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COLLEGE TO CITE TWO - Robin Smith, veteran news reporter and anchorwoman for KMOX-TV, and Charles W. Boswell, district manager of Union Electric in St. Charles, are recipients of the 1986 Alumni Merit Awards. Smith is a 1975 alumna with an undergraduate degree in communications and psychology who is being cited for outstanding contributions to the broadcasting profession. Boswell, a 1948 graduate of St. Louis University who received an M.B.A. from Lindenwood in 1978, is a member of the college's board of overseers. He is being honored for his outstanding service and leadership to the college. Both will receive the awards from Alumni Council President Janet Lewis Riddle during special ceremonies at commencement, May 17 at 10 a.m. on campus.

PHONE-A-THON RAISES \$135,000 - Almost 200 volunteers have spent more than 50 nights calling alumni throughout the country in the first phase of the Alumni Phone-a-Thon, which has raised \$135,000 in specific pledges thus far. Top callers during the first phase are Maurita Estes Stueck, a 1943 alumna; Darlene Jemison, assistant manager of the Bookstore; and Georgia Rehme, a freshman majoring in fashion marketing. The 1986 Alumni Phone-a-Thon, which includes the second phase April 23 through May 28, has a goal of \$200,000. With more than 45 percent alumni donating to the college, volunteers have contacted 6,000 alumni thus far.

FINAL DOWNSTAGE STUDIO PLAY - The Marsha Norman drama, "Night, Mother," closes the Downstage Studio Theatre season with performances Thursday, Friday and Saturday at 8 p.m. in the FAB. Directed by first-year graduate student Patrick O'Driscoll, the two-person play features St. Charles freshman Jodi Lombardo and Chesterfield senior Lisa Albert. The play deals with a young woman's desire to commit suicide, a plan she shares with her mother. Admission to the 90-minute drama is \$1.

FACULTY MEMBERS FEATURED - Faculty members John Wehmer and Michael Castro were featured in the recent Heart of St. Louis Arts Festival at Harris-Stowe College. The mutli-cultural event, cosponsored by Harris-Stowe and the River Styx arts organization, was directed by Jan Garden Castro of the adjunct faculty. It featured a week-long schedule of lectures, poetry readings, music, dance and exhibits from some of the area's most prominent artists. Wehmer, professor of art, demonstrated his stained glass techniques and exhibited some of his works in this and other media. Castro, professor of communications in the LCIE, performed his poems written for music with his group Pleiades, an all-star collection of St. Louis jazz musicians.


