Lecture on "The Art & Life of Georgia O'Keefe" to be presented

"The Art & Life of Georgia O'Keefe," an illustrated lecture by author Jan Garden Castro, will be presented on Wednesday, March 5 at 7:30 p.m. in the Parlor of the Memorial Arts Building.

Jan Castro, who researched the art of Georgia O'Keefe over a ten-year period, is author of the best-selling book, *The Art & Life of Georgia O'Keefe* (Crown Publishers), which sold over 30,000 copies in its first

STDs - Are You at Risk?



Sexually transmitted diseases (STDs), next to the common cold and the flu, are the most common infectious diseases in the U.S. Most occur in young people from adolescence to age 25. At the present time, there are over 20 recognized types of STDs.

Because the incidence is so high in the age group of many college students, we will publish a series of articles about STDs. In a previous issue we discussed AIDS. In this issue we will educate students about herpes using a little quiz from the Burroughs Wellcome Co., a company that manufactures a drug that helps relieve the symtoms of herpes.



Dr. Alejandro Bolanos

President of Nicaraguan Information Center to Speak at Lindenwood

Dr. Alejandro Bolanos, President of the NICARAGUAN INFORMATION CENTER, will be the guest speaker at Lindenwood College for the Lecture and Concert Series sponsored by the Lindenwood College S.G.A. on TUESDAY, MARCH 4, 1986, beginning at 7:30 in the Parlor of Cobbs Hall. Dr. Bolanos will be speaking on "Nicaragua and the Sandinista Revolution.

Dr. Alejandro Bolanos-Geyer attended St. Louis University from 1942 to 1952 when he received his medical degree. He returned to his native Nicaragua where he practiced medicine until 1972, when his practice was disrupted by the earthquake of the same year. Six years later he left Nicaragua after his hometown of Masaya was burned and looted by the Sandinistas forces, one year before they took power. Since then, he has resided in St. Charles, Missouri. He was originally inactive politically. Reports of Sandinistas activities from friends and relatives still living in Nicaragua changed his mind, leading him to research the Sandinistas extensively and work to inform Americans of his critical findings.

Since 1972 he has dedicated a great deal of his time doing historical research on William Walker, an enigmatic American who became the president of Nicaragua in the mid-nineteenth century. Due to his professional research, Dr. Bolanos is considered the foremost authority on mid-nineteenth century Nicaraguan history. He is responsible for the research, translation and publication of a number of volumes and historical documents such as: La Guerra en Nicaragua;

The War in Nicaragua as Reported by Frank Leslie's Illustrated Newspaper; The War in Nicaragua as Reported by Harper's Weekly; El Filibustero Clintor Rollins, and James Carson Jamison - Con Walker en Nicaragua.

Dr. Bolanos directs the NICARAGUAN INFORMA-TION CENTER, located in St. Charles, Missouri. This is an organization founded by him in 1982 to expose the Sandinista regime of his homeland. It also publishes an informational-newsletter quarterly dealing with current issues on Nicaragua.

Additionally, if active lesions are present in the birth canal at the time of birth, the newborn may become seriously ill. If you have herpes it is important to notify your obstetrician so that you may be monitored during the final stages of pregnancy. Should it be determined that herpes poses a risk to your baby, delivery by caesarean section may be recommended.


- F. Pain, itching, lesions, fever, muscular aches and headaches are all symptoms associated with initial outbreak of the disease Not everyone who has genital herpes experiences all of these symptoms. Recurrences are usually less severe and rarely involve the flu-like symptoms, e.g. muscular aches and fever, of an initial outbreak.
- D. The incubation period varies from one individual to another. Usually, the first outbreak occurs within three weeks after sexual contact with an infected and contagious partner. However, in some cases, it can take as long as three years before symptoms appear.
- 3. B. The average herpes patient will experience a recurrence three or four times a year. But here, too, there is a great deal of individual variation. Some people, apparently, never have a second attack, while others have recurrences so frequently that they may think of their herpes lesions as a chronic condition.
- 4. B. Testing by the physician is the only way to get an accurate diagnosis of genital herpes. Self-examination is the way most people come to suspect they have the disease; however, there is a possibility that they may mistake some other skin condition for herpes lesions. Herpes lesions will eventually disappear on their own, but the herpes virus remains in the body, dormant, until something triggers a new outbreak. Physicians now have reliable laboratory tests that can determine if the condition is indeed genital herpes.
- 5. B. Genital herpes is treatable. There is a perscription drug available from a physician called Zovirax® (acyclovir). A doctor can advise on the role of this drug in the treatment of genital herpes, as well as offer self-help measures and counseling to help control the disease.
- 6. E. There is some indication that have herpes might predispose a woman to developing cervical cancer. Fortunately, cancer of the cervix is easily detected in its very early stages by the pap smear. Having a pap test, at least once a year, will ensure that any abnormalities in the cervix are discovered and treated properly.

- B. Although theoretically there are other possibilities, the experts strongly believe that the only way to contract herpes is through sexual relations with an individual who has active lesions.
- B. Condoms do not offer adequate protection against either transmitting or contracting herpes. Men and women with active lesions should abstain from sexual activity.
- 9. E. No one knows precisely what triggers recurrent outbreaks. But all the factors listed may play a role. Tight clothing, for example, can cause heavy friction and irritation to the genital area. In addition, physical conditions such as poor nutrition menstruation, or a cold or other respiratory infection are associated with recurrences. In some cases, though, episodes appear to be unrelated to any triggering event.
- 10. B. False. Herpes is unrelated to syphilis, gonorrhea or AIDS and does not lead directly to any of these sexually transmitted diseases. However, risk of multiple infections increases with increasing numbers of sexual partners.

In the St. Louis area, there is a clinic established for diagnosis and treatment of STDs. It is located at 801 S. Brentwood in Clayton and services are free of charge. The telephone number is 854-6656. No appointment is needed if people go to the clinic during the hours it is open:

Mon.-4:30-6:30 p.m. Tues.-8:30-10:30 a.m. Wed.-9:30-11:30 a.m. Thurs.-12:30-2:30 p.m. Fri.-8:30-10:30 a.m.

Those who prefer not to use the free clinic can also seek treatment form their personal physicians.
