FCC APPROVES POWER INCREASE FOR KCLC

The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) has approved an application from Lindenwood that calls for increasing the power of its community radio station, KCLC, from 1,500 to 25,740 watts. Installation of new equipment and facilities to boost the signal must be completed by Aug. 31, 1985, according to the FCC approval. More than \$100,000 will be needed for new equipment such as an antenna, transmitter and transmission lines as well as for

installation costs, said Jim Wilson, KCLC general manager.
Details of two fund-raising drives scheduled for this fall and next spring will be announced shortly as a means of obtaining the necessary funding. Earlier this year, more than \$12,000 in cash and contributions were raised during a successful on-air funding drive.

The increase in power for KCLC, 89.1 mkz on the FM dial, will mean the station can reach a much larger audience in the bi-state area and have a greatly-improved signal for listeners in St. Charles and St. Louis counties, Wilson added.

STUDENTS RECEIVE SCHOLARSHIPS, COMPUTERS

To enter the promotion, which attracted nearly 30 applications, students were asked to write why they wanted to improve their skills, enhance their careers or better prepare themselves for tomorrow's world by obtaining a degree in communications at Lindenwood.

Both will receive two scholarships valued at up to \$2,800 each. The scholarships are named for well-known St. Louisian John Auble, former cohost of KSDK-TV's popular "Newst program and currently a columnist for the GLOBE-DEMOCRAT and announcer for KY98. Each student also will receive an Eagle Spirit Portable computer, valued at \$2,700 each, furnished by ComputerLand of St. Louis in Maryland Heights in cooperation with B&W Distributors, Inc., of St. Louis. The promotion was arranged through the college's Public Relations and Admissions offices in cooperation with the sponsors. Lindenwood officials as well as representatives of KY98, B&W and ComputerLand of St. Louis each said the promotion was well received and highly successful.

'We're honored to be a part of the John Auble Scholarship program," said Gary L. Hendren, vice-president of marketing for B&W. "Our participation is attributed to our admiration of Lindenwood's progressive philosophy of quality education, community involvement and its ability to recognize the individual needs of its students," he added.
