

TWO EXECUTIVES ELECTED TO BOARD - Richard L. Battram, vice-president of the May Department Stores Co., and Clayton Wilhite, chairman of D'Arcy MacManus Masius, have been elected to the Lindenwood College Board of Directors.

A graduate of Butler University in Indianapolis, Battram formerly was president and chief executive officer of Famous-Barr in St. Louis before being named to the May position in 1984. Active in his community and profession, he serves on a number of boards, including the Arts and Education Council, the Regional Commerce and Growth Association, St. Louis Children's Hospital and the St. Louis Symphony. He and his wife, Patricia, have three sons and are residents of St. Louis County.

A 1967 graduate of the University of Michigan, Wilhite played football for the the Wolverines and in the 1965 Rose Bowl. He became D'Arcy MacManus Masius' top executive in St. Louis earlier this year after serving as marketing director for Young and Rubicam-London. He took a leave of absence from the advertising industry in 1976 to serve as an executive in President Gerald R. Ford's reelection campaign. Wilhite is a member of the Media Club, the Civic Entrepreneurs and the Advertising Club of Greater St. Louis. He and his wife, Ann, are residents of St. Louis County.



MIDWEST PHOTOGRAPHY EXHIBITION - Lindenwood is one of four locations in the country that will present the Midwest Photography Exhibition, representing 37 photographers from the Midwest Region of the Society for Photographic Education. The exhibit will be shown November 6-December 6 at the Hendren Gallery in the FAB. Hours are from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays and from 1-4 p.m. on weekends. A reception is scheduled from 2-4 p.m. November 10 at the gallery. The exhibit and the reception are open to all faculty, staff and students without charge.

COLLEGE RECEIVES STATE GRANT - Lindenwood has received a \$22,440 grant from the Missouri Coordinating Board of Higher Education to offer workshops designed to help improve math and science instruction for area elementary and secondary education teachers. Workshops will be available to teachers from public and private school districts in Franklin, Lincoln, St. Charles and Warren counties. The grant will be used to pay tuition costs for the estimated 400 teachers attending the workshops, each of whom will receive one semester hour of graduate credit upon completion of the program. Instrumental in securing the funding for the four-county area was Gene M. Henderson, chairman of the Education Dept., who developed the program approved by the Coordinating Board and funded by the U.S. Dept. of Education.
