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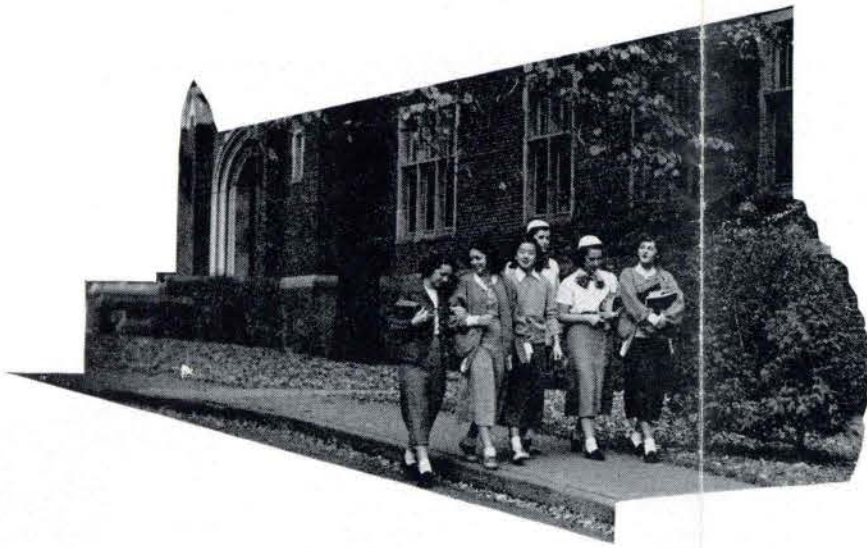

Since the time it was founded in a log cabin in 1827 by Mrs. George Sibley, Lindenwood has been in continuous operation and has grown into one of the nation's strong colleges for women.

The College is located at St. Charles, Missouri, a prosperous community of 15,000 just north and west of St. Louis. St. Charles is located on the main line of the Wabash and Missouri-Kansas-Texas Railroads. U. S. Highway 40 and Missouri Highway 94 pass through the town. Major bus lines run through the city and the Lambert-St. Louis Airport is six miles from the College. Busses may be chartered for group trips into St. Louis at any time.

Art museums and centers of culture and music in the city are easily accessible and open to Lindenwood students, and many attend the symphony, concerts, and plays which are brought to St. Louis.



A COLLEGE FOR WOMEN

Lindenwood is a college for women. It is believed that a program of study designed to meet the needs of a young woman can be best developed where her needs are the sole consideration. On the campus and in the classroom, students are drawn closer to the teacher and to the subject in hand where all the students are women.

The college seeks to create in the classroom and in the campus community a situation in which students will acquire the personal resourcefulness of the cultured woman, the keen conscience of the Christian citizen, and, in some areas, a specialized vocational competence.

FACULTY

A competent faculty composed of men and women who have had graduate training in the better graduate schools of America and Europe has been selected on the basis of excellence in scholarship, ability in teaching and counseling, and desire to teach in a college where personal and friendly relations with the students are the rule.

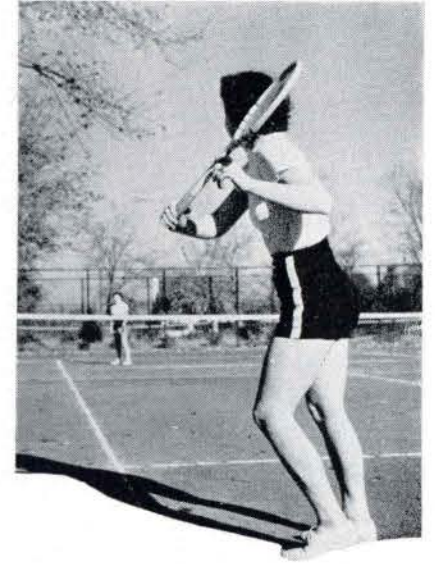
ACCREDITING

The college is accredited by the highest regional and national accrediting associations.

UNUSUAL FEATURES

Some unusual features in the Lindenwood program enrich the service it gives to students.

1. The discovery that nine of every ten graduates over a ten year period were married within a few years after graduation led to a careful study of a curriculum related to the tasks of home-making and responsible citizenship. The tradition of requiring six to ten courses in a major department for all candidates for a degree was abandoned in this study. Selected courses in the Departments of Psychology, Sociology, Economics, History and Government, and Philosophy and Religion are required. These courses give the students the fundamental and basic understandings desirable for most effective lives as home-makers and citizens.
2. A successful partnership between liberal and vocational education has long been maintained at Lindenwood so that its graduates have had the opportunity to acquire a skill for a particular task as they become acquainted with the basic values of the liberal arts.
3. Student government in the dormitories and in the college community is a source of pride to the student body and provides opportunity for the development of a sense of responsibility on the part of students. Young women are made ready for the responsibilities of mature citizens not by reaching the chronological age of twenty-one but by having the experience of responsibility. The College provides this experience.



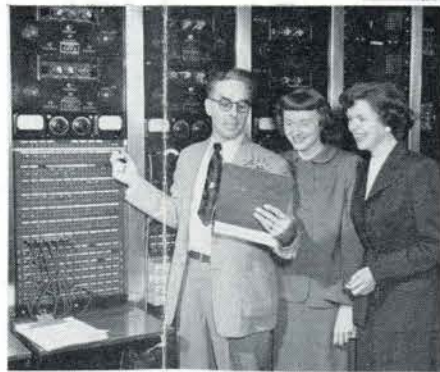

THE STUDENT BODY

The students come from practically every state in the union and from about twelve foreign countries. The character of this student body is one of the chief assets of the college. The friendliness of the students is a source of strength to every member of the student body and noticed at once by every visitor.

The student community is not only a happy one, it is one of worthy achievement. For example, one of the Class of 1950 has had a painting accepted by the Midwest Art Show in Wichita, Kansas. Of the twenty-six top stories in the "Atlantic Monthly" contest for 1948 and 1949 for college students, two are by Lindenwood students. The Lindenwood chapter of the Future Teachers of America recently received an award as the banner chapter in the country, and in the Young Artists' Concert Series sponsored by the Women's Committee of the St. Louis Symphony one-third of the finalists for the last several years have been Lindenwood students.

Of the fifty-five members of the graduating class in 1949, eleven went on to graduate schools for further study. Three were on fellowships and two on graduate assistantships. Nineteen are teaching and fourteen are employed in various other occupations. All who sought employment through the Lindenwood Placement Service are employed.

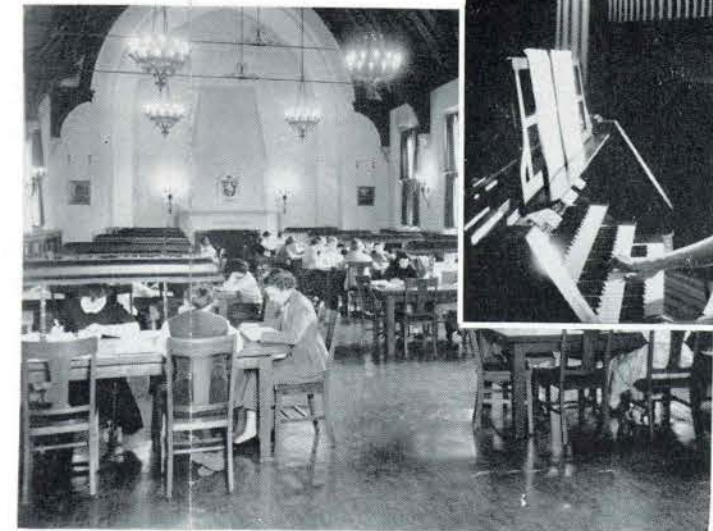

CHAPEL AND VESPERS

The College is sponsored by the Synod of Missouri of the Presbyterian Church, U.S.A. In the classroom and in the community it seeks to stand for a Christian philosophy of life. It is not, however, sectarian. In its worship services and in its vesper services Sunday evenings for the students and faculty there is a cultivation of the spirit of worship on the basis of the great beliefs which Christians hold in common. Guest speakers for the vesper services include leading ministers of various communions represented in the student body.

STUDENT GUIDANCE AND PLACEMENT SERVICE

The ratio of one teacher to every eight students makes possible careful attention to individual differences and individual needs. An adequate counseling program under the Office of Guidance and Placement is one of the strong features of the college. Each student has a faculty advisor who counsels with her many times during the year on both academic and personal matters. Vocational guidance is in the hands of an expert in this field. It is given on the basis of information obtained from psychological and aptitude tests and from close acquaintanceship with students. The Placement Office seeks employment for any graduate of the college who asks for its services.

ENDOWMENT AND EQUIPMENT

Lindenwood College is well established. It is operated without debt and each year makes an investment in each student by using income from the college endowment. This year, for example, the college is spending from the income from endowment \$500 per student more than the income from students. Income from endowment provides for about 27% of the total expenditures.

The campus consists of one hundred and forty acres. Among the eighteen college buildings on these beautiful grounds are six attractive residence halls, Roemer Administration Building, Margaret Leggatt Butler Library Building, the Lillie P. Roemer Fine Arts Building, and the Student Health Center. A tea room with soda fountain is operated in Cobbs Hall for the entire student body. A Home Management House for the use of students majoring in home economics is located on the campus.

VOCATIONAL DEPARTMENTS

A strong feature of the College is the effective partnership between liberal and vocational education in a number of areas. Vocational training is given in the fields of secretarial work, office management, education, home economics, physical education, radio, social service, art, music, lay work in religion, and camp counseling. Pre-professional training is available in the fields of medicine, nursing, law, medical technology, and social service, and preparation for graduate study in all liberal arts areas.

RECREATIONAL FACILITIES

A gymnasium adequate for basketball, volleyball, badminton, ping pong, and dancing, a private golf course, all weather tennis courts, a swimming pool, archery range, riding paddock, and hockey field give opportunity for a well rounded physical education and recreational program.

EXPENSES

The Board of Directors of Lindenwood College has been alive to the responsibilities of the college to the community in which it is located and has authorized a special tuition charge for students who come to classes from their homes of \$350 per year. Day students who take advantage of this low rate may have their luncheons in the college dining room for \$100 for the year. For these students there will be an extra charge for private lessons in music, and in art, and for instruction in horse-

back riding. A day student who qualifies for a Lindenwood honor scholarship as described on page 117 of the catalog is eligible to receive such a scholarship.

Students in the community who wish to live in a college dormitory are, of course, welcome. The cost for a boarding student is \$1,350 per year and for these students there is no extra charge for private lessons in music or in art. There is a charge for instruction in horseback riding.

In addition to honor scholarships valued at \$200, a few scholarships have been created by friends of the college for the assistance of worthy young women and there are a number of opportunities for employment on campus jobs.

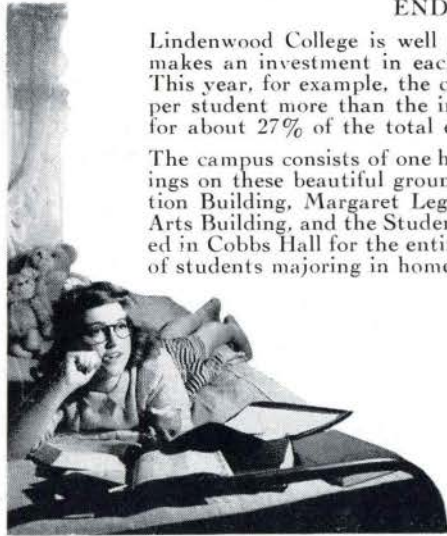
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AN INVITATION

ADMISSIONS PROCEDURE

Lindenwood College invites application for admission from young women whose scholastic rank is within the upper three-fourths of their graduating classes. A deposit of \$10.00 must accompany the application of a day student, and a deposit of \$20.00 must accompany the application of a boarding student. The deposit is not an extra charge but is applied on tuition when the student enters. Early reply to application for admission will be given those who file a transcript of their credits for their first seven semesters in high school. Application form and complete catalog describing all courses offered, together with other information, will be mailed upon request directed to the Admissions Office.
