TO THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF LINDENWOOD COLLEGE,

CENTLEMEN:

During the past year we have had a total enrollment of 457 students, the largest enrollment in the eleven years of the present administration. These students came from 26 different States and were classified in the College as follows:

The student body from an educational standpoint ranked perceptibly higher than usual, a statement of which is contained in the Dean's report, which is appended. A few students were taken into the Academy but we are gradually eliminating that department. The only exception to the standard of entrance of 15 units to all departments is for students who are specializing in music.

The <u>health</u> of the student body has been up to our usual standard and we have had no serious cases of illness.

The Faculty has as a rule been quite faithful to their duties. But few changes have been made in the Faculty for the coming year. The Music department, which fell below the anticipated number of students in that department, has been reorganized so that fewer teachers will be able to handle the required work. In the College department we have merged the Psychology with the Education and Sociology departments and expect to do away with one teacher. The English department is lessened by one teacher, no one being appointed to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Miss Floy Winks.

The seven new members of the Faculty are -

These teachers are members of evangelical churches and active Christian people.

The equipment of the various departments is good but there are several additional requisitions to be made for the coming year.

The <u>leading event</u> of the past school year was the dedication of Irwin Hall. This new dormitory made it possible to take the increased number of students this year.

of great value, as we are now able to seat, without crowding, all of our boarding students. In addition to the students, members of the Faculty who desire table board are furnished board at the rate of \$200 for the school year. This arrangement has proved very satisfactory, as well as the privilege which is now given of our Faculty rooming out in town.

The religious life of the school has been maintained by the teaching of the Bible, our chapel exercises, and our vesper service on Sunday evening. The Y. W. C. A. has done a very valuable Christian work for the students. The question often arises whether the religious department could not be better maintained by a woman in charge of the Bible Chair, who would be able to come into personal contact with the religious life of the students. This matter was broached to the President of the College at the Fall meeting of the Board and I should be pleased to hear your views on the matter.

I again call your attention to the fact that our <u>Library</u> room is now inadequate to the demands made upon it. New stacks and cases have been added until the space occupied is fast taking the room needed by the students for reading and study. In fact, we are experiencing that which has been usual with us - that larger growth makes the need for more room.

The scholarships we are offering students who do meritorious work, and for service, are increasing the standards of our college departments. We continue to have more requests for aid than we can possibly supply, and increased amounts are asked to carry most if not the entire expense of students who desire to enter. Of course we cannot do that on our present basis, and I doubt whether it would be wise at this time to make such a revolution in our present program. To change the present plan would be to change the entire character of the school. We are assisting as best we can all worthy students who need part help.

The Mary Easton Sibley Scholarship Fund is before the alumnse, and under the direction of your Field Secretary is arousing considerable interest, although at present there is a minimum amount of cash and pledges received. Mr. Blocher, your representative, will make a report to you of his work for the year.

To recognize the <u>Class of 1927</u>, the <u>Centennial Class</u>, an offer was made, and accepted by many, of \$100 on tuition during the Junior year, and \$300 in the Senior year. This amount is available only to those who have made a grade of M and above, and upon the further condition that they must have a room reservation fee in and the offer accepted by June 30. Our problem at present in the four-year schedule is to increase our numbers in the Junior and Senior years. We have been taking this matter under advisement as to how best to promote the last two years of the four-year college course. I notice that many scholarship funds of outside organizations are offering financial help only to those in the last two years of the college course.

This Estimated Surplus will be increased June 30, when the inventories now being taken will be placed on the books. We estimate the inventories will be about \$5,000.00.

The following recommendations are made for the coming year:

- 1. That an appropriation of \$2,500 be made for the purchase of new books and magazines for the Library.
- 2. That an appropriation of \$10,000 be made for scholarships. not including Ministerial Scholarships which are provided for by special funds.
- 1 3. That an appropriation of \$10,000 be made for the Golf Course For new equipment for the Infirmery, \$300.00.
 - For new equipment for the Infirmary, \$300.00.
 - 5. For Educational Equipment (departmental equipment and apparatus) \$5.000.00.
 - 6. That \$2,500 be appropriated for the preparation being made looking toward the celebration of our Centennial in 1927.
