

SEARCH BEGINS FOR FACULTY MEMBER - Area alumni along with faculty, staff and students are being asked to nominate professors who will be considered for the annual Lindenwood Faculty Lectureship. Reestablishing a popular faculty event that was discontinued in the 1970s, the college wants to honor a full-time faculty member as part of its observance of the "Year of the Professor."

The lectureship will enable a faculty member to present a talk of his or her choice to the college community. The person chosen to present the lecture "will exemplify the high qualities of the teaching profession that the college continues to foster," said Raymond W. Harmon of the board of overseers, and Arlene Taich, dean of the Evening College/LCIE. Both are cochairing a 12-member steering committee that is planning the "Year of the Professor," including the lectureship.

The faculty member chosen for the prestigious honor will be selected by the steering committee and announced at the May 17 commencement. The person also will receive a \$1,000 cash stipend and will be honored at a college reception following the lectureship, which tentatively is scheduled April 12, 1987. Written nominations must be received by April 30. They can be sent to Amy McCracken, secretary of the "Year of the Professor" Committee, Box 363, Lindenwood College. Nominations must be of full-time faculty members.

KCLC MARKETING DIRECTOR NAMED - J. Denise Jones, a 1982 alumna, has joined the college as Marketing Director of KCLC Radio, a newly-created position in which she will be responsible for marketing, including solicitation of underwriting from area businesses.

She recently returned to the area from Fort Wayne, IN, where, for the past two years, she was merchandising coordinator for Northill Development Corp., a national developer/manager of apartment communities. Jones also has worked for Dome Productions, Inc., of St. Louis as director of promotions for such special events as "Sesame Street Live!," "Motorcycles on Ice" and "Roller Derby." Holding an undergraduate degree in business administration, she plans to pursue her MBA at Lindenwood.

SAXOPHONE CONCERT APRIL 4 - The River City Saxes, one of the area's premiere saxophone groups under the direction of Robert Coleman, will perform in concert April 4 at 8 p.m. in Sibley Hall Chapel. Tickets are free to Lindenwood students; for others, admission is \$3 for adults and \$1 for senior citizens, children 12 years and younger and students with non-Lindenwood IDs. The group's repetoire includes music written for the famous Paris Saxophone Quartet to sax quartet settings of familiar jazz songs, including contemporary ones with rhythm sections. Professional experiences of individual members of the River City Saxes includes radio, television, recording, the Fox Theatre and the St. Louis Symphony and Municipal Opera orchestras.

LAST MAINSTAGE PRODUCTION - One of the greatest comedies of the English language, Oscar Wilde's "The Importance of Being Earnest," will close the college's Mainstage season this semester with performances April 2-5 and 10-12 at 8 p.m. in Jelkyl Theatre. <u>COLLEGE DONATES SCHOLARSHIP</u> - As a means of showing its support for public television, Lindenwood has donated a \$1,500 scholarship and two partial tuition waivers, valued at \$1,000 and \$500, to KETC-TV for use in the station's auction, April 17-20. To be auctioned to the highest bidders during the fund-raising event for Channel 9, the \$1,500 scholarship and \$1,000 tuition waivers can be used for undergraduate or graduate studies at the main campus or at off-campus locations. The \$500 tuition waiver is for either undergraduate or graduate studies in the college's new Saturday Campus, which offers instruction for those who are unable to attend day or evening programs because of employment or families. The waiver can be used for the Saturday Campus, which begins this fall, or it can be used for 1987 terms beginning next January or May. For its contributions, Lindenwood receives on-air promotions during the four-day event, which are viewed by audiences of several hundred thousand during prime time. Lindenwood's gifts were arranged by the Public Relations Office in cooperation with the college's Scholarship Committee, chaired by Financial Aid Director Larry Sackman. This is the third year Lindenwood has aided Channel 9. In 1984, the college became the first educational institution in the area to show its support through the donation of two scholarships valued at \$2,000, said Randy L. Wallick of the Public Relations Office. Auction hours are 7 p.m. to midnight April 17-19 and from noon to midnight April 20.

UPS delivers all packages to the Post Office. These packages are to be picked up by departments. The person responsible for picking up these packages must sign a sheet kept in the Post Office by Von Goodson. This sheet is a copy of the delivery record identified by numbers furnished by UPS.

All other packages (excluding UPS) are delivered to the Stables, where the Maintenance Staff is responsible for delivery to departments. Tom Hedgecock keeps a record of all packages delivered, stating the name of the firm and date received. The person responsible for delivering these packages also must receive a signature from the department when the package is delivered. These sheets are returned to Hedgecock after deliveries have been made; copies of which can be obtained by departments.

Each department must check their packing slips with the merchandise to make sure it has received all of its order. All packing slips must be sent to Carol Whitman in the Purchasing Dept. so they can be matched with the purchase order and invoice. This is the only way that Accounts Payable can know if merchandise has been received prior to paying the invoice.

All purchase orders will contain delivery and billing instructions which will be provided by the Purchasing Dept.
