## EARLY DECISION PLAN

Although most admissions decisions are not made until after the seventh semester, Lindenwood's Early Decision Plan makes it possible for qualified students to obtain action on their application for admission earlier in the year. Students applying under Lindenwood's Early Decision Plan are not limited to a single application, but they are required to submit a statement that Lindenwood College is their first choice, and that, if offered admission, they will attend Lindenwood. The deadline for receipt of Early Decision Plan applications is December 1, and all applicants will be notified by December 21. The successful Early Decision Plan candidate should have taken the Scholastic Aptitude Test no later than July following her junior year.

## REGULAR DECISION

Regular decision candidates are notified of the action taken on their applications as soon as possible after all required information has been received by the Admissions Office. Most decisions are made between the middle of January and the middle of April. Lindenwood College is a subscriber to the Candidates' Reply Date of the College Entrance Examination Board and successful candidates, other than Early Decision, have until May 1, 1968, to accept their offer of admission.

# ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

## Academic Preparation

The applicant is required to present a minimum of 16 academic units; four of which must be in English. The remaining twelve units should be selected from the fields of mathematics, foreign language, science and the social sciences. It is recommended that the student present at least two units of a foreign language. One-half credit is given for each vocational course, such as typewriting, book-keeping, home economics, shorthand. A maximum of two credits will be granted for vocational courses.

## Entrance Examinations

Lindenwood College requires that the applicant take the Scholastic Aptitude Test of the College Entrance Examination Board. The applicant should have completed these tests by January of her senior year.

Achievement tests are recommended but not required of candidates for admission.

## Recommendations

The recommendation of the principal, the headmaster, or the counselor, as

reported on the standard form, is the only recommendation required.

## Personal Interview

Although not required, the personal interview is desirable. The interview provides the student with an opportunity to gain information about Lindenwood that is not readily obtainable in the catalog. Campus visits are encouraged and they are much more meaningful to the candidate when the undergraduates are on the campus and the college is in session.

The Admissions Office is open for interviewing purposes from 9 a. m. until 12 Noon and from 1 p. m. until 4:30 throughout the year, and from 9 a. m. until Noon on Saturdays when the college is in session. The student should make an appointment from ten days to two weeks in advance of a proposed visit. An advance appointment will enable the college to assure prompt attention.

Interviews may be arranged with members of the Lindenwood Admissions Council or with members of the professional admissions staff at selected locations away from the campus for those students who find it impossible to visit the college.
