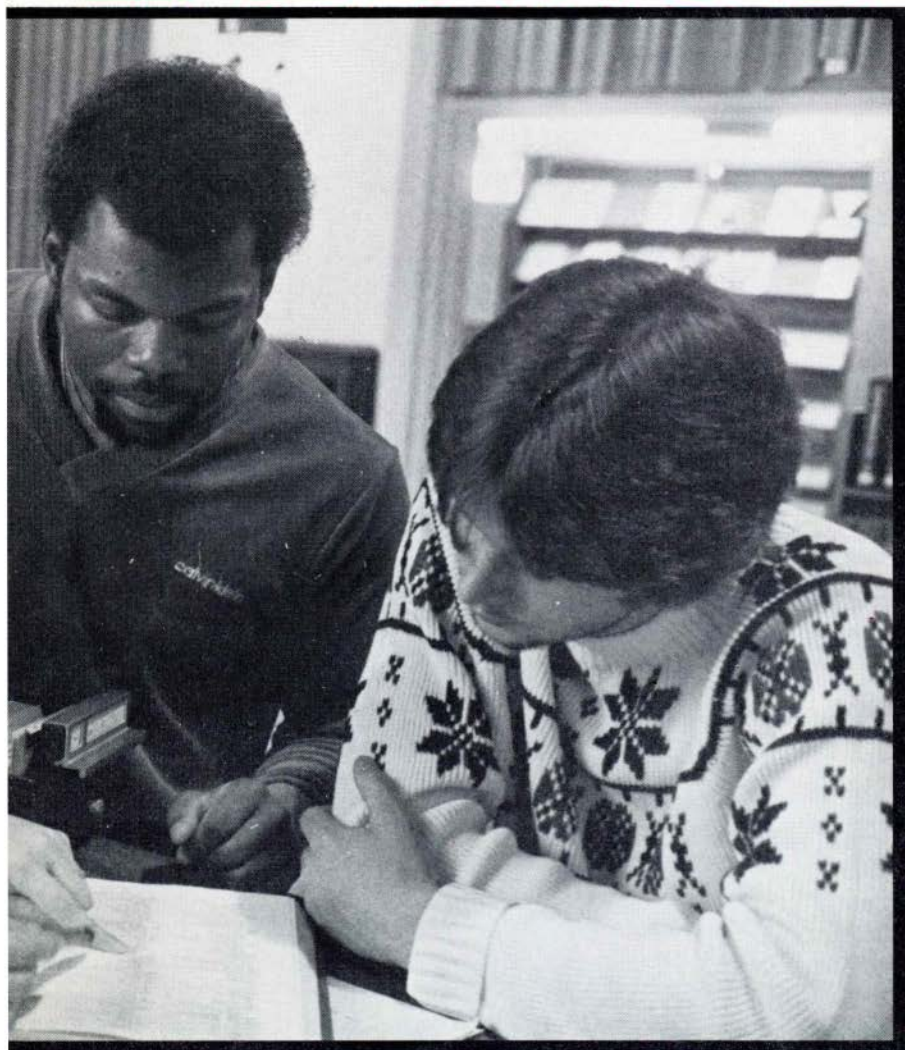

There are many reasons for choosing a college. The most important reason is the education that you receive.

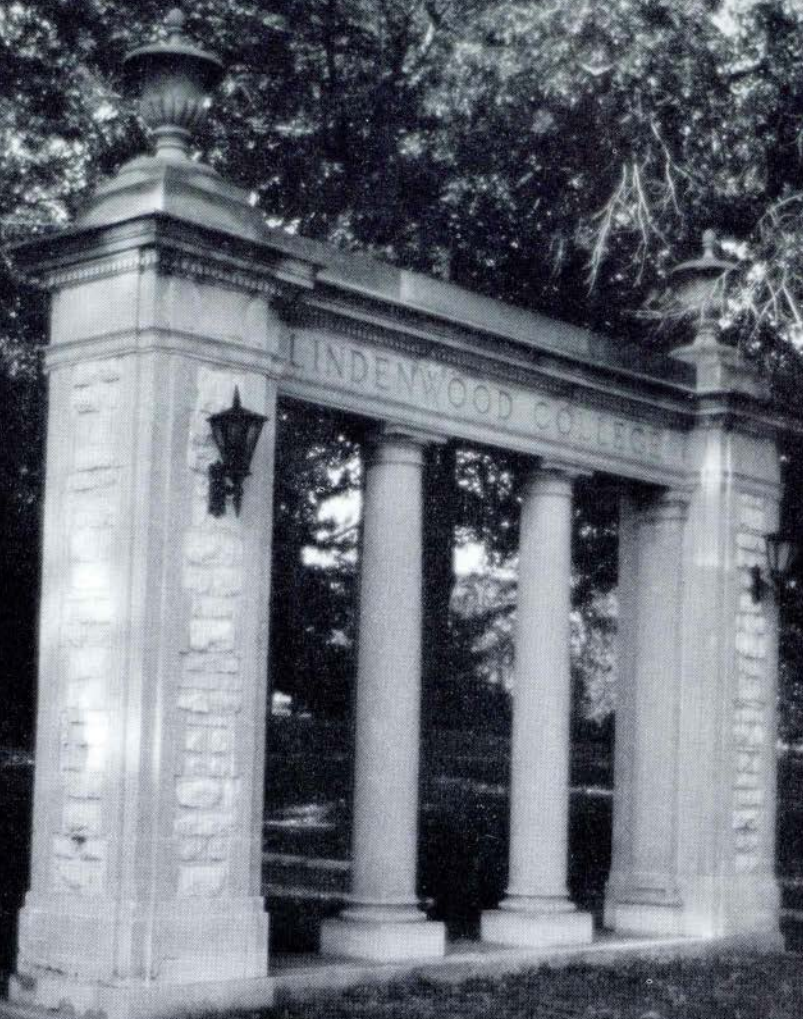
A Lindenwood education is exceptional. It is not one education, but two.

Lindenwood is the oldest college west of the Mississippi. John Quincy Adams was president of the United States when we first opened our doors. Young people have gathered on this historic campus each year since 1827.

The Lindenwood Curriculum

For a small, traditional, very personal college, Lindenwood offers you an extraordinary curriculum.

No fewer than 767 courses are taught here, 653 of them for undergraduates. These courses are organized into 26 major degree programs and six pre-professional programs. Whichever program you choose, you will share with all other Lindenwood undergraduates these lifelong educational benefits:

- *You will learn to think clearly and critically.*
- *You will become conversant with the important ideas and achievements of humankind, the lessons of civilization that every educated man and woman must know.*

- *You will receive a solid, thorough preparation for success in your chosen field.*

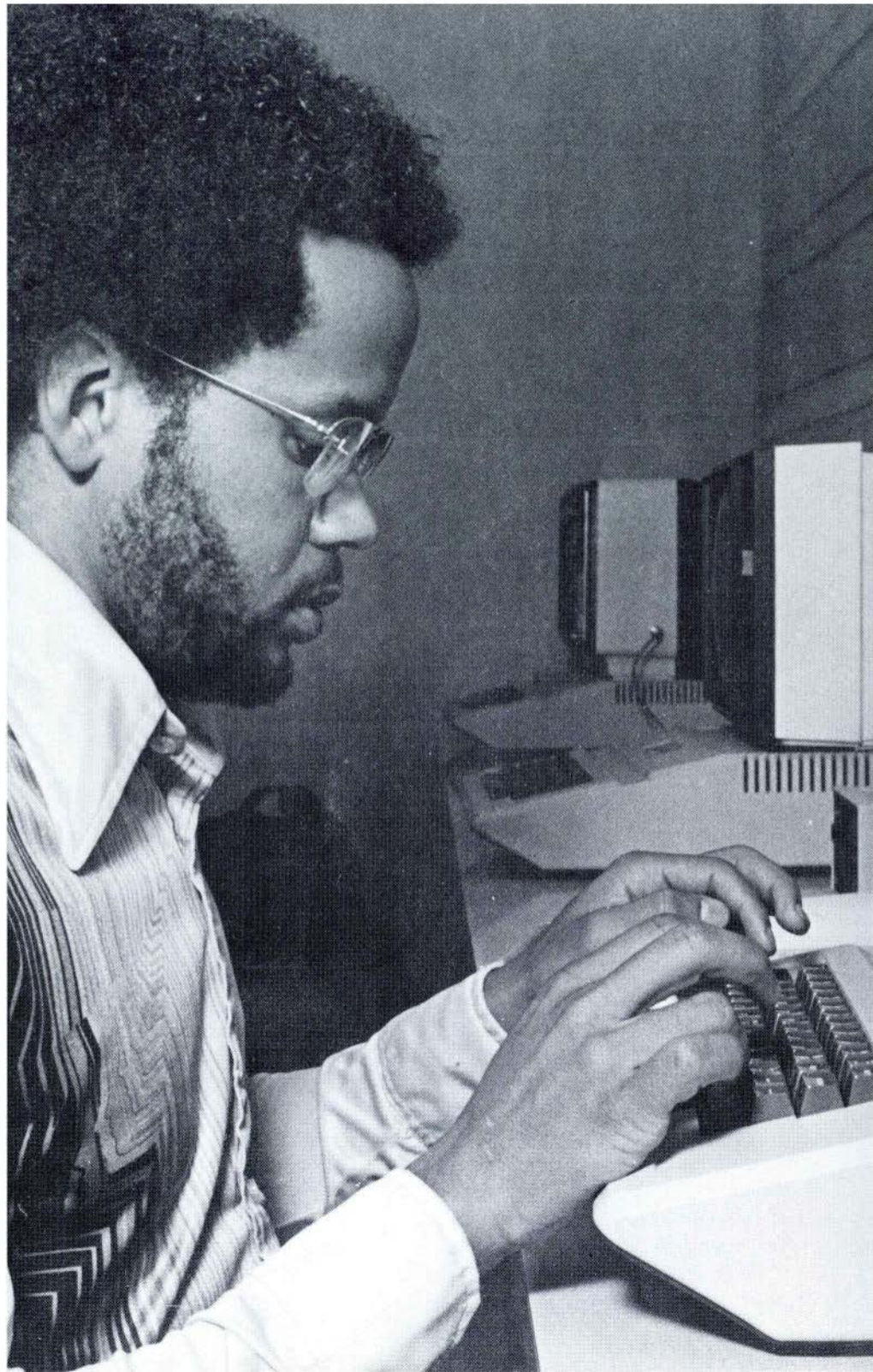
Michelangelo and Georgia O'Keefe, Aristophanes and Neil Simon, Tolstoy and William Styron, Bach and Louis Armstrong communicate to us across the centuries or with electronic immediacy.

And you're part of the action! At Lindenwood you actively take part in the communication of feelings and ideas through active internships and participation both on and off campus.

For example, at Lindenwood's Jelkyl Center for the Performing Arts, no fewer than six productions play to packed houses during an 18-week season. Students of art, music, literature, dance and theatre join forces to make this a joyful communication. Many students stay on through summer and work in summer theatre companies to earn their Actor's Equity Cards.

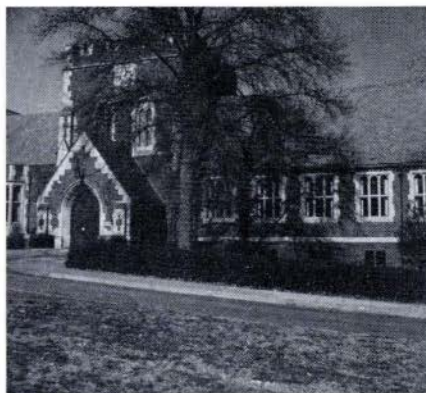
The mass communications are represented, too. Lindenwood facilities include two radio stations serving over two million people in the St. Louis area, and a color TV station — cable channel 24 — serving St. Charles County. Students operate all these stations. They also serve as interns in commercial mass media stations in St. Louis.

From the fine arts, to literature, to the performing arts and a host of other person-to-person communications, the humanities are alive and well and kicking at Lindenwood today.



The Social Sciences

At Lindenwood you go beyond the classroom to understand your field firsthand.



The Lindenwood Library

Humanity inevitably organizes itself into groups. These packages of interacting individuals — ranging from primitive tribes to chambers of commerce — we call social institutions. An understanding of these institutions and how they interact is the object of the social sciences.

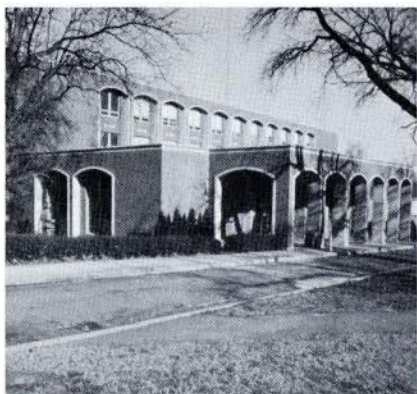
At Lindenwood the social sciences, like the humanities, are taught with special emphasis on their application to the real world. Politics, sociology, business and education all offer active internship programs to give you on-the-job experience during your college years.

Our Fashion Marketing Program, for example, is probably unique in the nation. It combines a liberal education with business and fashion merchandising. It prepares you for careers with retail and wholesale firms in buying, merchandising, fashion coordination, advertising, publicity, styling, sales and marketing. Courses are taught by fashion and retailing experts who are actively engaged in their trade. Lindenwood is associated with some of the country’s largest firms, prestigious retailers who will provide you with real-world experience before you graduate.



The Natural Sciences

The metabolism of life, the nature of matter, the laws of the Universe — these are the subjects of investigation when we study the Natural Sciences.

Lindenwood's modern, air-conditioned Young Hall of Science provides extensive laboratory and classroom facilities for students of the Department of Natural Sciences. A 1000-acre nature preserve located about 50 miles from the campus provides an outdoor laboratory for ecological studies of terrestrial and fresh water habitats.

Again, many internship programs are available to students of the natural sciences. You will understand your field better and be more equipped to pursue it when you can apply the lessons of classroom and laboratory in a real-world job situation.

The Engineering 3-2 Plan.

Lindenwood, in association with Washington University of St. Louis, offers this special plan for engineering students. You complete three years of study at Lindenwood, followed by two years of engineering study at Washington University. Upon graduation, you receive a BA or BS from Lindenwood *and* a BS in Engineering from Washington University.

Independent Studies. Qualified students may meet individual career goals by obtaining approval of a proposal for an independent program of study. Such a program will normally cover one term and can involve participation in classes, tutorials and field work, on or off campus.

The Contract Degree. Exceptional career goals can be met at Lindenwood through the Contract Degree Program. In essence, this program provides a unique, custom curriculum created by you with faculty advice and counsel.



Pre-Professional Programs

*A single-minded campaign to place you

In addition to the degree programs offered by the academic divisions, Lindenwood offers Pre-professional Programs to prepare you for admission to professional and graduate schools. There are six of these programs:

Most professional schools require students to spend two to four years in a liberal arts and sciences curriculum as preparation for admission. Admission is highly competitive. In response, Lindenwood's Pre-professional Programs are designed to give you — from the very first day you arrive on campus — every advantage in

gaining admission to the school of your choice.

This includes individual attention to your goals, continuous faculty counseling and a career planning strategy based on the specific requirements of the school to which you intend to apply. As a result of this single-minded programming, Lindenwood has an excellent record for placing students in the professional and graduate schools of their choice.

The Career Strategy Program

From your first day at Lindenwood you will embark on a four-year strategy designed with a single purpose in mind — to place you in the very best job available upon your graduation. This is not a general-purpose program. It is designed specifically for you. Working together with your Career Strategy Program Counselor you will be able to:

- *identify your special talents, both visible and hidden, as revealed by personal consultation and aptitude tests.*
- *match your talents to your goals, vocational and psychological.*
- *equate your goals to real-world opportunities that exist now and in the future.*
- *construct an academic program that makes the most of your own talent-goal-opportunity mix.*
- *set levels of personal and academic achievement along with time*

schedules for achieving these levels.

- *monitor personal and academic achievement, redirecting activities when necessary to maintain balanced growth.*
- *keep abreast of what is happening in your field through seminars, workshops, career days and briefings given by professionals active in the field.*

The Career Strategy Program is a vital part of a Lindenwood real-world education. Combine it with an active internship and you've got a running start in your career.

The Internship Program

Internships are the pride of Lindenwood. We've worked long and hard to build our network of internships in the busy, bustling Greater St. Louis area. In almost every area of study we can offer you "hands-on" professional experiences.

These are not just make-work assignments. Many of them allow you to earn a good salary while you're earning college credits on the job. They require knowledge, skill and competence. They are



responsible positions. For example: As a psychology major, you will have every opportunity to earn recommendations from leading professionals in your field. As a biology major, you can apply your learning in modern commercial labs. As an education major, you can teach in surrounding elementary and secondary schools. As a business major, you'll gain invaluable experience inside successful St. Louis corporations. Even majors in mathematics — the most abstract of the sciences — engage in practical, off-campus internships.

The Placement Program

The Career Strategy and Internship Programs will superbly prepare you to land your first job. But before you set out, Lindenwood offers still another program to help you cross the finish line first.

You may not have to leave campus to look for a job! The Placement Program contacts employers to arrange on campus interviews, prior to graduation.

For graduates who choose to widen their search, the Placement Program will train you in job-winning techniques. You'll learn where to find the right job, how to reach the right person. You'll learn how to respond during an interview, and you'll engage in practice interviews in rehearsal for the real thing. Most importantly, you'll learn what questions to ask.

The Placement Program is your interface with the real-world job market.

After Classes

Lindenwood is more than just professors, laboratories and books.



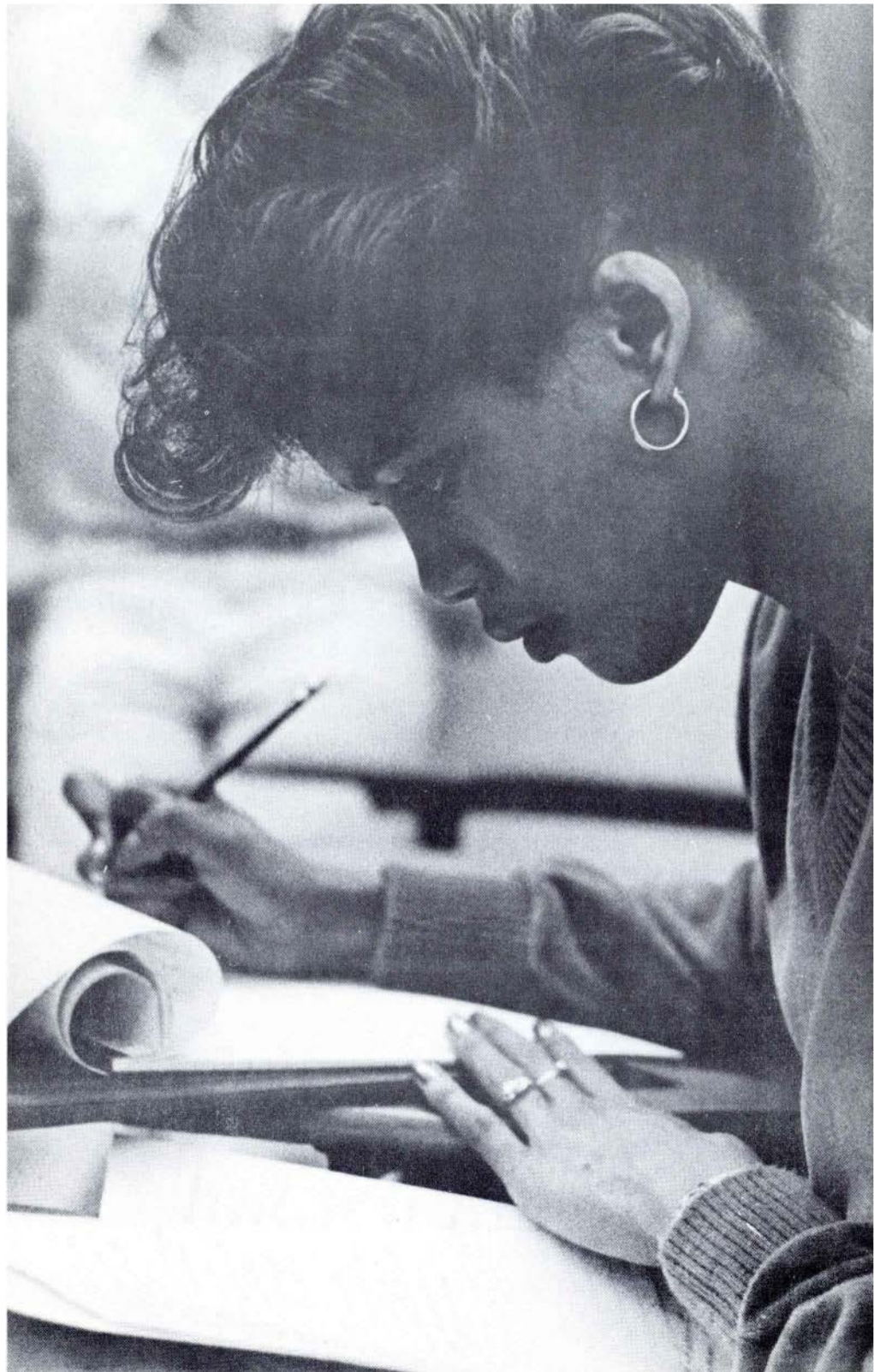
Small, warm and friendly, Lindenwood buzzes with activity outside the classroom. After class it's easy to fit into a group doing something you like.

Admission Requirements at Lindenwood

Each undergraduate applicant must have completed sixteen academic units in high school or its equivalent; four units in English; the remainder in a foreign language, science, mathematics, social sciences and electives. SAT's or ACT's should be taken no later than January of the senior high school year.

Credit or placement is given for scores of 3 or higher on the Advanced Placement tests of the College Entrance Examination Board. Credit is also given for CLEP examinations. Transfer students should make sure that transcripts from all colleges attended are forwarded to the Admissions Office.

Lindenwood admits qualified students without regard to sex, race, color, national or ethnic origin, or handicap.

You might have a question about admission to Lindenwood. Remember that we consider each person as a whole when considering

Financial Aid: How To Get It

Students who cannot meet their entire college expense, but show academic promise, may receive assistance in the form of scholarships, grants, loans, campus employment and/or work-study. Most financial aid awards are based on need and scholastic achievement. Each candidate applying for financial aid is required to file the Financial Aid Form (FAF) with the College Scholarship Service or the Family Financial Statement (FFS) of the American College Testing Service. Applicants are also encouraged to apply for the Pell Grant (BEOG). All financial aid applicants from Missouri are required to apply for the Missouri Student Grant.

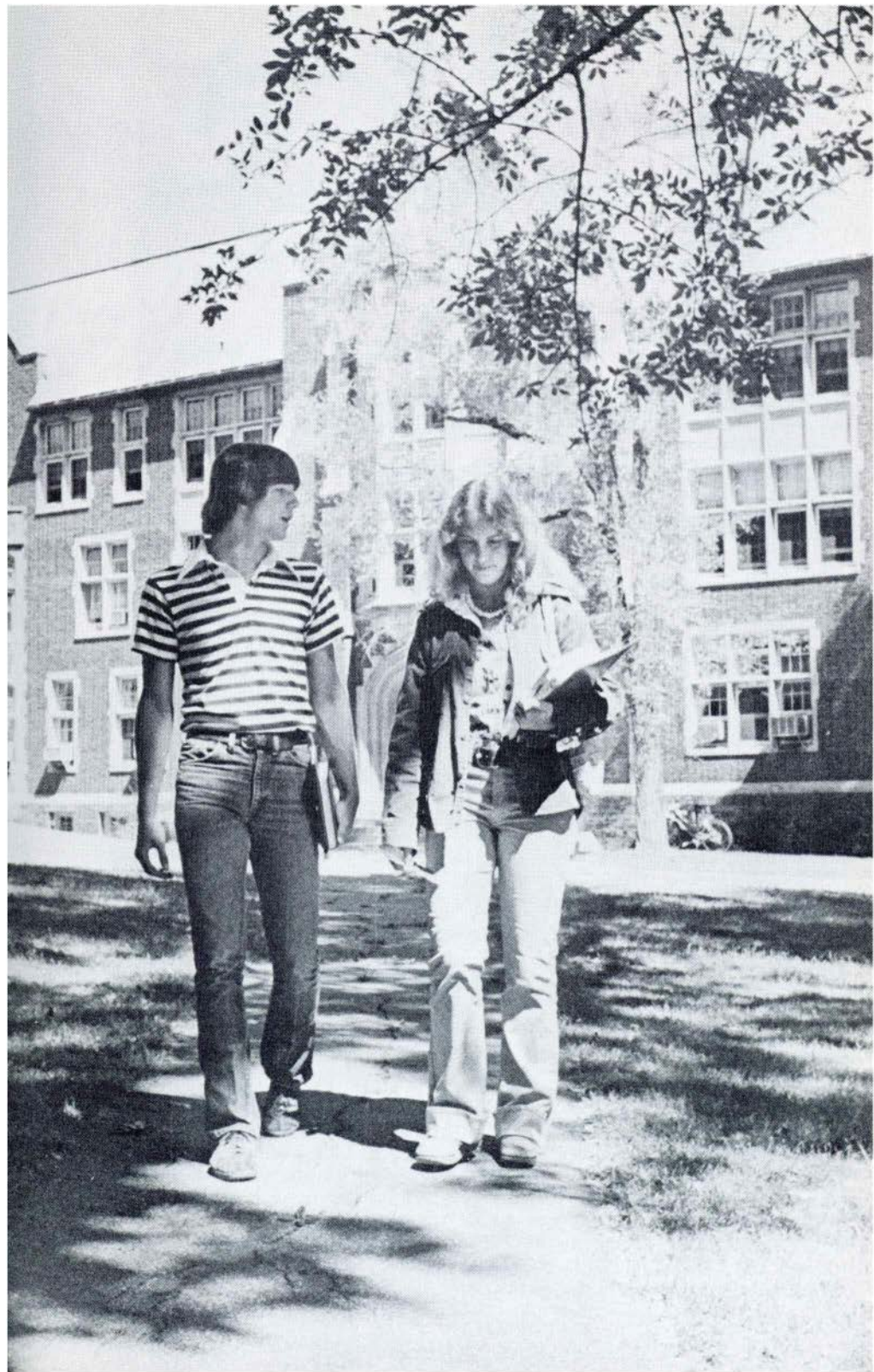

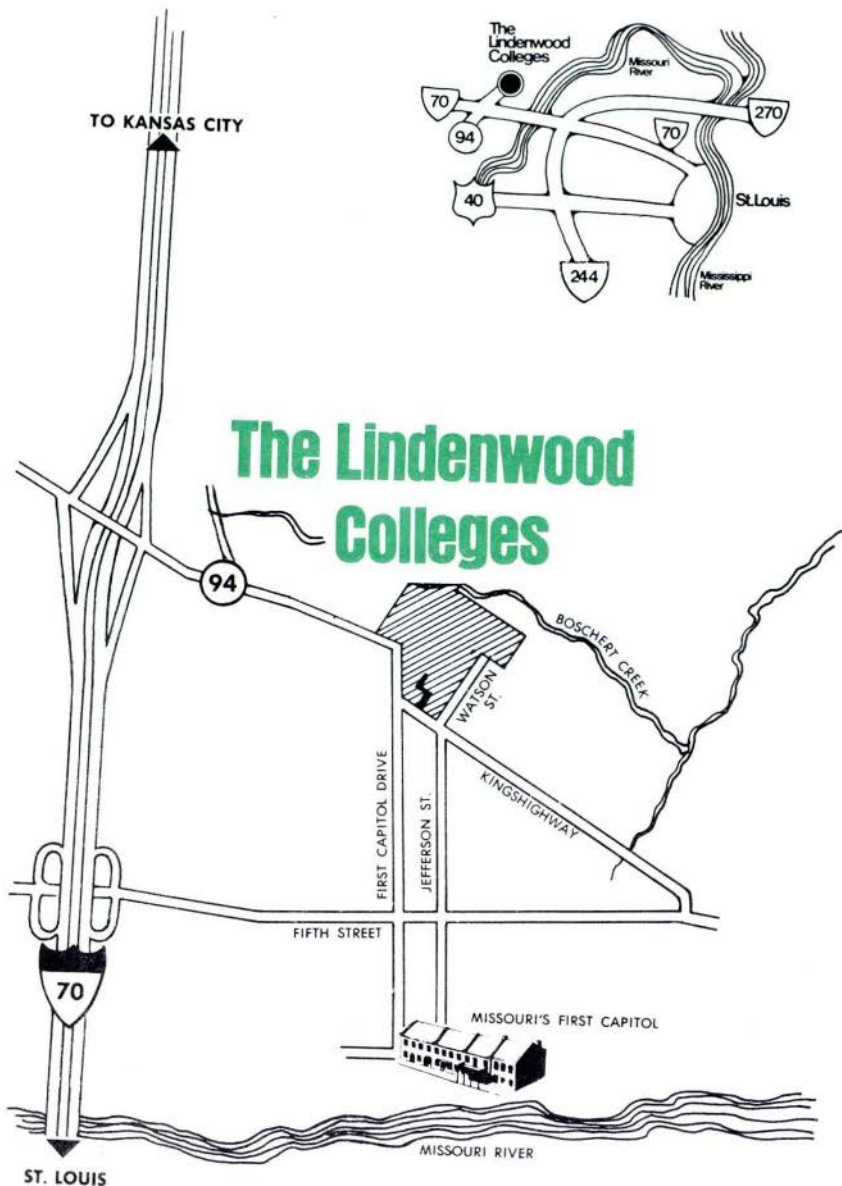

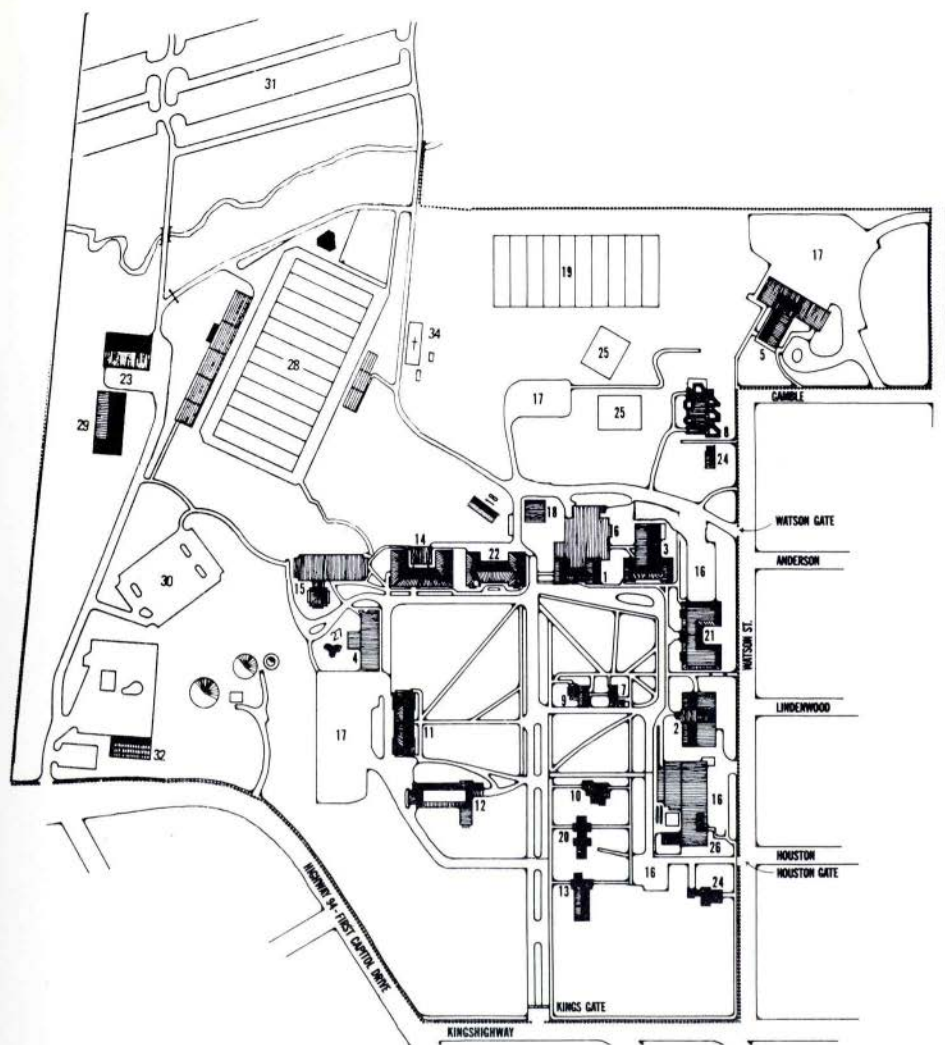


The Lindenwood Colleges

LOCATION

The Lindenwood Colleges are located in the historic city of St. Charles, twenty miles northwest of downtown St. Louis, less than a half-hour's drive via Interstate 70. St. Charles is the gateway to north central Missouri and was established by Louis Blanchette in 1769. Lewis and Clark departed from here on their epic expedition into the northwest.

Missouri's first capitol building on Main Street in St. Charles has been restored as part of a planned redevelopment of the city's historical area. Both of Missouri's legislative houses convened here from 1821 to 1826. The Lindenwood campus is fifteen minutes from St. Louis International Airport.
