PRESIDENT TO LEAD COMMITTEE - President James I. Spainhower has been named chairman of a campaign committee that will promote passage of three issues facing St. Charles voters in the November 5 election. Composed of civic and business leaders, the committee is promoting approval of monthly user fee for residences and businesses for storm water control projects; for a half-cent sales tax to improve city streets; and for a flat \$6 auto license sticker fee payable on personal property billings.

The three issues "are essential to the progress of St. Charles and must be addressed sooner or later," Spainhower said, "and have a direct benefit on the city as well as Lindenwood College." He urges all faculty and staff members who are city residents to support the measures, which require a simple majority vote for passage.
