A CONVENIENT LOCATION

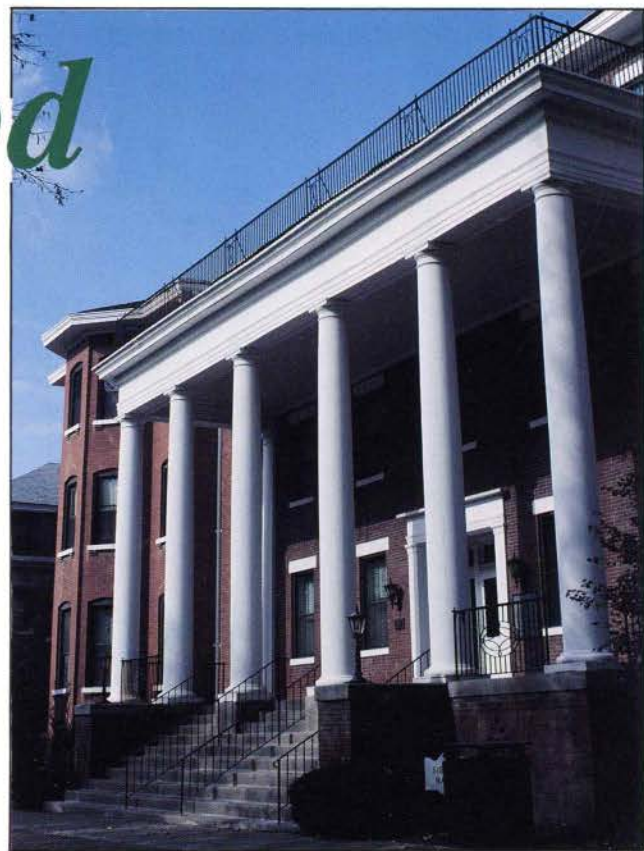
The wooded, 108-acre residential campus is located in St. Charles, Missouri. Just minutes from downtown St. Louis, the area offers a wide range of opportunities for all interests.

Resting on the banks of the Missouri River just below the Mississippi, St. Charles is the site of Missouri's first state capital. The area is rich in state heritage and the history of America's westward expansion.

Lindenwood's convenient proximity to St. Louis creates an abundance of added enjoyment through visits to theme parks, a world class zoo, professional sporting events, Broadway plays and theatre, performances of the highly-acclaimed St. Louis Symphony, state parks and more. St. Louis-Lambert International Airport is just ten minutes from Lindenwood on Interstate 70.

HOUSING AND STUDENT LIFE

At Lindenwood, full-time resident students are housed in six dormitories, two houses, and apartment units for married or graduate students. All residential buildings are located on Lindenwood's wooded campus with quick, easy access to other buildings.



Because the safety and security of all students is the College's concern, policies specify visitation and quiet hours in student life. In addition, Lindenwood College actively promotes an alcohol-free and drug-free campus. Protecting the spiritual and emotional well-being of Lindenwood students is a primary part of the College's mission.

HISTORIC LINDENWOOD

The College's oldest building, Sibley Hall, salutes students daily in remembrance of Lindenwood founders, Major George C. and Mary Easton Sibley. The foresighted planning of the Sibleys in 1827 established the unprecedented development of an independent, liberal arts institution which continues to stand for individualized, personal attention for each student.

Lindenwood is accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools and the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education, and is a member of the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business. The College has a covenantal relationship with the Presbyterian Church and is committed to the values inherent in the Judaeo-Christian tradition. Welcoming students from all religious backgrounds, Lindenwood offers a value-oriented educational experience.

ACADEMIC OPPORTUNITIES

The academic emphasis at Lindenwood College is on an individualized liberal arts education with career oriented

preparation. Students fulfill general education requirements, participate in the College Work and Learn program, assistantships or internships, and acquire an in-depth knowledge of at least one area of study as a major. Lindenwood requires the completion of 120 credit hours to earn a bachelor's degree. Lindenwood College offers Bachelor of Arts degrees with majors in:

Some majors may be offered in day or evening classes only. Please consult the Office of Admissions for specific program information.

Pre-professional courses are offered and Three-Two Programs in engineering and social work are available in conjunction with Washington University. Graduate degrees are also offered in most subject areas.



Traditional day classes are held on a semester calendar, while the Evening College and the Lindenwood College for Individualized Education (LCIE) programs are conducted on a quarter schedule. The Center for Professional and School Counseling follows a trimester schedule.

The Evening College is highly recognized for an outstanding Master of Business Administration (MBA) Program. LCIE offers accelerated classes, and is nationally recognized as a model for adult learning. Students in LCIE earn nine credit hours per quarter in clustered classes that are taught in seminar format.

A CARING FACULTY

A caring faculty in challenging academic programs enhance your general and selected studies. Lindenwood has 75 full-time faculty members of which 55% hold the highest degree in their specific fields. The student-to-faculty ratio is 16:1. Faculty members also serve as advisors to students in their major fields, working with them individually to promote each student's academic success.

ACADEMIC FACILITIES

Margaret Leggat Butler Memorial Library houses approximately 138,500 volumes and subscribes to 650 periodicals, with 30,000 items on microfilm.

Roemer Hall, the main administration building, was dedicated in 1921. It holds the office of the president, academic service offices, classrooms, and faculty offices. Roemer Hall is also home to the 450-seat Jelkyl Theatre.

Young Science Hall, completed in 1966, houses laboratories and classrooms for natural sciences, mathematics, computer science and photography.

Sibley Hall was built in 1860 to replace the original log cabin that served as the first College building. Sibley is listed on the National Register of Historic Sites.

The *Fine Arts Building* provides students with art, music and performing arts studios, classrooms, practice rooms, a recital and lecture hall, the "Downstage" Theatre and the Harry D. Hendren Gallery, which attracts local and national art exhibits.

The *Lillie P. Roemer Memorial Arts Building* houses the campus radio station, KCLC-FM 89.1, and business administration and communication faculty offices with several classrooms and a computer lab.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Applicants are evaluated individually and admission is based on an analysis of the student's grade point average (GPA), ACT or SAT scores, extracurricular activities, recommendations and personal character. Students are admitted without regard to race, sex or national origin.

APPLICATION AND INFORMATION

While admission is on a rolling basis, students are encouraged to apply by August 1 for the fall semester and by December 1 for the spring semester.

To qualify for the full amount of financial aid, students must submit their federal financial aid forms before April 30.



To apply for admission, a student should submit a completed application form with a \$25 non-refundable application fee, ACT or SAT scores and a transcript of high school and/or college work. Notification of the admission decision is mailed promptly after all required materials are received and evaluated by the Director of Admissions.

FINANCIAL AID AND SCHOLARSHIPS

Lindenwood College assists students through numerous financial aid and scholarship packages. On-campus job opportunities are available for qualified full-time students in the College Work and Learn Program. Students in Work and Learn may earn up to \$1,500 per year toward their costs.

For example, more than 60 students currently assist the campus radio station, KCLC-FM 89.1. These students are disc jockeys, news reporters, or any number of other vital assistants to the station's daily operations.

Financial aid and/or scholarships are available to all qualified students. A student must submit the Family Financial Statement of the American College Testing Program, the Financial Aid Form of the College Scholarship Service, or any other federally approved financial evaluation service. As determined by the financial evaluation form, a student's financial need may be met with a combination of federal, state and institutional sources of aid. Institutional awards are available in the areas of academics, leadership, athletics, drama, yearbook/newspaper and music.



SUCCESS FOR LINDENWOOD STUDENTS

Lindenwood College remains committed to the overall development of its students. Combining traditional liberal arts studies with hands-on internship and work experience, Lindenwood students are able to take an active place in the work force upon their graduation.

The College takes pride in its illustrious alumni group who speak strongly in support of the continuing benefits of their liberal arts education at Lindenwood. These successful individuals hold nationally-prominent professions as news anchors; broadcast and print journalists; public relations administrators; vice presidents of major retail, communications and broadcast operations; chairpersons and board members of science and educational organizations; local and state politicians; bank presidents; lawyers; doctors; television producers, and more. College alumni also help Lindenwood students through scholarship fundraisers and advisement.

COMMUNITY SERVICE, LEADERSHIP AND STUDENT ACTIVITIES

Lindenwood student organizations equip participants with skills for community service and leadership. Students serve the St. Charles County and metropolitan St. Louis communities through a variety of programs often related to their academic disciplines. Most notably, the Lindenwood Student Government initiated plans and received approval last year for an exchange with students from the Soviet Union. Lindenwood was the first small college in the Midwest to offer this type of exchange program. Recently, the student government and college alumni held their second annual dinner/auction during reunion weekend. The auction netted \$9,500 for the Lindenwood/Soviet student exchange program.

Lindenwood offers students a wide variety of clubs and organizations for personal growth, leadership, community service, and enjoyment.

Some of the clubs included are: the Education Club, the Psychology Interest Group, the International Student Club, Nexus, Circle K, and the Foreign Culture Club, to name a few. The Lindenwood Student Government (LSG) is made up of representatives elected by the student body. LSG has the responsibility for providing a balanced program of cultural, social and recreational events and activities throughout the year.

In addition, the campus radio station, newspaper and year-book are staffed by students.

LINDENWOOD ATHLETICS

The College's athletic teams compete in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA), Division II. For students interested in athletics, Lindenwood features a women's soccer team that won regional titles and competed in the national tournament for three of the last five years. Other intercollegiate varsity sports include football, men's soccer, women's and men's basketball, cross-country and track, softball, baseball, women's volleyball, wrestling, swimming, and water polo. Intramural athletics are also available in the student center.

The College's Harlen C. Hunter Stadium and Sports Complex houses an artificial-turf field and has a seating capacity of 5,000. A field house is equipped with coaching offices, lockers, a weight room, and classrooms. An outdoor swimming pool behind Cobbs Hall and the Dorothy Warner Indoor Swimming Pool in the Butler Hall Student Center are available to students.

At Lindenwood, your educational, spiritual, and personal growth is regarded as the most important element for successful college life. Because the College believes that Lindenwood students will be tomorrow leaders, it pledges to continue the Lindenwood mission for your success during your college years and beyond the Lindenwood gates.
