DANCE DRAMA

The Cycle of the College Years

In the dance drama "The Cycle of the College Years," the College Girl is carried through her four years of school. Her first hazy dreams of college life enter from the distance portrayed by nymphs dancing with scarfs.

The College Girl enters the land of her dreams with mingled joy, expectation and bewilderment. Her freshman year she mingles with Gay Companions who dance about her. The Three Virtues, Responsibility, Determination and Trutin present themselves to her as companions for her four years but she spurns them and turns back to her Gay Companions. She becomes infatuated with one of them and the others after several attempts to resume friendly relations, leave. When she finds that the one girl is not

all-sufficient she turns to the others, but it is too late to regain their friendship.

Her Sophomore year she is dominating as shown by the fact that she drives her companions ahead of her. The virtues again enter and plead with her to accept their companionship but the call of her Sophomore companions dominates and she drives the virtues away.

Her Junior year she turns to society for her main activity. She and her companions appear as social butterflies. The virtues present themselves to her again but are again sent away. The butterflies play with the fire of self-conceit, their wings are singed and they die.

She enters into school activities her Senior year. Athletics and Y. W. C. A. are represented in dance form. Realizing that she must leave school and go into the world of service, she turns to look into the prism to find what the future offers. There she sees the calls of the world of which the home, foreign missions, and starving Europe are shown in dance. She then realizes the true value of the three virtues for a life of service and calls them back to lead her into the outside world.
