

New Alumnae Secretary and Public Relations Director

A LUMNAE and friends of Lindenwood will be happy to learn that Mrs. Mary O. Bryant, of St. Louis, has accepted appointment as Director of Public Relations and Executive Secretary of the Alumnae Association at Lindenwood College.

Mrs. Bryant is well prepared for the work that she will undertake at Lindenwood. She is a graduate of the University of Indiana and holds a master's degree in English from the University of Pennsylvania. She did some work beyond her master's at Cornell University and did some part-time teaching at Cornell University. For five years she was a member of the faculty of the New York State College at Albany during which time she became co-author of a high school English textbook.

Since 1937 she has been a resident of St. Louis where her husband, Dr. Donald O. Bryant, has been

a professor of English and speech at Washington University. During the early war years she was an instructor at the university and for the past seven years has been on the staff of the St. Louis *Star-Times*. At the time the paper ceased publication, she was on leave of absence in Europe.

Mrs. Bryant has been active in the work of the League of Women Voters, having been President of the University City league and of the Missouri state league. She is a gifted and competent person and will be in charge of news releases and stories and publicity in general, including the Lindenwood Bulletin, and will do the alumnae work carried on so well by Miss Hankins for many years. Her freedom to leave the campus and contact alumnae groups will enable her to help in the formation of new alumnae clubs. We are confident that her work will constitute a great service to the College.

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Miss Marjorie Hiller Gives Founders' Day Address

Luncheon for the Alumnae and Pilgrimage to the Graves of Major and Mrs. Sibley
Are Other Highlights of the Annual Observance

TRIBUTE to Major George C. Sibley and his wife, Mary Easton Sibley, who founded Lindenwood in St. Charles 124 years ago, was paid at the annual Founders' Day observance on the campus on October 18. The Founders' Day address was delivered at a convocation in Roemer Auditorium by Miss Marjorie Hiller, professor of English at Bishop Otter College, Chichester, England. Miss Hiller, an exchange professor at Lindenwood this year, took as her subject, "The Education of Women."

"Since coming to the United States," Miss Hiller said, "I have been making interesting comparisons of your country and its educational institutions with what we have in England. I could not fail to be impressed with Lindenwood College, with its rich heritage from the past, and with its accent on the future. You owe a great debt to Major and Mrs. Sibley, whose vision and devotion established this college for women 124 years ago, just six years after Missouri was admitted to the Union.

"I am impressed with the democracy in American colleges, which is typified on this campus, and I cannot help but feel that it is one of the reasons why America is today a virile nation. I am impressed with your training in fellowship—the fellowship of those who care. I have been impressed with the ambitious scope of your colleges and universities. What you as alumnae and as students of Lindenwood have today is indeed a rich heritage.

"There have been other first impressions of America which stand out in my first weeks in this country—the beauty of the American scene, your strong local pride, the power of America's industrial might as expressed in your cities. These things are overwhelming to a visitor; perhaps they are to the individual American.

"The differences between Americans and Englishmen are many, but they are merely superficial. We have much we can teach each other; straight thinking, love of our fellow men, the power of the spirit. One thing I am certain of is that we share more than a common language and a common culture. We share a common sense of destiny."

Dr. Franc L. McCluer, president of Lindenwood, presided at the convocation. At noon there was a luncheon for the alumnae and guests in Ayres Hall, which was followed by the annual pilgrimage to the graves of the founders on the campus.

Founders' Day Speaker

Lindenwood was founded in 1827, just six years after Missouri was admitted to the Union. The institution has grown to become one of the outstanding colleges for women in the nation. Major Sibley died in 1863. His wife, who was affectionately known to her students as "Aunt Mary," died in 1878.

News From and About the Class of 1943

This month we begin the roll call of the class of 1943!

Lt. Betty G. Proctor AM 2363, 1600th Medical Group MATS, Westover Air Force Base, Westover, Mass.: "It is with pleasure that as president of the Class of '43 I report on myself. Sitting in my room way up in Massachusetts tonight, Lindenwood seems so far away, but perhaps to homesick soldiers this is always true. I entered active duty June 14, 1943, was commissioned April 10, 1945, and returned to civilian life in January, 1946. Most of the time between then and Oct. 13, 1950, when I was recalled for active duty (this time with the Air Force), was spent with the Veterans Administration in St. Louis as a Staff Physical Therapist. At Westover I find myself chief P.T. of my department with six enlisted men to supervise. We are busy giving 75 to 80 treatments per day. It is much better to be busy for time goes faster. For this I am grateful. When I left Lindenwood little did I guess I'd fight two wars and that the class of 1943 would be called upon to report during my second tour of duty. My debt to Lindenwood can never be repaid nor to those of the faculty who had the task of helping to guide me."

Louise Pankey (Mrs. Derek S. Rooke), La Grange, Tenn.: "I left Lindenwood as a bride of four months. During the following six months I cut enough red tape to clog the Mississippi, and was on my way to England to join my British husband and to meet my new relatives. I was received royally! During the four years we lived in England, I saw parts of Scotland, Southern and Northern England, and had a short stay in Northern Ireland. Each place was different, with a beauty all its own, and war damage, blackout and shortages certainly did not dim the spirit or humour of the British people. In 1945 Virginia Ann Rooke was born, and when she was 14 months old we came back to Tennessee for a short visit. In 1947 we welcomed Byron Christopher Rooke to our family, and in March 1948 we sailed once again for the United States—this time for permanent residence."

Jean McMurry (Mrs. Charles J. White), 1001 Jackson St., St. Charles: "Six hours after I arrived home from Lindenwood in June, 1943, I had a wonderful job offered me by the Director of Recreation in Oklahoma City's Douglas Aircraft Plant. I worked there as private secretary for two years. In 1945 I was married to Major Charles J. White of Kingston, New York. We have one son Charles II, 4½ years. My husband is back in the service and is again in charge of Communications at Alexandria, La. I am

happy that my father, F. G. McMurry, is again connected with dear, old L. C."

Roena Ott (Mrs. Edwin Hoffman), 965 Collier Place, St. Charles: "After graduation from Lindenwood I was employed by wartime industries in the St. Louis area and after victory, by the Monsanto Chemical Company, St. Louis, Mo. Edwin and I were married December 24, 1946 soon after his return from overseas duty in Europe. Highlights of our lives have been planning and building our new home, and the birth of our son, Mark, who was 2 years old last March."

Gloria Omohundro (Mrs. J. E. Palmer), 3192 Crump St., Memphis, Tenn.: "On graduation day I left Missouri to join my husband, a pilot in the Marine Corps, in San Diego, Calif. Since that time my life has been one of traveling. We have lived in California, North Carolina, Tennessee, and Esingtao, China. On the voyage to China we spent several days in Hawaii, Guam, and Japan. The ten months spent in China proved to be most interesting. We have a son John, 4 years old, and the great interest of our lives."

Anne Leverenz (Mrs. G. L. Freeland), 605 Poplar St., Michigan City, Ind.: "During my last year at Lindenwood, I took the extension course in drafting. After school I became a junior draftsman in the engineering department of a local war industry. Jerry and I were married in May, 1945. We lived in Chicago, where our son was born in April, 1947. Girl of the Month

WE PRESENT Mrs. Jo Ann O'Flynn Gipe of Owensboro, Ky.

"Graduation in June, 1949, concluded or climaxed four wonderful years at L. C., but at the same time was the beginning (almost) of a different learning experience. The day before graduation I received a letter which stated that my application to study medical technology at Henry Ford Hospital in Detroit had been accepted and I should report not later than July 1. So, after a brief vacation, I moved to my new home, actually the sixth floor of the Clara Ford Nurses' Home.

All of my training was carried out at the hospital, and graduate credit was received through Wayne University of Detroit. The course was such that a student spent from two to four months in each of the various laboratories of the hospital—clinical microscopy, tissue pathology, bacteriology, serology, chemistry, blood bank, and basal metabolism. An hour lecture daily accompanied the laboratory work; these lectures in physiology, chemistry, hematology, serology, bacteriology, and metabolism gave us the theory and background for our practical work in the laboratories. Working under the supervision of trained technicians provided invaluable experience for doing routine clinical work—7 hours a day, 5½ days a week.

Notebooks were required for most of the labs; these contained the theories and procedures of the various clinical tests carried out. In addition to completing each laboratory satisfactorily, a thesis or an essay on some related subject was required. The role of the lymphocytes in antibody formation was the subject for my essay; reviewing the literature on the topic proved to be very interesting."

Jo Ann has fulfilled all of the requirements for a Master of Science degree in Medical Technology except the oral examination. She was married in February, 1951, to Fred N. Gipe.
