EDUCATION ENROLLMENT INCREASE - Lindenwood's graduate program in education has shown nearly a 50% increase in enrollment this semester as compared to last fall's. Currently, there are 105 students in the master's program, with 78 taking classes this semester, reports Gene M. Henderson, Ed.D., department chairman and director of graduate programs. A breakdown of graduate students shows most are from St. Charles County schools as well as districts in Franklin, Jefferson, Lincoln, St. Louis and Warren counties. Henderson attributed the increases in graduate enrollment to Lindenwood's scholarship assistance and tuition reduction programs for teachers and to the college's recent accreditation by the National Council for the Accreditation of Teacher Education for its graduate programs as well as its undergraduate degrees.
