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Contributions Being Received For Guy C. Motley Fund

*Lindenwood Alumnae Have Given More Than \$5,000 Thus Far to Fund Established
as Memorial to "Uncle Guy," Who Died Last December*

CONTRIBUTIONS are still being received for the Guy C. Motley Memorial Fund, established as a perpetual memorial to Guy Cleveland Motley, a beloved officer of the college for more than 30 years. Mr. Motley, who was secretary of the college and assistant to the president, died unexpectedly last December 27. After his death some of the alumnae suggested that an appropriate memorial to him would be the establishment of a scholarship endowment fund to carry on the type of aid to students he had given so often during his years with the college. On the recommendation of the Lindenwood Alumnae Association, the Board of Directors last January authorized the establishment of the fund. The principal will be held as a perpetual memorial to Mr. Motley and the interest will be used to apply on the tuition or college expenses of worthy young women.

To date, contributions to the fund total \$5,275.49. Contributions from alumnae and friends of the college are solicited for the fund. The list of contributors thus far follows:

Classroom Teachers Hold National Conference on Campus

More Than 450 Attend NEA Workshops on International Relations and Classroom Methods at Two-Week Meeting in July

THE seventh annual national conference of the Department of Classroom Teachers of the National Education Association was held on the Lindenwood campus in July, following the convention of the NEA in St. Louis. More than 450 teachers from all parts of the country attended the two-week meeting, which included lectures, discussions and displays of classroom materials. Two semester hours of graduate or undergraduate credit were offered by the college for teachers who registered for credit courses.

The delegates were housed in the six campus residence halls and were served their meals in the college dining room. The conference sessions were held in Roemer Auditorium. Among those in attendance were approximately 50 teachers from foreign countries.

The conference opened on July 9 with an address of welcome by Philip Wardner, president of the Classroom Teachers, and a vesper service conducted by Dr. Franc L. McCluer, Lindenwood's president. The

first part of the conference was devoted to a workshop on international relations, sponsored jointly by the Classroom Teachers and the NEA's Committee on International Relations. Speakers who addressed the sessions included Miss Dorothy Fosdick, a member of the Policy Planning Staff of the Department of State; William Agar, Chief of the Headquarters Section, Special Services Division of the United Nations; R. Will Burnett, Professor of Education at the University of Illinois; Miss Florence Reynolds, Chief of the Information Section of the Food and Agriculture Organization, and Everett R. Clinchy, President of the National Conference of Christians and Jews.

The international workshop was followed by a two-day discussion of local, state and national problems and by the second week's workshop on classroom teaching. Miss Hilda Machling, Executive Secretary of the Department of Classroom Teachers was in charge of planning the conference.

Lindenwood Graduates Find Careers In Radio

Professional Status of Radio Department Attested by Fact Its Students Are Now Employed in Stations Representing Four Major Networks

THE professional status of Lindenwood's Radio Department is attested by the fact that graduates of the college who majored in radio are now employed in stations affiliated with each of the four major networks in this country. The Radio Department, which is under the direction of Miss Martha May Boyer, offers 22 hours in radio, plus practical instruction through the campus station, KCLC, and apprentice training in St. Louis radio stations. Lindenwood has a chapter of Alpha Epsilon Rho, national radio fraternity, and KCLC is a member of the Intercollegiate Broadcasting System.

A survey made this summer reveals some of the positions in radio now held by Lindenwood graduates. Miss Patricia Stull, of Zeigler, Ill., Class of '49, now has her own 45-minute show over Station WLAC, a CBS station, in Nashville, Tenn. Miss Stull writes the continuity for this show and services her own commercial accounts. The program, a morning headliner on WLAC, has a large audience of women. For several weeks recently, Miss Stull was a replacement on "Garden Gate," a network program heard on 127 stations across the country. Miss Stull was the first manager of KCLC, serving during the 1948-49 college year.

Miss Ruth Ann Ball, of Neosho, Mo., also a member of the Class of '49, is now Record Librarian and secretary to the Program Director of Station KXLW, Clayton, Mo. Previously she was Assistant Manager of the St. Charles Studio of KWRE, Warrenton, Mo., and conducted a daily show "Homemakers' Journal." In January, 1950 she took a position in the Radio Department of the Gardner Advertising Co. in St. Louis.

Mrs. Malcomm Nygren, who was Susie Perry, of Shelbyville, Ind. and attended Lindenwood in 1945-47, is now on the staff of Station WSRK in Shelbyville. She has 11 shows a week, including "Scooter Story, a daily story program for children. Of this program she wrote: "I could never do it, if it hadn't been for my experience at Lindenwood on the "L. C. Theater of the Air."

Miss Lorraine Peck, of Troy, Ohio, Class of '50, has recently joined the staff on Station KWK in St. Louis, which is affiliated with the Mutual Broadcasting Co. Miss Peck has been assigned to the Promotion and Public Relations Department. Previously she was employed by WGB, a radio production firm in St.

Louis. Miss Peck was Program Director of KCLC last year.

Miss Marian Rattner, of Chicago, who attended Lindenwood in 1948-50 and was on the staff of KCLC, is employed as secretary to David Garroway, as executive of the National Broadcasting Co. in Chicago. She wrote: "I've done a little work in the Traffic Department and some in Continuity. My work for Mr. Garroway includes putting together the scripts his writers bring in and being on hand at all his radio and television shows."

Miss Barbara Hencke, of Little Rock, Ark., who attended Lindenwood in 1945-47, in on the staff of Station KGHI, an American Broadcasting Co. station in Little Rock. Her duties include writing continuity, programming, and handling the station's public relations. Miss Hencke participated in the L. C. Theater of the Air, while at Lindenwood.

Miss Sally Joy, of Wauwatosa, Wis., Class of '50, is Lindenwood's first graduate student in radio. Miss Joy has received a graduate assistantship in the School of Mass Communications at the University of Illinois and will study for her Master's degree this fall.

Lucette Stumberg Wins Mu Phi Epsilon Music Contest

Miss Lucette Stumberg, of Austin, Texas, Class of '48, has been announced as the winner of the Mu Phi Epsilon music contest for 1950. The announcement of the award, which carries with it a prize of \$100, was made at the sorority's annual convention in Seattle, Wash. The contest is sponsored by the sorority to encourage study, research and discussion in the field of musicology. In addition to the cash prize, the winner is given a year's student membership in the American Musicological Society.

Miss Stumberg, who was awarded a Lindenwood Fellowship in 1948, chose as the subject of her research "Ernest Krenek; The Twelve-tone Technique and His Four Piano Sonatas." This was also her thesis for the degree of Master of Music, which she received last year at the University of Texas.

It was the second time Miss Stumberg has been honored by Mu Phi Epsilon. Two years ago she was selected to play a piano group during the sorority's convention in Cleveland, Ohio. During the last semester, Miss Stumberg studied with Egon Petri, noted Dutch pianist, now teaching at Mills College, Oakland, Calif.

Girl of The Month

WE present Beverly Wescott Gabrio who received the Lindenwood fellowship for graduate study in 1944. After receiving her A. B. in 1944 from Lindenwood where she majored in biology and chemistry and minored in psychology, Beverly did graduate work in experimental and chemical embryology at Washington University in St. Louis. At the same time she was associated with Dr. Kurt Salamon in the Research Laboratory of the Departments of Neuro-psychiatry and Radiology as research assistant. The research included a study of calcium metabolism and bone formation. They designed a new method for the quantitative determination of calcium and studied the effects of the injection of estradiol (female sex hormone) on the skeletal system of embryonic and adult animals. In addition, experiments were carried out on neurotic and schizophrenic subjects in an attempt to elucidate the mechanism of visual hallucinations induced by mescaline (a drug which causes hallucinations similar to those noted in schizophrenia). The study of this drug was of particular interest since it can be obtained from a certain type of cactus plant and is consumed rather frequently by some of the Indian population during their ceremonial dances. She had the privilege of presenting the preliminary work on mescaline at the meetings of the Federation of the American Societies for Experimental Biology in Chicago in 1947.

In 1946 she was married to W. F. Gabrio, who received his M. D. degree in 1950 from Washington University School of Medicine. In 1947 she became affiliated as Research Associate with the Atomic Energy Project of the University of Rochester, Rochester, New York, in the Department of Radiation Biology. Here again she was associated with Dr. Salamon. While at the university she gave several lectures on calcium metabolism and bone formation. In conjunction with her activities at the Atomic Energy Project, which are in part classified, she did graduate work in Biochemistry at the Medical School of the University of Rochester where she received a Ph. D. degree in Biochemistry in March, 1950. The research for her thesis was concerned with the chemistry of ferritin (an iron-protein compound) as well as the role of ferritin in the absorption and metabolism of iron.
