**ANNUAL CHRISTMAS WALK SET SUNDAY** - The well-known Bob Kramer's Marionettes will present free performances during Lindenwood's third Annual Christmas Walk, set Sunday from 4-6 p.m. on campus. Kramer's Marionettes will present 20-minute shows beginning at 4:20 p.m. in the FAB.

Amidst a festively-decorated campus, the Christmas Walk will begin at the MAB where members of the Madrigals will provide a holiday welcome to visitors. Tours will be arranged every few minutes at the MAB, according to Lynne M. Landholt, chairperson of this year's holiday walk.

Visitors will proceed to Butler Library to see performances by St. Charles Immanuel Lutheran Church's Bell Ringers, then walk across campus to view residence halls and a visitor from the North Pole - Santa Claus.

The group will tour Niccolls Hall and then head to historic Sibley Hall where the Lindenwood Brass Quartet and Women's Ensemble will present separate performances. The next stop on the tour is Butler Hall where holiday storytelling will be presented by Ann Canale, chairman of the English Dept.

The tour will end at the FAB where refreshments will be provided and Kramer's Marionettes will perform shows at 4:20, 4:50 and 5:20 p.m. A student art sale and exhibit also will be in the FAB.

In addition, "The Magic Galoshes" will be staged during a 2 p.m. matinee at Jelkyl Theatre and the Madrigals' Elizabethan Holiday Feast will be held at 6 p.m. at the MAB.

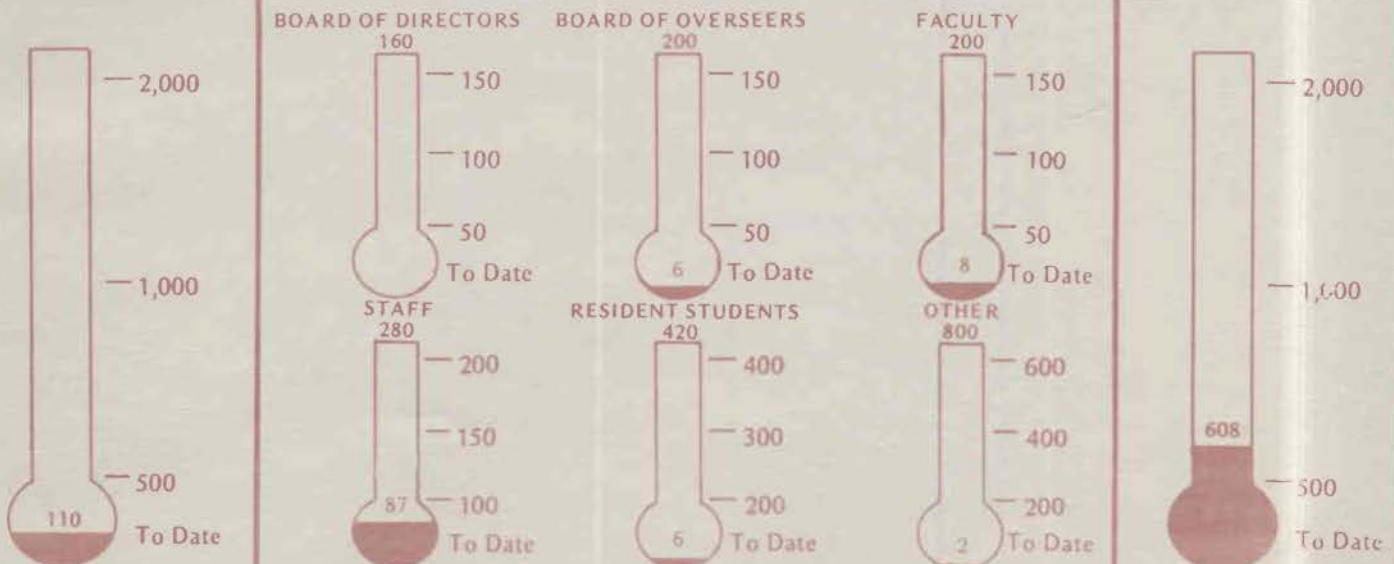

HEAD BASKETBALL COACH NAMED - William A. Shapiro, a former assistant basketball coach and athletic advisor at St. Louis University, has been named head coach of the women's basketball team. Currently employed in free-lance broadcast work, he is a former news and sports reporter for KCFM-FM Radio in Florissant. Holding an associate degree from St. Louis Community College at Meramec, Shapiro is a 1975 graduate of the University of Missouri-Columbia who is pursuing a master's degree in communications from St. Louis University, where he was assistant coach from 1977-78. Active in intercollegiate basketball and baseball during college, he was a special assistant to the University of Missouri Athletic Dept., reporting to Head Basketball Coach Norm Stewart. Taking over as head coach of the Lady Lions following the start of the 26-game season, Shapiro replaces Christina Storey who has left the college.

BORNMANN TO BE CHAIRMAN-ELECT - John A. Bornmann, professor of chemistry and physics, has been named chairman-elect of the St. Louis Section of the American Chemical Society, an 1,800-member organization of chemists, chemical engineers and professionals. As chairman-elect, he will serve as vice-president in 1986, becoming chairman in 1987. The Washington, DC-based society is an international organization and the largest professional group devoted to a single science.
