

WATKINS ASSUMES PART-TIME POSITION - Ed Watkins, vice-president of institutional development, has resigned his full-time position to become president of the National Center for Career Advising, a St. Charles County-based education, training and employment facility. His resignation will become effective September 1, but Watkins will continue to serve Lindenwood on a part-time basis.

Since 1982, Watkins has served as a consultant to the center to which he will assume the presidency. The National Center for Career Advising will establish the Education, Training & Employment Institute which will provide services to metropolitan area businesses and individuals. Watkins, chairman of the St. Peters Industrial Development Board, is recognized as one of the leaders of the country's career development movement of the '70s. He organized the first two national conferences on career development, coining the phrase, "occupational illiteracy," and introduced his "Career Life Advising Model" at nearly 100 college and university campuses throughout the country.

ADMISSIONS OPEN HOUSES - Information on Lindenwood's Master's in Education degree program will be provided today when the Admissions Office conducts an open house at 7 p.m. in Young Hall Lounge.

On Thursday, another open house is scheduled at 7 p.m. in Young to provide details on the LCIE's undergraduate and graduate programs. Information on undergraduate programs in communications, psychology, health administration,
