the Class of 1945

SALLY THOMAS (Mrs. F. Lincoln Vogel), 30 Hill-crest, Morristown, N. J.: "My next year after L. C. was spent at Missouri U, and then I married Linc. After three years in the South Pacific area of fighting, Linc returned to his junior year at the University of Pennsylvania. I went East with him and together we managed to struggle through a lengthy program of schooling. I got my B. A. from Beaver College (Presbyterian also) and did social work in Philadelphia. Linc got his bachelor's from Penn, then kept going 'til finally in August, 52, he got his Ph. D. in metallurgical engineering.

"In 1950 Kitty was born and in 1952 Linda joined the ranks. We're now settled in our first real home, Linc is engaged in research at the Bell Telephone labs, and we're very happy. We're members of the Presbyterian Church here, and I manage some time for League of Women Voters work. I'm grateful for my years at Lindenwood. Unfortunately they are rather like water, not appreciated until absent awhile."

Peggy Proctor (Mrs. W. B. Larkin) c/o U. S. Naval Hospital, Great Lakes, Ill., "After graduating I worked for an advertising company in New York for six months, when I got homesick for Missouri and returned to St. Louis and worked for three years as a receptionist in the 'Private Doctors' Office' in Mc-Millan Hospital. At McMillan I met my husband, a post-graduate and a resident in otolaryngology. We were married in St. Louis on July 2, 1949.

"My husband, being a Navy commander, was sent to Bethesda (Md.) Naval Hospital, and we were there a year. After the Korean war started, Bright was sent as senior medical officer aboard the aircraft carrier Oriskany. While we were in New York for four months before the ship was commissioned, our son, Patrick Carter, was born on Oct. 19, 1950. When Bright was at sea, Pat and I went home to live with my father. After December, 1951, Bright was at the U. S. Naval Air Station, San Diego, and while we lived in California, our daughter, Dolly Elna, was born in November, 1952. This summer we moved to Illinois, where Bright is assigned to the U. S. Naval Hospital at Great Lakes."

Bob and I were married while we were in school. Our next home was

Wayne, Neb., where Tom was on the staff at Wayne State College. We now live in Sidney where Tom is high school basketball and track coach. Our family consists of three boys: Thomas, 3½; John Scott, 2, and Rex Leigh, 1, and a pair of boxers."

In addition to studying the diseases of children in the hospital, we also started a family of our own. We now have 3 boys, the oldest of whom is now  $4\frac{1}{2}$  years old.

"My husband started his practice of medicine in Ft. Lauderdale, Fla., 2 years ago and since that time we have built a new office, a new home and settled down to everyday living"

Celeste Salvo (Mrs. Robert Drake Rose), 115 Taylor Ave., Crystal City, Mo.: "Upon leaving Lindenwood in 1945, I transferred to the University of Missouri, finishing in 1947 with a B. S. in Education. ## Lindenwood Starts 128th Year

340 Students Enrolled from 27 States; Six New Members Added to Faculty

LINDENWOOD opened its 128th academic year on September 13 with 340 students from 27 states and seven other countries. Students from outside the states come from England, France, Japan, Turkey, Puerto Rico, Honduras, and Ecuador.

Missouri, as would be expected, leads other states in students this fall, with Illinois in second place and Oklahoma in third. Tying for fourth place are Iowa and Tennessee.

There are six new members of the faculty, three new head residents, and a new nurse. Three of the faculty members were announced in the Bulletin last spring. They are Mrs. Greta Larson in office management, Mr. Henry C. Turk, replacing for a year Mr. Thomas W. Doherty who is on leave for a year from the modern languages department to study in France, and Miss Isabelle McClung, teaching in the music department for the year while Prof. Pearl Walker studies in New York City.

Other new faculty members are Mr. William C. Engram, associate professor of psychology, who replaces Miss Rachel Morris; Mrs. F. Marian Froelich, associate professor of sociology, who replaces Mr. Robert G. Schmidt, who is teaching at Southern State College, Magnolia, Ark., and Mrs. Grazina Ona Amonas, instructor in physical education.
