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FACULTY/STAFF RECOGNITION BREAKFAST - All faculty and staff members are invited to attend the college's first Recognition Breakfast, slated Thursday from 7:30-9 a.m. in Ayres Cafeteria. Co-hosted by the Lindenwood 1000 Club, President Jim Spainhower and the Development Office, the event will honor all employees with five or more years of service to Lindenwood. The Faculty/Staff Recognition Breakfast is designed to be an annual event to cite Lindenwood's instructional, administrative and support staffs. G-D OPENS OFFICE ON CAMPUS - The ST. LOUIS GLOBE-DEMOCRAT has entered into contract with the college to utilize an office in the MAB for its St. Charles News Bureau. The arrangement also calls for sharing news gathering operations with KCLC-FM Radio as a means of better serving the St. Charles community. Future aspects of the cooperative venture include opportunities for internships at the newspaper for Lindenwood students and joint educational programs in the Communications Dept., said Jim Wilson, department chairman.

The news bureau, headed by Kevin Madden, replaces the GLOBE-DEMOCRAT's office at 114 N. Main St., which closed as a cost-cutting measure under former publisher Jeffrey Gluck. Special regional pages devoted to St. Charles area news will continue to be published weekly in the GLOBE-DEMOCRAT. LINDENWOOD ASK TO AID AE COUNCIL - Faculty and staff employees are being asked to support the 1986 fund-raising drive of the Arts and Education Council, a federation of 138 cultural and educational organizations, and Hans Levi is requesting your help. Levi is coordinating Lindenwood's efforts to help the council achieve its \$2.2 million goal for support of the arts in the metropolitan area.

"A metropolitan community that fails to support the arts is doomed to demoralization and second rateness," Levi said. "Our metro area is experiencing a wonderful renewal, and the Arts and Education Council is a component of this rebirth. Please help keep it alive with your contribution," he adds.

As an incentive to this year's drive, Lindenwood will offer a \$25 gift certificate for dinner for two and a 16x20 signed print from Levi's personal collection. The gift certificate will be awarded to a contributor of \$25 or more, while the print will be given to a faculty or staff member who donates \$50 or more. All contributions are tax deductible. Joining Levi in the appeal to college employees is President Spainhower, who is chairing the Education Division of the Arts and Education Council's 1986 funds drive. SCIENCE DAY SET MARCH 5 - The college's fifth annual Science Day, a multi-purpose event for college-bound high school students, will be held March 5 beginning at 10 a.m. on campus. Open to all area students without charge, the event is sponsored by the Admissions Office and the Division of Natural Science and Math. According to John Bornmann, professor and division chairman, the event "is an opportunity for science and math students to be exposed to topical issues in natural science, math and computer science fields. It also is a chance for college-bound students to experience a college classroom atmosphere and meet faculty members," he said. The event will include discussions and workshops in biology, computer science, math and chemistry as well as a tour of Lindenwood science facilities and a luncheon in the cafeteria. Open to the community, the event is cosponsored by the Associates of the Fine Arts and the St. Charles Lindenwood Alumni Club.

Castro's illustrated book explores the life, inspirations and paintings of well-known American artist O'Keeffe who has been called "a pioneer of native modern art" and "one of the most original talents America has possessed in painting." The author of numerous book reviews, essays, articles and poems, Castro is a contributing writer who has been published extensively. Holding a graduate degree in English from Washington University, she is a member of the adjunct faculty at Lindenwood.
