Traffic Safety Campaign

Driving safely on Lindenwood's campus and understanding the university's traffic and vehicular policies are essential to campus safety. Be informed of requirements, obey laws, and help every member of our campus community stay as safe as possible.

The Department of Public Safety and Security is working to create a campus culture accommodating and respectful of all modes of transportation to ensure the safety of students, faculty, staff, and visitors on campus.

Public Safety recommends the following to achieve this goal:

- Always give driving your full attention: avoid eating, drinking, cellphone use, and other distractions while driving (note: the use of handheld wireless communications devices to send, read, or write a text message is prohibited within the City of St. Charles while operating a moving motor vehicle).
- Do not exceed 15 MPH on campus roads.
- Follow directions from Public Safety officers or police officers who are directing traffic.
- Follow all campus traffic signage: fully stop at stop signs, yield to pedestrians, and follow posted traffic patterns (one-way, etc...).
- Yield to pedestrians at all times (who in turn must only cross the street in a crosswalk).
- Share the road: be mindful of cyclists, skateboarders, scooters, and in-line skaters (who in turn must follow the rules of the road).
- No parking anytime where curbs are painted yellow. Yellow curbs indicate emergency access (fire) lanes only.
- Only park in designated parking spots in lots you are authorized to park in.
- Remember to register your vehicle on StarRez. Parking permits can be picked up free of charge at Public Safety offices, fourth floor of the Spellmann Center.
- Immediately report any accidents or unsafe behaviors to Public Safety (636-949-4911).

Public Safety is adopting a clear and strong set of rules of the road for all modes which can be enacted through education, regulation, and enforcement to raise awareness by taking a proactive approach to reducing accidents on campus.

The Traffic Safety Campaign is a comprehensive, layered, educational campaign for all modes of transportation aimed at establishing expectations for pedestrian, cyclist, and motorist behavior. Elements of the campaign will include enhancing area coordinator and community advisor education in student housing and dorms, use of LUTV for public service announcement and outreach education, as well as use of the Weekly Roar, Golden Roar, and Instagram.

This layered enforcement strategy will consist of information blitzes followed by warning blitzes (no citations) then enforcement blitzes (citations). Representatives from Student Involvement and Student Life and Diversity will be assisting Public Safety with the education piece.

John Wehmer (1927-2019)

Lindenwood University Professor Emeritus of Art John Wehmer passed away on Dec. 30, 2019. Mr. Wehmer was born in St. Louis in 1927. He served in the US Navy during World War II, and on returning studied art at the University of Missouri and Washington University. Mr. Wehmer taught in the Art Department at Lindenwood from 1959 to 1992. He mentored many students and junior faculty members, and his paintings were recognized and exhibited in many locations in the U.S., including the St. Louis Art Museum. He was a part of a thriving arts scene in the mid-20th century and developed a style of abstraction that was expressive and symbolic based on his own experiences. Mr. Wehmer took many Lindenwood



students to Mexico to visit the monuments and artworks there. During the summers, he lived in a cabin in Colorado and painted many naturalistic scenes in the mountain areas.

A memorial service for John Wehmer will be held on Saturday, March 7, from 2 to 5 p.m. at the Lindenwood University Cultural Center (LUCC) at 400 N. Kingshighway, St. Charles, MO 63301

Implicit Bias and Assessment Data: How Can We view Assessment Data through an Equitable Lens?

March 20, 9 to 1 a.m., Harmon Hall, Room 229

What do you see when you look at student outcomes data disaggregated by student characteristics? During this session, Nicole Perry, chair and professor of biology at Oakton Community College, will define unconscious/implicit bias and identify associated assumptions we make about students. These biases and assumptions impact our unconscious actions, understanding, and decisions, even when we look at assessment data. This session will introduce strategies to look at data from an equity lens. In preparation for this session, participants will be asked to complete and reflect upon "tests" as part of Harvard University's Project Implicit. The "tests" and review of implicit data will use demographics that are consistent with the Lindenwood student population. Finally, we will review disaggregated data from a general education assessment that was completed at Lindenwood. Click here to register
