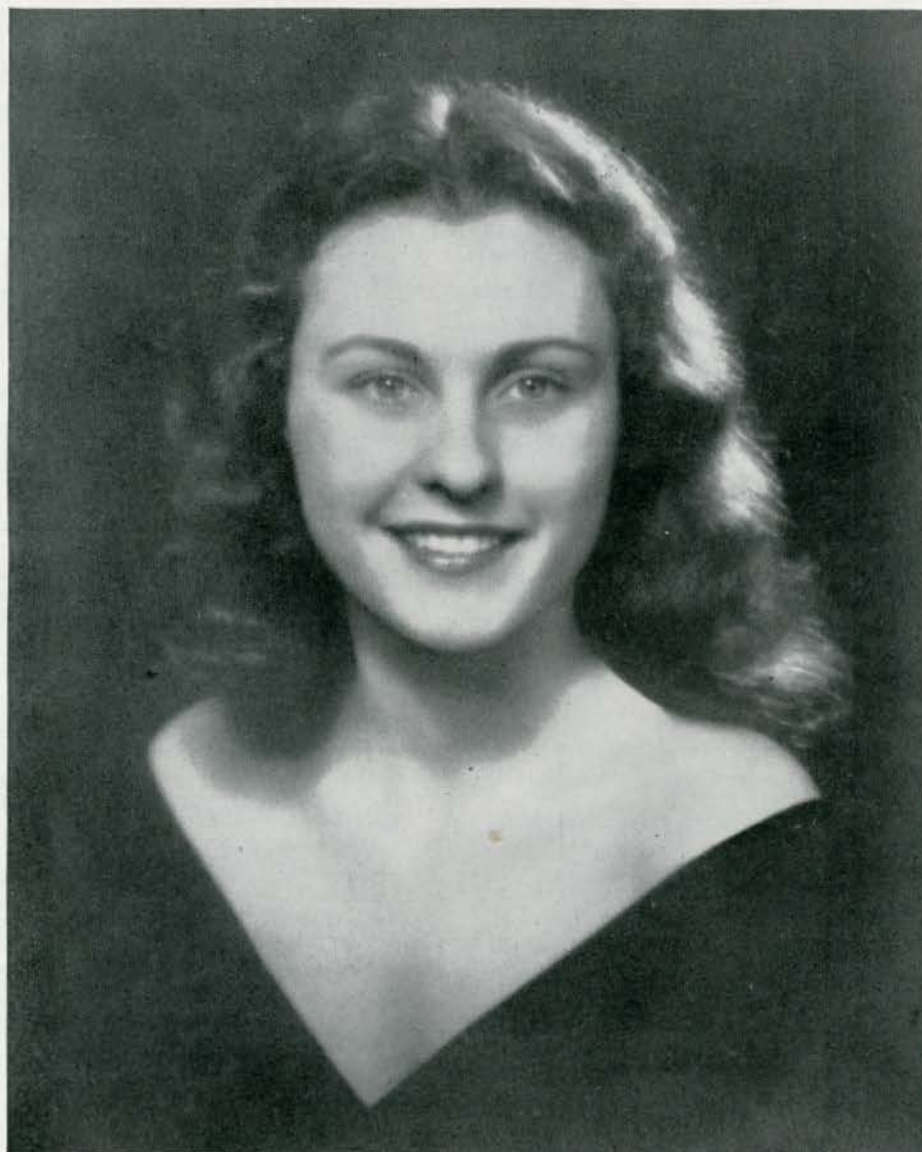

New Curriculum Will Prepare Students For Home-making and Citizenship

Course of Study Offers Major to Young Women Who Wish to Combine Training for Home Management and Community Leadership With Vocational Preparation

MANY women students desire professional or vocational training of the same sort that many men desire. It has always been the aim of Lindenwood College to meet this need in a number of areas. Lindenwood students who have graduated and gone on to professional or graduate school training or into salary earning positions in business and industry have acquitted themselves as equal in training and ability with the men with whom they were competing.

The immeasurable influence of women in all areas of human life and the vital importance of the role which is theirs in the world community challenge colleges to provide them with a liberal education of the highest order. This, too, Lindenwood has sought to do since the day it became a four year college. Many of its students have taken the conventional bachelor of arts degree with a major in a particular department.

There has been a growing realization that in addition to this conventional program, it may be that the woman's college can also perform an especially valuable function in a somewhat different direction.

Women do almost all of the spending of family incomes in the United States. It is the woman in the home who sets the tone and level of family morale and contribution to the community and society. The faculty of Lindenwood College has been giving much study during the last year to the development of a curriculum designed to prepare young women for responsibilities of the wife in a home and of a citizen in the community. A check shows that 90 per cent of Lindenwood's graduates are married within five years after graduation from college.

With these considerations in mind the Educational Policies Committee prepared a curriculum which the faculty adopted at its meeting on March 10. This curriculum is offered as a major for the young woman who plans to be married soon after leaving college or who is uncertain concerning the field in which she wishes to major.

Instead of requiring a concentration of 24 hours of Grade II or higher courses in one field for a major and 12 in another for a minor, the new curriculum includes the 38 hours required of all students seeking a bachelor's degree and 48 hours distributed over five different departments.

It will be noticed that in spite of the requirement of the large number of hours spread over various fields, there is a sufficient number of elective hours (42) to allow the student to plan some vocational training in addition, should she feel that she will be called upon

to supplement the family income or should she wish the security of knowledge that she could earn her own living if necessary. It will also be noticed that not much work is required in the field of Home Economics. It is recommended that those women who do not have competence in the mechanical skills of running a house take the courses which will give them these skills. The young woman who majors in the curriculum outlined below will be a cultured woman able to be a real home maker and able to take her place as a leader in her community.

Each student taking this new curriculum will, of course, be expected to complete those courses required of all students for the Bachelor of Arts degree. These courses include 12 hours in English, two courses in Philosophy or Religion, the course of Humanities, an introductory course in General Biology, six hours in Physical Science or Mathematics, and four hours in Physical Education. Students electing to major in the new curriculum must also take Introduction to Sociology, Introduction to Psychology, or Introduction to Economics; American State and Local Government; Ethics; and the Psychology of Marriage or the Family.

From the courses listed below and those listed immediately above it is required that the student must complete forty-eight hours, at least twenty-four of which must be of Grade III (Grade III courses are open to Juniors and Seniors.)

First Issue of "Peter Pan" Now Available to Alumnae

BY THE END OF THE MONTH the 300 copies of the first issue of "Peter Pan," Lindenwood's new literary magazine, will be in the hands of subscribers. The illustrated magazine, which will contain 80 pages of short stories, poems, and sketches, is composed of student, faculty and alumnae writing. This volume of "Peter Pan" marks the inauguration of another "first" for students of Lindenwood. Formerly all student writings were published in the "Linden Bark," the campus newspaper, and in volumes of Lindenwood verse collected over a period of years. It is expected that "Peter Pan" will be a permanent publication of the college and will be issued annually.

Rita Baker, of Leavenworth, Kan., is editor of "Peter Pan." She and her staff have been collecting and reading manuscripts since September. Staff members, in addition to Miss Baker, are Patricia Underwood, Betty Joy Haas, and Sally Fielding, assistant editors; Lorraine Peck, business manager; Marie Koch, art editor; and Dr. Agnes Sibley, sponsor. The staff has had the assistance of the members of the college's English Department.

A letter announcing the publication of the magazine was sent several months ago to some former Lindenwood students. The list, however, was incomplete. Miss Baker, fearing that interested alumnae have been overlooked, has announced the staff will receive subscriptions at any time during May. The price is \$1.50.

The English Department has announced that a number of copies of the second volume of "Lindenwood Verse," published in 1943, are also available and may be purchased for fifty cents. "Peter Pan" and "Lindenwood Verse" may be ordered at the same time.

Lindenwood's 122nd Commencement To Be Held on May 30

THE 122nd annual commencement of Lindenwood College will be held at 10 a.m. on Monday, May 30, climaxing a week of special programs on the campus. The address to the graduating class will be delivered by Robert H. Kazmayer, noted news commentator and lecturer.

The baccalaureate sermon will be preached in Roemer Auditorium on Sunday, May 29, by the Rev. Raymond I. Lindquist, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Orange, N. J. Dr. Lindquist conducted the Religious Emphasis Week services at Lindenwood last year.

There are 73 candidates for degrees, certificates and diplomas in the 1949 graduating class. Of this total 55 are Seniors. Twenty-eight are candidates for Bachelor of Arts degrees, 21 for Bachelor of Science degrees, and 6 for Bachelor of Music degrees.

The annual meeting of the Lindenwood Alumnae Association will be held on Saturday, May 28. Mrs. H. K. Stumberg, of St. Charles, president of the association, will preside and members of this year's graduating class will be welcomed into membership in the association.

Examinations for the Seniors will begin on May 23. Final examinations for the other classes will begin on May 31 and continue through June 4.

We now have three children, Nancy, 8, Margie, 5, and our son, "Chippy," 14 months. I have been kept busy with the usual P.T.A., Church, and Study Clubs. Six months ago the B. F. Goodrich Co. transferred us to Clarksville, Tenn. Greetings to the class of '37 and to the many grand friends I made while at L.C."

Josephine Miles (Mrs. John R. Hall, Jr.), 5515 Komensky Ave., Chicago, Ill.: "After graduation, I worked for Stix, Baer, and Fuller in St. Louis. Two Conferences in April Bring Many Visitors to the Campus

Third Annual Radio Conference and Community Leadership Workshop Bring Prominent Speakers to Lindenwood and Attract Wide Attention to the College

Two conferences held at Lindenwood College on April 29 and 30, brought a number of prominent speakers to the campus and exerted an influence far beyond the college boundaries. Civic leaders and representatives of community groups as well as students from universities and colleges in Missouri and Illinois attended the conference meetings.

The Third Annual Radio Conference, held on April 29, brought approximately 250 visitors to the campus to hear speakers prominent in the radio field. In addition to the delegates from universities and colleges and civic groups, a number of high schools in the St. Louis area were represented.

The two-day meeting of the Community Leadership Workshop also brought a large number of visitors to Lindenwood and attracted editorial comment in the St. Louis Post-Dispatch. Concerning the Workshop, the Post-Dispatch said:

"Lindenwood College is to be felicitated for planning and holding on its campus a 'Workshop for Community Leadership' Friday and Saturday of this week. Around the 'workbench' there will be discussions of health and recreation, housing, utilities, traffic control, law enforcement, religious and racial harmony, the soil, and other subjects that are at the very core of community life.

"One of the major things which a student should take with him out of college is an ability to make himself effective as a citizen of his community. Toward that end the Workshop at St. Charles will contribute."

Miss Judith Waller, one of the speakers at the Radio Conference, was interviewed over the air during the conference by Radio Station WEW in St. Louis. Miss Waller, who is Director of Public Service, Central Division of NBC, and author of "Radio: The Fifth Estate," spoke at the morning session on "Training For Careers in Radio." At the afternoon session, Ted Westcott, a production director for Station KSD and KSD-TV, gave a demonstration of radio production, which included the presentation of a radio show written by a Lindenwood student.

The evening program featured a panel discussion on "Radio: The Fifth Estate." Members of the panel were Dr. Samuel Johnson, news commentator for Station KMOX; A. L. Brandt, assistant news editor Station KXOK, and David Shefrin, of the faculty of the

School of Journalism at the University of Missouri. Charles C. Clayton, member of the college's faculty was the moderator.

Lindenwood's radio station, KCLC, presented some of its programs during the conference and attracted wide attention. The conference was under the direction of Miss Martha May Boyer, head of the Radio Department.

Leading the discussion groups at the Workshop were: "Community Health, Miss Gwen Goodrich, a member of the faculty of the University of Wisconsin; "Community Recreation," Fred Naeter, publisher of the Cape Girardeau Southeast Missourian; "Growing Pains," Dr. Homer Clevenger, head of the college's History Department and "Community Tensions," Henry F. Chadeayne, comptroller of the General American Life Insurance Co. Leonard Hall, columnist for the St. Louis Post-Dispatch, spoke at a joint meeting with the Radio Conference on "Listening In, R.F.D." Robert Blakey, chief editorial writer for the St. Louis Star-Times, was the moderator for a panel discussion on the subject, "The Good Community Bases Its Stability on Change." Members of the panel were State Senator Ed Long, Bowling Green, Mo.; Irving Dilliard, editorial writer for the Post-Dispatch; R. A. Langenbacher, former St. Charles County Agent; Circuit Judge Richard Creech, Troy, Mo.; and Miss Genevieve Cross, DeSoto, Mo.

The Workshop was under the direction of Paul Greer, a member of the college's faculty.

Girl of the Month

WE PRESENT Miss Johnnie Elizabeth Riner as the Girl of The Month. After receiving her B.A. from Lindenwood in 1931, she attended the University of Illinois Library School, getting the degree of B.S. in Library Science in 1932.

Her first job was as a cataloger and manager of traveling libraries of the Missouri Library Commission. After that, she went to Ft. Riley, Kansas, as the librarian of the Cavalry school, which she said "was a very interesting position, and while there I caught glimpses of General Patton and several other prominent officers in the last war." She was called home when her father became ill, and returned to her old job at the Missouri Library Commission. Shortly after that, she went to Central College in Fayette, Mo., as assistant librarian. In September 1945, she became librarian at the Jefferson City Free Public Library in Jefferson City, Mo.

She has a staff of four full time people and three part-time assistants. Most of them are young girls, either attending high school or just graduated. She does all of her own cataloging and most of the reference work. In addition to library work, she has to do the bookkeeping, write the checks, and oversee the building. She says that a librarian is usually a jack of all trades.

She spends one day a week taking the bookmobile around to schools. The Cole County Library has a contract with the schools, and the two libraries furnish the entire county with films and records. They are building a rental record collection which promises to be popular. Teen-Town borrows their film projector with all of its sound attachments frequently, as do the Girl Scouts.

Miss Riner says: "The library profession is interesting, especially the public library field, for any-

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thing and everything can and does happen in the public library—from request for rooms to the little boy who says his mother does not need any books to read because she does not go to school. Lindenwood, I taught in northeast Missouri for one and a half years. Then I taught at home, in Keokuk, and attended summer school at a State Teachers' College in Macomb, Ill., until 1944. Walter Grundhauser to Return to Faculty Next September

J. Walter Grundhauser has accepted appointment as Assistant Professor in the Department of Biological Science at Lindenwood College, it is announced by President F. L. McCluer. Mr. Grundhauser has been conducting research at St. Louis University and has completed his work for the doctorate degree. In September he will rejoin his former colleagues in the Department headed by Dr. Mary Talbot.

Mr. Grundhauser has been giving his attention to three important research studies:

1. The effect of anaesthetics and narcotics on the water-holding properties of living tissues.
2. Examination of changes in the water-holding properties of seedlings after they had been exposed to large doses of soft x-rays.
3. A tracer work study with radio phosphorus which has revealed that there is a concentration of this element in tissues preparing for and undergoing mitosis and that this information can be used in detecting such things as cancer in deep tissues.

These researches are of practical as well as theoretical value. The report of the tracer work study is being published. P32 is obtained from the Oak Ridge Laboratories of the Atomic Energy Commission for use in this study.

Mr. Grundhauser will continue his activity in research in the laboratories of Lindenwood College and will give courses in biology and physics next Fall.
