Miss Banta is a member of Alpha Lambda Delta, Alpha Sigma Tau, and Pi Alpha Mu. She was a member of the 1952 Popularity Court.

Miss Bartenbach is vice president of the Student Government Association. Last year she served as vice president of the Student Christian Association and was a member of the Popularity Court. She is a member of the Triangle Club, Beta Chi and the Athletic Association.

Miss Culver is station manager of KCLC and is vice president of the Student Christian Association. Member of Class of 1936 Writes Of Life in England

AN INTERESTING letter has come from Mrs. Terence Quilliam (Eleanor Denny Payne, Class of '36) who lives with her husband and four children in Somerset, England. After graduation, Mrs. Quilliam taught in a government school in Persia where she met and married her English husband. Two children were born in Persia, and two after the Quilliams made their home in England. The youngest is 4.

"The children are all very 'English'," Mrs. Quilliam writes, "and I had many laughs at them when my parents were here this summer. The children were insistent that certain things just weren't done here — for instance Father wanted to go without his coat to town, and all four children were horrified."

Of the weather, Mrs. Quilliam wrote, "England seemed very cold when we first came here, but we have all gotten well acclimated. However, there still aren't more than one or two days each summer when I would like to go swimming. The children don't mind the cold nearly as much I do, and so we make a mad dash to the beach whenever the tide is in and the weather reasonably good in the summer . . . This summer has been rather a cool one on the whole, though we did have a couple of 'heat waves' when the temperature here got into the 80's!"

The Quilliams live in a seaside resort. The address is 9 Arundell Road, Weston-super-mare, Somerset, England. Mrs. Quilliam says though she has lived there six years, she hasn't joined any women's clubs. The children's school doesn't have a P.T.A., she wrote, adding "in fact few schools here do."

Mrs. Quilliam writes that she has become so accustomed to rationing that she wouldn't know how to be extravagant any more. "I suppose most Lindenwood girls would find life here somewhat primitive. We have no central heating, no refrigerator (not that we need one very often!). I have a washing-machine, which is my pride and joy, and the envy of many of my friends. We have gas for cooking and for fires in the spring or autumn, but in winter we have coal fires for heating as they are much cheaper.

"Shopping of course takes quite a time, as we have no car. We do not live far from town, but it is an up-hill walk so one comes home rather slowly when loaded with purchases. It is a little easier now that I can do it in the morning without the assistance (?) of the children."

Lindenwood Bulletins reach her in "due course," she said. "I always read them, looking hopefully for news of some of my classmates."
