SATURDAY CAMPUS TO BEGIN IN FALL - As a means of serving persons for whom day and evening classes are inappropriate or inconvenient, Lindenwood is inaugurating its Saturday Campus this fall. Designed to meet a wide range of educational interests, the Saturday Campus is geared for those who want to begin or complete a college degree, those who want to prepare for career advancement or occupational change, persons who want to enrich their lives or those who want to become better informed about significant developments in the metro area.

Classes will be offered Saturday mornings and afternoons for 13-week sessions beginning in September as well as in January and May each academic year, said James W. Swift, director of the college's Office of Research and Planning who aided in the formation of the Saturday Campus. Following lengthy research, the program was created to offer a quality and excellence not found in similar ones in the metro area. The Saturday Campus is composed of specific programs in liberal arts, administration, communications, human resource management, educational enrichment and community development education designed to satisfy a wide range of needs and interests, Swift said.

In addition to course instruction at both the undergraduate and graduate levels, a variety of services will be available to students in the Saturday Campus, including child care, career planning and placement, tutorial and skill building workshops, library facilities, cafeteria and Bookstore services. At its April 3 meeting, the Faculty of Lindenwood College voted to permit Summer 1986 graduates to participate in the May 17 Commencement exercises if:

- the student is within six semester hours of completing all degree requirements by May 17
- all requirements will be completed by Aug. 31, 1986
- the student's G.P.A. is at or above the minimum required for graduation from his/her degree program

Students who meet these criteria and who wish to participate in this year's Commencement must take the following steps:

- submit the official graduation form to the Registrar by April 15, 1986
- also submit to the Registrar by April 15 a statement which indicates how the remaining work will be completed
- order Commencement regalia at the College Bookstore no later than April 17 (Graduate students who have not completed their coursework by May 10 will not be hooded at this ceremony)
