## AERho KICKS OFF RAFFLE

"Okay, who wants \$400 off tuition?"

Fernando Feito, the president of a broadcasting honor society, has announced that grand prize for a raffle being held in February and March.

One of the newest organizations on campus has planned a fund-raising effort to help its members attend a national convention. Alpha Epsilon Rho was founded in the 1940's with a charter member here at Lindenwood.

AERho, the National Broadcasting Society, has had a sporadic existence at Lindenwood since then. The latest wave of the chapter was reorganized in the fall of 1984, and its membership has been steadily increasing since then.

Last year, the group won the "Rookie Chapter of the Year" award at the national convention in Dallas. The Lindenwood chapter also impressed national officers by capturing the National Tourette Syndrome Association award for producing the best public awareness campaign for the disease.

"We're about five times larger than we were in '84," said the group's second president, Fernando Feito. The Lindenwood senior said the group's financial assets have also increased with the additional members.

But, the group wants to send as many of its members to the 1986 national convention as possible, thus the need for a fund-raising effort, the brainchild of President Feito.

Feito said the first drawing in the raffle will be tomorrow, and the mini-grand prize in the first week is a portable AM-FM stereo TV.

"We're hoping to give away a TV set a week," said Feito. He said the chances of that happening all depends on the ticket sales per week of the drawing. Feito emphasized that many of the prizes, such as tickets for specific St. Louis professional sports teams will be offered only in one week.

The first drawing was held on Feb. 12th.

## PEER TUTORS PLAN WORKSHOP & WRITING CENTER

The peer tutors from the CAP Center are sponsoring a number of activities designed to help Lindenwood students to succeed with flying colors in all their courses!

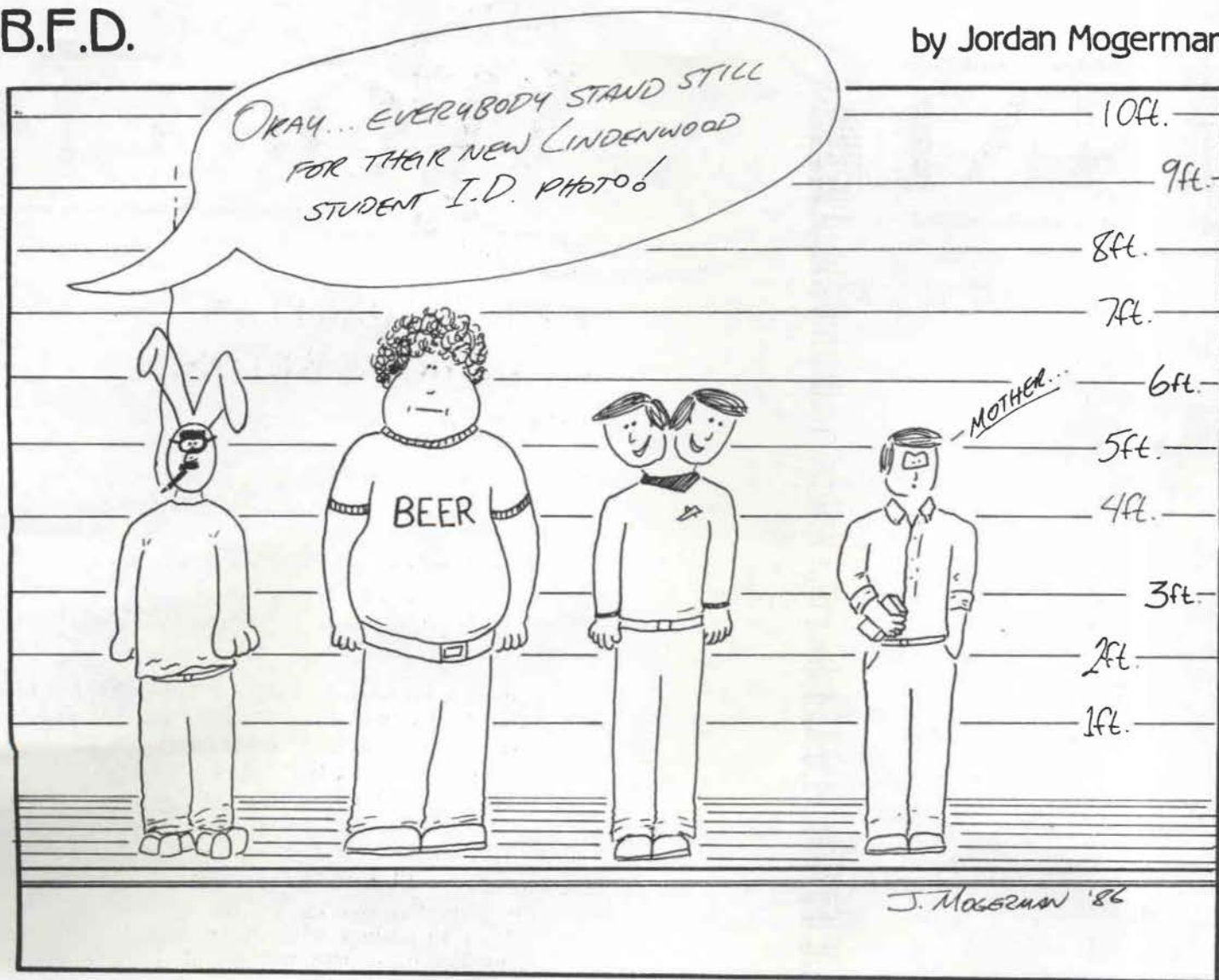
There are three workshops scheduled for the beginning of this semester. "Writing the 'A' Paper" will be held on Tuesday, February 11, from 6:00 - 7:00 p.m. in Young Hall Lounge. Tutors will review basic principles for organizing an essay, doing research work, and preparing a research paper. "Get It Together!" is scheduled for Thursday, February 13 from 12:00 - 1:00 p.m. in the Cardinal Room of the cafeteria, and again from 7:00 - 8:00 p.m. in Cobbs Hall Lounge. Tutors will offer tips on how to make the most efficient use of study time and will give special attention to presenting different alternatives of note-taking. Finally, "Ace-ing That Test" will take place on Wednesday, February 19, from 6:00 - 7:00 p.m. on Young Hall Lounge and again on Thursday, February 20 from 12:00 - 1:00 p.m. in the Cardinal Room of the cafeteria. Tutors will have sample tests from different courses, as well as experience with taking tests from various professors at Lindenwood, to share with students.

Throughout the semester, the peer tutors will sponsor a Writing Center, on Monday and Thursday nights, from 6:30 - 8:30 p.m. in the Cardy Reading Room of Butler Library. The Center works on a drop-in basis: students should bring ideas and drafts they are working on, and a tutor will help them develop their writing effectively.

The peer tutors hope to share tips with many other Lindenwood students at these workshops and at the Writing Center.

Feito said other prizes tomorrow include two free \$15 passes to "Romance St. Louis" a Valentine's Night Dance in St. Louis, two free passes to the Admiral opening this spring on the St. Louis Riverfront.

The raffle has a four week duration, and many other prizes are still to be announced. Tickets to Baseball Cardinal games, Soccer Steamers games, and an autographed Cardinal football, were several prizes disclosed by Feito. He said Lindenwood students might also be pleased with Anheuser-Busch products being raffled in the later weeks.

The grand prize, a tuition discount of \$400, is a gift of the college, and is open to all students. Feito said for every raffle ticket bought in the four weeks of the fund raiser, the donators name will be submitted to the grand prize drawing. Hence, the more tickets you buy during the weeks, the better chance at winning the tuition discount.

"Every week, however, the raffle will have a turnover of tickets," Feito said. "If you buy a ticket the first week, you have to buy another to be eligible for the second weeks drawing, and so on for the third and fourth drawing. But, every ticket you buy means another chance of the grand prize."

Tickets are available from any AERho member, Feito said, and will be sold primarily outside the post office and in the cafeteria.

"It's a great deal," said Feito, "I think I'll buy a few myself."

## PEER TUTORS OFFER ACADEMIC HELP

The Academic Assistance Program at the CAP Center continues to offer students help with their class work. Students might desire help for any number of reasons:

They may feel that a certain course is over their heads or that they need help beginning a totally unfamiliar subject, or they may simply want to improve their good work in a subject to excellent work.

As long as the goal is to improve their class work, students should contact the CAP Center (ext. 237) and make an appointment to meet with a peer tutor. Peer tutors are Lindenwood students who have excelled in their own studies; their job is to assist other students from Lindenwood to do as well as they can in their course work. All Lindenwood students — full-time or part-time; day, evening or LCIE — are eligible to receive assistance from the peer tutors. When a student needs continued help, he or she will meet for at least one hour per week with a tutor, throughout the semester. Students are urged to make use of the peer tutoring services, which are part of the college's efforts to help Lindenwood students learn and succeed to their full capacity.

# TWO ALL-COLLEGE COLLOQUIA

On Monday evening, February 24, there will be a panel discussion called "Science and Humanities Look at Lives of a Cell." Professors Alan Cady, Ray Scupin, and Richard Rickert — faculty members from the natural science, social science, and humanities areas respectively — will present their own comments and lead discussion on Lewis Thomas's popular book, *Lives of a Cell: Notes of a Biology Watcher* (1974). The book is a collection of lively essays on various topics such as the effects of man's activities on the environment, computers, the possibility of extraterrestrial life and the structure of societies. The discussion will take place from 7:00 - 9:00 p.m. in Young Auditorium.

This is the first year that Lindenwood has an "All-College Reading List." Each year, a few books on diverse subjects are selected to be on the list, which all members of the college are encouraged to read, enjoy, and discuss. Two events are scheduled this semester for the purpose of drawing together students, faculty, and others from the whole Lindenwood community to discuss the ideas raised by two books on the list.

Secondly, on Thursday evening, March 6, there will be a panel discussion and critique of E.F. Schumaker's *Small is Beautiful* (1976), with three social scientists: Hal Zimmerman and Wilda Swift, both LCIE faculty members, and Robert King, professor of Business Administration. Schumaker's popular and controversial book claims we are consuming our capital resources as if they are annual income and that our scale of consumption and our technology should be reduced. The discussion is set for 7:00 p.m. in Sibley Chapel.

Everyone is encouraged to join in these two events. The two books are available at the Lindenwood Bookstore at a moderate price. Copies are also on reserve in Butler Library.
