## DEATH LINKED TO CLOVE CIGARETTES

Smoking clove cigarettes, a fad becoming increasingly popular, has been linked to the death of one 17-year-old and considered a contributing factor in the serious illness of others, according to the Center for Disease Control in Atlanta.

Clove cigarettes are 30-40 times higher in tar than low-tar cigarettes and have twice the tar of normal cigarettes. Typical tobacco cigarettes contain 0.8 - 1.2 mg. of nicotine per cigarette; clove cigarettes have 2.75 mg. of nicotine per cigarette.

Users of clove cigarettes have reported hemoptysis (coughing up blood), nosebleeds, sore throats, frequent upper respiratory infections, difficulty breathing, nausea, and vomiting. Some people have gone into shock due to allergic sensitivity or aspiration pneumonia resulting from burnt cloves anesthetizing the pharynx and tracheobronchial tree.

Clove cigarettes are not safer than tobacco cigarettes. Users of clove cigarettes need to be informed that burnt cloves inhaled can cause serious lung damage.

It allowed me not to start from scratch again looking for sources." said Beckham-Brasier.

Beckham-Brasier wants to continue as a reporter after she graduates.

## -Tradition, Heritage, Legacy-

Any institution as old as Lindenwood is bound to have traditions discontinued, changed or forgotten.

Lindenwood in the past not only had traditions for the college as a whole, but many of the classes each year established their own. Some were even adopted by Lindenwood to represent the entire college. Such was the case with the College Poem written by Alice Linnemann:

### COAST, DEAR OLD LINDENWOOD

"Here's to dear old Lindenwood,  
 Our college of wide renown.  
 You'll find it in Grand Old Missouri,  
 At the edge of St. Charles town.

Hail, to the white and the yellow!  
 The elms and the lindens we love.  
 And for a grand, glorious future,  
 We look to the Power above!

Did you know that we have a school song, a school flower and school colors? The song is called "Lindenwood Hymn", the flower is the field daisy, and contrary to popular belief, the colors are yellow and white - not black and gold.

The "Lindenwood Book of Views", a nicely bound little book which featured pictures and a short history of each of the buildings, was a touch of class that began in 1905 and was discontinued in the latter '30's.

The May Day celebration and dance around the May Pole by the dance club "Orchesis" was a major event that fell by the wayside. It marked the end of the school year. A part of the ceremonies was the pinning of the Junior girls by the Senior graduating class.

Clubs and organizations shared a part of the heritage of by-gone days. Until approximately 1948 State Clubs were a way that students from the same states kept in touch socially.

Some traditions and organizations have recently seen a comeback as the result of interested students, staff and administrators on campus. One of these is the Day Students Organization. Founded in the 1940's it became an essential governing and decision-making group. In 1979 the organization fell apart but as of the 1985-86 school year, it has been brought back to life.

The "Linden Leaves" yearbook was an award-winning publication last year. It had not been printed since 1979. The last class officers were elected in 1978 but plans are underway to have elections again this fall. An Inter-Club Council was held each month in years past and allowed the heads of clubs and organizations on campus to compare notes on scheduled activities. As of April 30th they began again.

Traditions, heritage and legacies come and go. Some are kept, some are dropped, some are forgotten for awhile but make a comeback, and new ones are begun; but Lindenwood, and all it means to those who care, continues.

### Food and Toy Drive for the Needy

To help this problem we are going to shopping malls with pamphlets and names of the veterinarians in St. Charles. We also have asked leading radio stations in St. Louis to air for one week, public service announcements concerning Pet Care. We hope this will make the public aware of the problem that is occurring with pet overpopulation.

### INTRAMURALS ORGANIZED

The groups comprised of John Powers, Mark Schwing, Susie McNay, Earl Austin and Burma Wilkins decided on their project because they felt there were not enough physically active group participation events on Lindenwood Campus.

They divided their project into two categories; setting up an intra-mural program, both present and future, and a long-range goal based on getting repairs started on existing sports facilities.

To accomplish setting up an intra-mural program a volley ball tournament was started this session. Currently a fall schedule has been set-up as well. As regards the long-term goals, because of the large amount of interest shown by student participation in current intra-mural activities, the administration has shown that repairs to existing sports facilities is a viable plan. One example is the solicitation of estimates to repair Butler Pool as reported by group member Burma Wilkins in the last edition of the "Linden World".

### FINANCIAL AID BOOKLET

Since the majority of students who attend college are in need of some form of financial aid our group decided to prepare a booklet listing various sources that provide aid to students. ### STUDENT CENTER REMODELED

The Lindenwood College Community is invited to attend the Grand-Opening Party of the Circle K student Center and Snack Bar located in Nicholls Hall. The party on May 1st will be from 9 - 11 p.m. and will feature a DJ, free pizza and snacks to kick-off the newly renovated facility.

This new center was created after five students enrolled in Alan Shiller's Dynamics class saw a need for an appealing student center equipped to meet the demands of both commuter and resident students.

After conducting student interviews, the group met with college officials to discuss possible improvements. The St. Charles Kiwanis Club donated over \$5,000 for the project and the Lindenwood Student Government also contributed over \$200 toward the renovation.

Students are encouraged to take advantage of the new center. Both the student center and snack bar were painted with a graphics design by Lindenwood student, Jordan Mogerman. In addition, a suspended ceiling, new floor tile and ceiling fans were installed by the maintenance department. Mini-blinds and a cash register were also added. Director of the Student Center and Snack Bar, Gene Goldstein, helped attain a menu board and update the jukebox music.

The group also purchased new furniture, lamps, and floor pillows for students to use on the upper level of the center. Finally, an entertainment center will be installed in the snack bar.

One Group Dynamics member said of the project, "It's been a lot of hard work and a lot of fun. The college staff has been extremely supportive and our group has learned effective communication and planning skills."
