## COEDS SOUGHT FOR MAGAZINE CONTEST

Lindenwood coeds are invited to participate in GLAMOUR Magazine's "1985 Top Ten College Women Competition," a national contest that will cite 10 outstanding students at college and university campuses throughout the country. A panel of GLAMOUR editors will select the winners in early 1985 on the basis of their records of achievement in academic studies and/or extracurricular activities on campus or in the community.

The 10 winners will be featured in the magazine's college issue in August, 1985. In addition, they will receive all-expense-paid trips to New York City and will participate in meetings with professionals in their respective areas of career interest.

This is the third year that Lindenwood has participated in the event sponsored by GLAMOUR, a New York City-based national publication with a circulation of 1.9 million each month. ## MOPAC AIDS COLLEGE WITH COMPUTER EQUIPMENT

Lindenwood has benefited from the donation of more than \$100,000 in computer equipment by Union Pacific-Missouri Pacific Railroad of St. Louis and the commitment of a 1974 alumnus. Credited with being instrumental in obtaining phased-out equipment from Missouri Pacific is Tom C. Jones of St. Charles, a systems analyst with the firm and a 1974 graduate.

In recent months Jones has obtained several PDP-11 computers, terminals, disc drives, manuals and accessories that are valued at more than \$100,000. Installed at the college's Data Processing and Computer Science Dept. centers, the equipment has been obtained from several Missouri Pacific sites in the midwest that have installed more sophisticated and automatic computer equipment for railroad operations.

## COUNCIL APPROVES TUITION REDUCTION FOR SENIORS

As a means of serving an estimated 250,000 senior citizens in the greater metro area, Lindenwood is offering a 50% reduction in tuition for persons 62 years of age and older. Approved this month by the President's Council, the reduction policy applies to persons interested in pursuing either undergraduate or graduate studies on a part time or full-time basis. Prior to the administrative policy change, Lindenwood offered a tuition reduction to persons 65 years of age or older.

## RESTORED ORGAN FEATURED IN OCTOBER 28TH RECITAL

The recently-restored pipe organ in Sibley Hall Chapel will be the subject of a free recital October 28, beginning at 4 p.m., performed by Ansley Fleming, faculty member of Lindenwood's Sacred Music Institute and the St. Louis Conservatory & School for the Arts.

Installed in 1965, the organ has undergone extensive renovation in recent months, funded by a bequest from the Richard M. Raney estate. Raney's wife, Mildred, was a 1923 alumna. Renovation and repair of the organ, which Fleming calls "one of the finest instruments in St. Charles," were completed by Craig Doyle, a well-known St. Louis craftsman.

Open to students, faculty and the public, the October 28 recital will feature selections by Bach, Handel, Pachelbel, Reubke and Schumann.

### CHARLES LEADER TO APPEAR AS TWAIN TOMORROW

Returning by popular demand, Charles Leader as Mark Twain will be presented at 8 p.m. tomorrow at Jelkyl Theatre. The performance is part of this year's Visiting Artists Series. Tickets, priced at \$5 each or \$14 for the remaining season, are available at the Box Office.

During the past 11 years, Leader has performed his one-man show at numerous theatres throughout the United States, including a successful four-engagement run at Lindenwood in 1978. Tomorrow night's program, developed by Leader along with Wesley Van Tassell and Jerry Webb, includes material from 15 works that cover a span of 25 years in Twain's writing career. Primarily humorous, the material will be delivered in two 50-minute acts.

Remaining events in the series include the St. Louis Brass Quintet on Feb. 3, 1985, and the St. Louis Black Repertory Co. and Flenenco Guitarist Ronald Radford in March, 1985.

### FACULTY, STAFF INPUT SOUGHT FOR UNITED WAY

Lindenwood has joined other institutions in a 10-county area of Missouri and Illinois in participation in this year's United Way Campaign, and is soliciting the aid of faculty and staff employees to make this year's campaign a success.

The college is attempting to equal or exceed last year's goal of nearly \$2,300 and gain 100% participation. Any amount of contributions, which are tax deductible, will enable the institution to achieve 100% support.

To break last year's record, faculty and staff are being ask to contribute \$2 per month to the campaign, for a total obligation of \$24, paid either directly to the United Way or deducted in monthly amounts.

As an incentive, those who contribute \$24 or more will have the chance to receive a \$25 check for brunch from President Spainhower and two tickets to the Cardinals-Philadelphia football game on November 25. Compliments of Randy L. Wallick, the tickets have a value of \$51 and are located on the 40-yard line. For eligibility, you must contribute at least \$2 per month and have your pledge card into the Business Office by the close of the United Way Campaign on October 31.
