

New Members Are Added To Lindenwood's Faculty

Appointments Announced by Dr. McCluer As Part of Program to Expand Educational Program of College—Mme. Helene Lyolene to Be in Residence This Fall.

CARRYING out his program of expanding the faculty and educational program of the college, Dr. Franc L. McCluer, Lindenwood's president, has announced the appointment of a number of new faculty members.

Dr. C. Eugene Conover, who has been Professor of Philosophy and Religion at Blackburn College, has been named Professor of Philosophy. He is a graduate of the College of Wooster, where he was a member of Phi Beta Kappa. He holds a B.D. degree from the Union Theological Seminary in New York and A.M. and Ph.D. degrees from the University of Cincinnati. Before going to Blackburn College, he served as director of the Westminster Foundation at Miami University.

Mrs. Anita Croft, who has been named Instructor in the Department of Psychology, has a master's degree from the University of Michigan and has done further work in psychology at that university. She will give three courses this fall; adolescent psychology, vocational guidance, testing and counseling, and the psychology of marriage. Mrs. Croft is the mother of three children. She will come to the campus from her home in St. Louis three days each week.

John V. Machell, Jr., has been appointed Associate Professor of Economics. Mr. Machell received his bachelor's degree from Temple University and holds a master's degree from the University of Illinois. He has served as an economist in the Office of Price Administration, and as an instructor in Economics at Syracuse University. In the summer of 1944 he was an instructor of Economics at Yale University. Since 1946 he has been an associate professor of Economics at Guilford College.

In the Sociology Department, Mrs. Lecie G. Machell has been appointed an Assistant Professor. Mrs. Machell received her A.B. degree from the University of Illinois and her M.S. degree from Washington University. She is a member of Phi Beta Kappa. Last year she was a member of the faculty of the Woman's College of the University of North Carolina. She had previously served as a case worker in St. Louis and in Champaign, Ill., and as co-director of the Student-in-Industry Project of the American Friends Service Committee.

In the English Department, two faculty members have been added. Dr. Louise Hastings has been named an Associate Professor of English. She holds her A.B.,

M.A., and Ph.D. degrees from the University of Indiana and has done graduate study at the Detroit City College, Iowa State University, Harvard University and the Detroit School of Applied Art. She has had seven years of experience as a reporter in Detroit and Lima, Ohio and has been on the faculties of the University of Indiana and Wellesley College. Last year she devoted her full time to writing a biography of Mary Moody Emerson, famous aunt of Ralph Waldo Emerson.

Miss Carolyn Trimble, a Lindenwood alumna, has been named an Instructor in the English Department. After leaving Lindenwood, Miss Trimble attended Louisiana State University. Following her graduation she worked as a reporter in Shreveport, La., and then entered the Graduate College of Columbia University, from which she received her master's degree. She will have charge of the work in remedial reading.

There are three new members in the faculty of the Art Department. John R. Middents, who will give courses in sculpture, lithography and introduction

Dr. Florence W. Schaper Resigns Student Guidance Post

Alumna of Lindenwood, Who Has Been Member of Faculty Since 1922, Has Been Granted Leave of Absence for Coming Year

DR. FLORENCE W. SCHAPER has resigned as Director of Student Guidance and Personnel, effective on September 1, and has been granted a leave of absence for the coming year. For the last eight years she has held this position in addition to serving as Professor of Sociology.

In tendering her resignation, she said: "My loyalty for Lindenwood College will never cease as I have the kindest feelings to the thousands of former students who have attended Lindenwood College during the time I have been a member of the faculty and of the administration."

President McCluer in accepting her resignation expressed appreciation of her service to the institution. "Her boundless energy and enthusiasm, her training in sociology and in personnel work, and her devotion to the college enabled her to render a vital contribution to its welfare," he said.

Dr. Schaper is an alumna of Lindenwood. She matriculated in 1916 before Lindenwood had become a four-year college and in 1918 she was graduated from the University of Missouri. In 1922 she joined the college's faculty as a teacher in the Department of Sociology and a few years later became head of the department. In 1932 she received her doctor's degree from New York University.

In 1943 she was granted a leave of absence and was commissioned a Lieutenant in the WAVES. Upon her release from the service in July, 1945, she returned to the campus.

St. Louis Clubs Raise \$1000 for Alumnae Fund

The St. Louis Lindenwood Afternoon and Evening Clubs have raised all but \$50 of their quota of \$1,000 for the college's alumnae fund, it is announced by Miss Virginia Dell, president of the Evening Club. At the annual meeting of the Lindenwood Alumnae Association on May 29, it was voted to raise a fund of at least \$10,000 in 1948-49.

The St. Louis clubs' quota has been raised by a series of benefit book reviews sponsored jointly by the clubs. Another book review is planned for this fall, with Dr. John Buchan of the English Department of Washington University as the speaker.

Miss Lichliter has served as director of the New Education Program at the Columbus Gallery of Fine Arts at Columbus, Ohio, as dean of Lasell Junior College, Auburndale, Mass., and as dean of women and assistant professor of history at Drury College at Springfield, Mo.

Dr. Rio speaks English fluently. He will give courses in the Department of Education.

Lindenwood Will Open 122nd Collegiate Year On September 15

Faculty Conference to Be Held Beginning September 13 and Classes Will Open September 20—Testing Program and Social Events Planned for first Week

LINDENWOOD COLLEGE will open its 122nd collegiate year on September 15 when the students return to the campus. A faculty conference will be held on Monday, September 13, and on September 14 the Upper Class Counselors will arrive to assist the new students during Orientation Week.

Immediately upon arrival every student is asked to report to Guy C. Motley's office for enrollment and room assignments. On Wednesday, September 15, the Testing Program for new students will begin at 1 p. m. At 6:45 p. m. President McCluer will officially welcome the old and new students at an assembly in Roemer Auditorium and from 7:30 to 9:30 p. m. there will be an informal faculty reception for students and parents in the Fine Arts Building.

Thursday, September 16, upper class students will register and the Testing Program will continue. Fun hours sponsored by the Athletic Association will be held from 2 to 4 p. m. and dorm parties are scheduled for that night. Friday the Freshmen will register. A street supper is planned for that night to be followed by square dancing. Saturday the registration and Testing Program will be completed and there will be a "White Apron Jamboree" that night. Sunday, following the church services, there will be an open house given by the Student Christian Association from 3 to 5 p. m. and an evening hillside sing.

During the summer the college has redecorated many of the dormitory rooms and made other improvements on the campus. Work has begun on the college's lake, to be located back of Ayres Hall. The college has purchased a four-family apartment house one block from the campus, which will be used for faculty housing. The apartments will be redecorated and are expected to be ready for occupancy when the college year begins.

Lindenwood Alumna Writes of Life in Germany

Dr. Alice A. Linneman, professor emeritus of art, has received an interesting letter from Mrs. C. Guy Lee, who is now in Germany with her husband. Mrs. Lee, who was Betty Ann Carleton, attended Lindenwood in 1939-41. With her children she sailed for Germany in July, 1947, and joined her husband in Ludwigsburg in September.

"Twice a week," she writes, "we drive to Stuttgart to do our shopping and to look around. The downtown section is pretty well bombed out and they are just now beginning to rebuild the shops. Every place is crowded and most Germans have just a room or two for their entire family.

"We hope to take several side trips while we are here, mainly to Paris and into Switzerland. Next month we will move to Mannheim, about 30 miles from Heidelberg. We hope to stay long enough so that the children and myself will have a good foundation in German and so that we can see the highlights of Europe. When I look back and remember that a fortune teller once told me I would travel in Europe, and how I laughed at her, then it really seems like a dream that I am here."

Girl of the Month

WA. Lewis. After graduating from Lindenwood in 1931, Miss Lewis secured a position as assistant in the biochemical research laboratory at John Hopkins Hospital. She worked on the chemistry of gastric juice under Dr. Lay Martin of the Department of Medicine. As the research funds "evaporated" the next year due to the depression, that position ended September, 1932. Her next position was in her home town, Lancaster, Pa., in the laboratory of the General Hospital. While working there she finished the requirements necessary to register with the national board as a medical technologist. She was in charge of bacteriology and hematology and also taught student technicians in these divisions.

In 1936, she went to the Marine Biological Laboratory, Woods Hole, Mass., and took a course in Physiology. Through one of the professors she was offered a position at Ohio State University in the department of Physiology as research assistant with an opportunity to do graduate work too. In the fall of 1936, she went back to school. She received her M.A. in 1938 and her Ph.D. in Physiology in 1940. She stayed on as research assistant in Physiology until 1941 when she went to the Cleveland Clinic as special research fellow in Endocrinology. At the end of the fellowship, she was asked to stay on permanently and was ultimately made a full staff member. She was fortunate at the Clinic, in being put in charge of the electrophoresis laboratory, as there were only a few other such laboratories in the country at the time she first started working in the field.

Miss Lewis has thirty-one publications to her credit We congratulate her on her splendid achievements.

Miss Marjorie Savage has been appointed an Assistant Professor in Home Economics. She holds her B.S. degree from Mississippi State College for Women and a master's degree from Iowa State College. She has been a member of the faculty at Henderson State Teachers College in Arkadelphia, Ark., and will teach courses in foods and textiles.

Paul Greer, editor of the outstate edition of the St. Louis Post-Dispatch, has been added to the college staff as a visiting lecturer. He will offer a course in "Community Leadership," designed to prepare students for leadership in their own communities.

Manson M. Brien has been named an Assistant Professor in History and will teach the course in Humanities. He holds his A.B. degree from Princeton University and has done graduate work at Princeton and the University of Michigan, from which he received his master's degree. He taught at the Lycee Pothier in Orleans, France, at Princeton, the University of Michigan, and last year at Washington University.

Madame Helene Lyolene, Lindenwood's internationally famous dress designer, will be in residence on the campus for the entire first semester. She will offer a course in "French Designing, Fitting and Finishing," and plans a fall style show.

Lindenwood's Radio Station To Be On the Air in September

Student Staff Is Selected to Operate New Campus Radio Station and Will Report in Advance of Opening of School to Complete Preparations for Formal Inauguration of Program When College Opens

LINDENWOOD'S new wired-wireless campus radio station has been installed and will be ready to take to the air when the students return to the campus for Orientation Week, it is announced by Miss Martha May Boyer, who is the faculty advisor for the station.

The station will be housed in three modern, sound-treated studios in the Fine Arts Building. A 25 watt transmitter with modulating and power supply, plus transmission lines to campus buildings has been added to the cutting, playback and monitoring equipment already in use by the college. It includes complete facilities for monitoring rehearsals while live programs are on the air. The equipment has been installed by the Concordia Recording Co., of St. Louis and has been carefully designed to the specific needs of the station.

Managed by a student staff selected from members of last year's radio classes, the new station is intended to provide students with practical experience in all phases of radio. Miss Pat Stull, of Ziegler, Ill., a former student and recently continuity director of Station WSTL at Carbondale, Ill., will head the student staff. Other staff members will be Miss Sally Joy, Fort Wayne, Ind.; Miss Gretchen Schnurr, Otho, Iowa; Miss Mary DeVries, Pella, Iowa; and Miss Ruth Ann Ball, Neosho, Mo.

Programming plans include time for public service, for experimentation in educational radio techniques, as well as for popular, semi-classical and classical music and drama. By using tape recordings and remote campus pickups, sports events and special activities will be broadcast. It is expected that a news service will be added later.

A special feature will be a weekly transcribed program from the national capital. Miss Lorraine Peck, Lindenwood student who will spend the first semester at the American University in Washington, will send the station a program of news and comment each week from the capital. Another weekly feature will be a forum on public affairs in which students from the universities and colleges in the St. Louis area will be invited to participate.

Lindenwood now offers 22 hours of radio work under Miss Boyer's direction, including continuity and script writing, the composition arrangement and performance of radio music, radio speech, radio production and advanced radio techniques. The college will continue to offer the Lindenwood Children's Theater of the Air, a feature for many years over Station KFUO.

The new station has applied to the Federal Com-

munications Commission for call letters and has an application in for membership in the Intercollegiate Broadcasting System. Last spring the college's radio club was chartered as the Tau Chapter of Alpha Epsilon Rho, national radio education fraternity.
