LCIE COLLOQUIUM SET - W. Children will be decorating cookies and exchanging Valentines, said Suzanne Shanker, Campus School teacher. <u>WAR OF THE CURRENTS</u> - Lindenwood and the St. Louis Science Center have joined forces to present "Nikola Tesla: War of the Currents," a dramatic one-act play being presented each Saturday and Sunday at noon now through March 9 at the St. Louis Science Center's McDonnell Star Theatre in Forest Park. The play, the first of the center's "Science on Stage" productions, depicts the life of Tesla, an extraordinary scientist and inventor. Tesla is credited with designing the first practical system of generating and transmitting alternating current, of creating fluorescent lighting and intro- ducing the world to fundamentals of robotry, missile science and computers.

The play is directed by Bryan Reeder, a graduate student and administrator in the Performing Arts Dept. It stars David Hoover, a third-year graduate student. Costume design is by Keith Muessigman, a second-year graduate student, while Paul Gatrell, an undergraduate student, serves as stage manager/technician.
