'YEAR OF THE PROFESSOR' PROCLAIMED - Lindenwood has designated fiscal 1986-87 as the "Year of the Professor" as a means of citing one of the most important aspects of a Lindenwood education - the institution's outstanding faculty.

Under the direction of a 10-member steering committee, the college plans a year-long celebration to cite and honor faculty members. The event will be highlighted with a convocation this fall at which the "Professor of the Year" will be named. The individual chosen will receive a \$1,000 cash stipend and will be honored at a dinner hosted by the college. The fall convocation will be coupled with a symposium at which the new Vice-President for Academic Affairs and Dean of Faculty will be named. The symposium's theme will center upon what creates excellence in teaching, and the event will feature a special lecture by either selected faculty members or guest speakers. Ideas being considered by the committee as part of the "Year of the Professor" include expanded coverage of faculty accomplishments and submissions by faculty members for the quarterly LINDEN WORD and bimonthly "Lindenwood Report"; a special display of faculty writings in Butler Library; a special convocation to honor emeriti; the possibility of securing faculty development grants; establishing endowed chairs of professorships in various disciplines; a pictorial display of full-time faculty members in lobbies of classroom buildings; and the possible dedication of a Faculty Lounge on campus.

Committee members consist of Edward C. Balog, chairman of the EPC; John A. Bornmann, chairman of the Chemistry Dept.; Ann Canale, chairperson of the English Dept.; Solon Chervitz, chairman of the Faculty Council; James F. Hood, acting Dean of Faculty; Amy McCracken, president of the student body; Arlene Taich, dean of the Evening College/LCIE; James D. Thompson, director of development; Randy L. Wallick, director of public relations; and President James I. Spainhower, an ex-officio member.

SEARCH COMMITTEE APPOINTED - President Spainhower announces that a seven-member search committee has begun preparations to select a Vice-President for Academic Affairs and Dean of Faculty. The expanded position will fill the post left vacant following the resignation last year of Aaron Miller and the one being administered by Acting Dean of Faculty James F. Hood. Following a national search, the committee hopes to name someone to the position by this fall. Committee membérs consist of Joe Ancona of the LCIE faculty; Daryl Anderson, chairperson of the Biology Dept.; Edith Graber, chairperson of the Sociology Dept.; Robert Hulett, associte professor of business administration; Allen Schwab, dean of College Life; James W. Swift, assistant professor and faculty advisor in the LCIE; and a student representative yet to be named.

ST. CHARLES RESIDENT NAMED TO BOARD - Ronald W. Ohmes of St. Charles, president of F.F. Kirchner, Inc., a Bridgeton-based supplier of building materials, has been elected to the college's board of overseers. Ohmes is a 1959 graduate of the University of Missouri with an undergraduate degree in business administration.

Community active, he is a member of the board of directors of Commerce Bank of St. Charles County and the St. Peters Hospital Board of Trustees, and he serves as president of Wonderland Camp Foundation, an organization serving handicapped and retarded children and young adults. Ohmes is past president of the Missouri and St. Charles Jaycees and a past board chairman of the Missouri Concrete Association. For 17 years, he was a member of the St. Charles City Planning and Zoning Commission, serving a term as its chairman. He and his wife, Janice, have five children.


CAMPUS OVERNIGHTS PLANNED - Prospective students will gain first-hand information about mass communications, computer science, pre-professional studies and athletics when the Admissions Office sponsors a Campus Overnight February 2-3. Students will have the opportunity to meet faculty members, students and alumni as well as attend workshops and classes, stay in residence halls and take part in several social activities planned by the Admissions Office staff. A similar recruiting event is planned February 23-24.

PHONE-A-THON VOLUNTEERS SOUGHT - Faculty, staff, student and alumni volunteers are sought for the 1986 Alumni Phone-a-Thon, scheduled in two phases - February 12-March 12 and April 23-May 28. With a theme of "Lindenwood Alumni Ambassadors of the Renaissance," this year's fund-raising campaign has a goal of \$200,000, an increase from the record-breaking \$190,000 raised during the 1985 phone-a-thon.

Volunteers will be telephoning alumni throughout the country during late afternoon and early evening hours Sunday through Wednesday during the 1986 Phone-a-Thon. Volunteers are credited with last year's successful campaign, which boosted alumni support to 32 percent, a feat virtually unheard of at private colleges and universities in and one which placed Lindenwood among the highest in the country in terms of alumni support.
