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SPORTS INFORMATION INTERNSHIP - Lindenwood is looking for an outstanding student to participate in a newly-created internship program that will be available next fall. Offered by the Athletic Dept. in conjunction with the Public Relations Office, the program will offer up to six hours of academic credit for a student interested in sports who is majoring in communication.

"This individual should be looking toward a career in either sports administration, print or broadcast journalism or a related field," said Athletic Director William Shapiro. "This job would be challenging and most enjoyable, and it would provide many rewards, especially in a major market like St. Louis. The experience would be invaluable for future employment," he added.

The student would work closely with Shapiro and Public Relations Director Randy L. Wallick. Duties would include, but not be limited to, writing sports-oriented media releases, both straight news and feature material; establishing and maintaining media contacts in the area; coordinating statistical compilation and output; working with National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics officials on ratings, statistics, rankings, honors, etc.; and assisting in administrative duties in the Athletic Dept.

DENNEY RECEIVES STATE STIPEND - Diane M. Denney, assistant professor of education, is one of two recipients in Missouri to have been awarded a \$6,900 graduate stipend from the Missouri Planning Council (MPC) for Developmental Disabilities. Funding will be used for tuition and expenses at St. Louis University, where Denney is pursuing her doctoral studies.

Last year, the MPC offered stipends to graduate students interested in completing a project which would benefit the mentally-retarded and developmentally-disabled populations in the state. Denney plans to dovetail the project with her graduate thesis in special education. She will be working with the St. Louis Regional Center for the Developmentally Disabled, a tax-supported public agency of the Missouri Department of Mental Health.

SBA, COLLEGE JOIN FORCES - The U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) and Lindenwood have joined forces to formulate the Small Business Development Center as a means of providing consultation services to St. Charles area businesses in the area of accounting, management information systems, personnel and marketing. The program is under the direction of Arthur E. Prell, chairman of the Business Administration Dept., and Terrence G. Peterson, an adjunct faculty member. Part of a three-credit hour management workshop, the program is being administered through the SBA's Small Business Institute.

It involves about 20 students who, under the direction of Prell and Peterson, will serve as consultants to businesses in the area. The program offers a practical training ground for students, providing them with first-hand opportunities in working with area businesses. All information obtained in the management workshop is confidential.

Assisting the Small Business Development Center are Robert W. King, associate professor of business administration; Lynn Moore, assistant professor and director of Fashion Marketing; and William D. Wood, president of Retail Marketing Concepts, Inc., of St. Louis.
