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Lindenwood Adds Another "First" To Its Professional Radio Program

Apprenticeship Training in St. Louis Radio Stations Permit Students to Study Operation of Commercial Network Stations — Three Seniors Complete Work at KMOX

LINDENWOOD's professional courses in Radio now include two weeks of practical training in St. Louis radio stations. Cooperating with the Radio Department in providing the seminars for Seniors is Station KMOX, one of the key stations in the Columbia Broadcasting System.

The seminars, an innovation in the college's expanding Radio program, supplement the professional training afforded by KCLC, "The Voice of Lindenwood." The apprenticeships were arranged by Miss Martha May Boyer, head of the Radio Department under a plan approved by Wendell Campbell, manager of KMOX, and Miss Carlotta Wetmore, the station's educational director. The apprenticeships enable the students to observe at first hand the work of all departments of the station and to receive instruction from the station's staff in the varied activities of a commercial network station.

Three members of the staff of KCLC successfully completed their seminars this spring. Miss Patricia Stull, and Miss Mary Lou McNail, both of Zeigler, Ill., completed their apprenticeships in April. Miss Stull was manager of KCLC for the 1948-49 college year. Miss McNail was secretary and treasurer of the campus chapter of Alpha Epsilon Rho. Miss Ruth Ann Ball, of Neosho, Mo., who was engineer for KCLC, served her apprenticeship from June 1 to 15. All are members of the Class of '49.

During the seminars the students received training in station management, programming and production. Among the KMOX departments in which the students worked were programming, sales, publicity, continuity, production, music, traffic, and engineering. They attended general planning sessions of KMOX department heads on station policies and procedures. All three students were interviewed on the Curt Ray programs. They observed the production of live shows in the studios and accompanied staff members on remote pick-up assignments. Miss Stull interviewed Al Bland, the program director, and the interview was later broadcast over KCLC.

KMOX has long been a pioneer in radio education. The establishment of the seminars, which will be continued this year for advanced radio students from Lindenwood, marks another "first" for the station and for the college. Mr. Campbell has expressed his satisfaction with the results of the apprenticeship training. His approval is shared by other executives of the station. One of them in a letter to Miss Boyer wrote:

"Having had considerable contact with these stu-

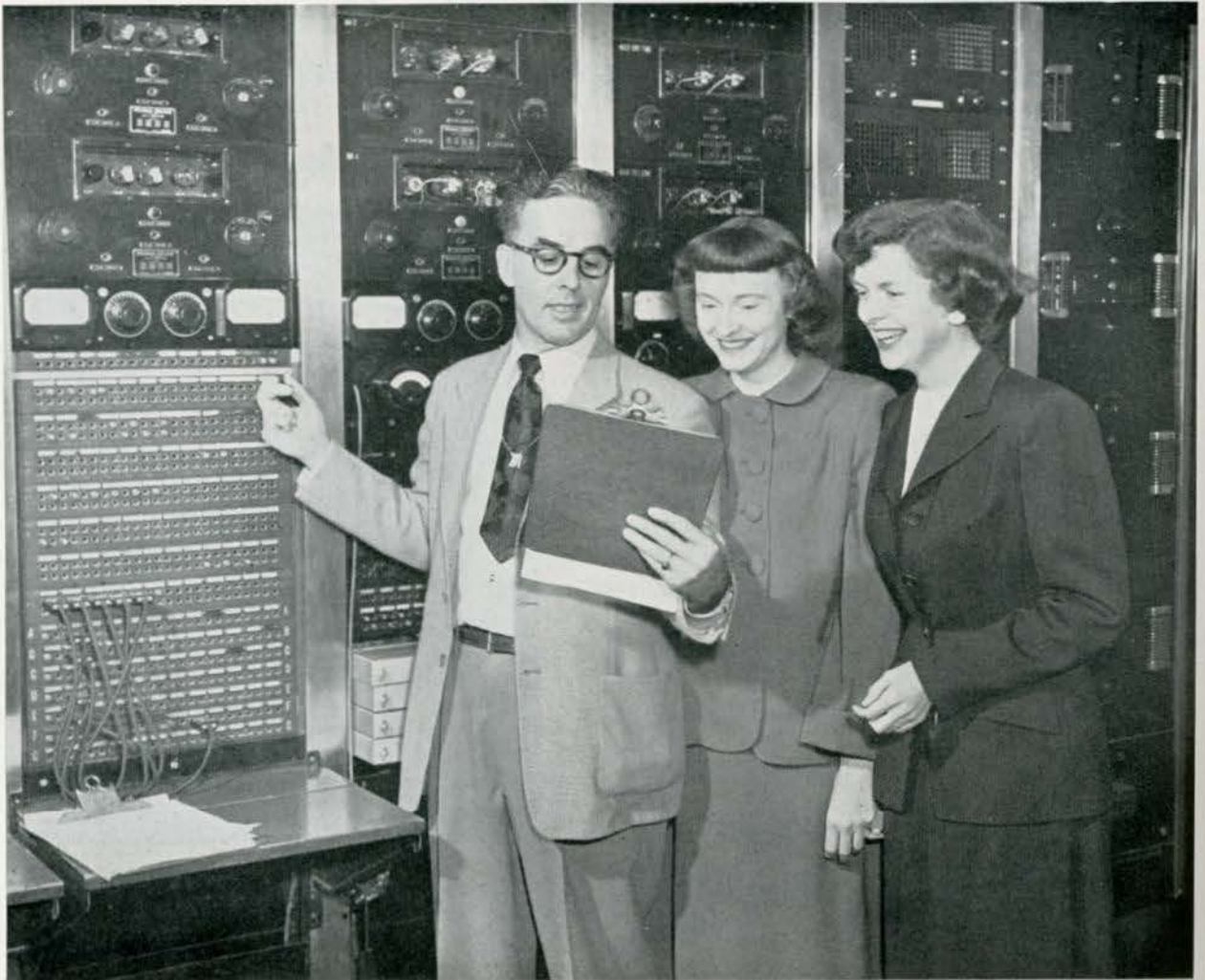
dents during their training period, I believe they will make a real contribution to the business world of radio if they follow their plans. They certainly reflect great credit upon you, your college and the training they received there."

Miss Patricia Underwood, a Lindenwood Sophomore, reviewed Paton's "Cry the Beloved Country" for the April program. Her review was read on the air by Lambert Kaiman, KMOX announcer.

Miss Barbara Watkins, of Oklahoma City, who received a Bachelor of Music degree at commencement, will serve her apprenticeship this month at Station KFUE. This seminar was arranged by Elmer Knoernschild, program manager of the station. The emphasis will be on music and most of Miss Watkins' work will be done under the supervision of Music Director Edward Schoenlieber.

Lindenwood Will Open Its 123rd Year On September 13

Faculty Conference To Precede Return of Students to the Campus and Full Program of Tests and Fun Is Planned Until Classes Are Organized on September 19

LINDENWOOD will begin its 123rd year on September 14 when the students return to the campus. The Upper Class Counselors will arrive early and will be ready to help orient new students. Freshmen and all other students have been asked to report on September 13 to be prepared to begin the Orientation Program, which is scheduled to start at 9 a.m. on September 14.

A full program of social events is planned for the orientation period, including "Fun Hours," a street supper, and "dorm" parties. President McCluer will welcome the new students at a convocation in Roemer Auditorium and there will be an informal faculty reception in the Fine Arts parlors.

A two-day faculty conference will precede the opening of school, beginning on September 12. Registration will be held on September 16 and 17 and classes will be organized on September 19.

Meanwhile work is progressing rapidly on the new residence hall being erected on the campus and a number of improvements have been made. The Library Club Room has a new floor of asphalt tile and the exterior of the Library has been painted. The bank in Roemer Hall has been remodeled and office space provided for Robert C. Colson, the college's new business manager. A contract has been let for improvements to the Student Health Center and plans are being made to construct an indoor riding arena.

WE ARE HAPPY to present Miss Frances Marie McPherson of Richmond, Ky., as The Girl of the Month.

Miss McPherson was graduated from Lindenwood in 1934, receiving a B.M. Degree. She spent the following year as an active participant in Junior League Children's Theater in her home town, St. Joseph, Mo. There she composed the music for an original children's opera. She performed vocally and pianistically for local music clubs. She gave a voice recital at Tarkio College.

She spent a winter in New York "studying and trying to become famous overnight." She was soloist in an "unfamous" way, so she says, at the Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church.

In 1937 she returned to St. Joseph and for the next three years, continued to work with the Children's Theater. She played the Schuman Concerto in the spring for a music festival; she composed the music for a Little Theater Revue; she became contralto soloist in a quartet choir at the First Presbyterian Church; she sang the role of Pitti Sing in a huge civic production of "The Mikado" in St. Joseph's large outdoor amphitheater; and, with seven other musicians, she formed a Concert Ensemble, travelling to nearby towns and presenting concerts.

In 1941 she started teaching private piano lessons. She was official demonstrator of the then new Solovox. She gave piano concerts in St. Joseph and at Tarkio College. Then she went to East Lansing, Mich., and obtained her M.M. Degree in piano at Michigan State College, studying with Frank Mannheimer. There she was official accompanist for the head of the voice department, and visiting artists while there.

In 1943 she was head of the music department at Tarkio College, teaching theory, chorus and piano. A

year later she joined the piano faculty at Florida State College for Women in Tallahassee, where she gave a two-piano recital with another member of the faculty. In 1944, she joined the faculty of Eastern Kentucky State Teachers' College at Richmond, Ky., as an associate professor of piano. She has given recitals in Berea, Paris, and Lexington, Ky. She has written several small pieces for violin and piano, and for string trios. She belongs to two music clubs, which membership entails active participation twice a month. She gives solos, vocally every once in a while at the different churches. She gives two piano concerts a year, preparation for which, she says, gives her plenty of practicing to do, plus her 26 hours a week teaching schedule.
