#### Scene I.

Triumphant entrance of Thetis, goddess of the sea. She is preceded by creatures of the sea and by her lovely attendants. Following her entrance from the sea, she is discovered by a number of tree nymphs, who gather about her. While all the creatures of nature are adoring their queen, Peleus, a mortal, passes in the distance with his fiery chariot and army. He sees Thetis, who is the central figure in the foreground and leaves his party of mortals to win the hand of this beautiful one in marriage. With his chariot and three steeds he drives to the place where Thetis is. He woos her and wins her love. The Dragon Flies flit away in all directions to invite the gods to the wedding feast. The tree nymphs busy themselves in gathering boughs and blossoms, and building an altar for the wedding ceremony.

#### Scene II.

Nereus and Doris enter with Thetis for the wedding. Nymphs, dragon flies, flute players and torch bearers attend. Hermes announces the arrival of the gods and goddess bearing gifts; Nereus offers the sacrifice. The banquet and libation follow. In the midst of the festivities, Discord, who has not been invited to the wedding, suddenly appears and throws a golden apple among the guests, with the inscription "To the Fairest."

Hera, Aphrodite and Athene claim the apple. Each attempts to win the favor of the judge, and Aphrodite, goddess of love and beauty, wins the prize. After this the wedding ceremony continues. The groom receives his bride from her mother's arm and the bridal procession starts for the home of the groom. Gods, relatives, friends and flute players vie with each other in merry-making at the expense of the bride and groom.
