MOTLEY SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENTS - Karen L. Ulrich of Maryland Heights, a senior at Pattonville High School, and Kristen S. Wixson of Lee's Summit, MO, a senior at Blue Springs Senior High School in Blue Springs, MO, are recipients of the college's first Guy C. Motley Scholarships. The two awards, which are valued at more than \$61,000 during the next four years, are for tuition and room and board, beginning this fall.

Selected from among nearly 100 nominees throughout the country, Ulrich and Wixson represent some of the country's outstanding high school students. Ulrich, who plans to major in pre-veterinary studies at Lindenwood this fall, maintains a 3.84 GPA. She is a member of her school's Pep Club, Homecoming Float Committee and National Honor Society (NHS), and serves as a volunteer at the local Humane Society. Wixson, who has maintained a perfect 4.00 GPA in high school, plans on majoring in biomedical engineering at Lindenwood. Active in varsity soccer and basketball, she is vice-president of the NHS, a volunteer in the Special Olympics and received outstanding recognition in scholarship competition at the University of Missouri-Rolla, where she has taken a college credit course.

Named for a former admissions director and administrator at Lindenwood, the Motley scholarships are the most lucrative ever offered by the college. They will be offered each fall to outstanding students who have excelled academically and been active in extra-curricular activities in the school, church and/or community.

CLARK RECEIVES TOP NATIONAL AWARD - Dianna L. Clark, operations coordinator for KCLC Radio, has been named "Outstanding Member of the Year" by Alpha Epsilon Rho (AERho), the National Broadcasting Society. Chosen by the five-member AERho Executive Council from among 3,400 students and professionals throughout the country, Clark received the society's highest individual award during its recent national convention in Dallas, TX. Clark, who serves as advisor for the college's AERho chapter, was cited for making "the most significant contribution to the betterment of the society's principles and ideals." At the Dallas convention, Lindenwood's chapter received the AERho's "Regional Spirit Award" for having the most representation. The four-day meeting was attended by Clark along with Jim Wilson and Amy Hamill of the communications faculty and seven students. Founded in 1943, AERho is the national group designed to bridge the gap between the academic and professional worlds of broadcasting.

FACULTY MEMBER'S ARTICLE FEATURED - "Research Product Patterns" is the title of an article by Nancy Polette, assistant professor of education, which appears in the current issue of MEDIA ACTIVITIES MONTHLY, a national magazine serving personnel of school libraries.

The article deals with research assignments for curriculum study projects in elementary schools. A member of the faculty since 1970, Polette is a nationally-recognized author of more than a dozen books and numerous articles on children's literature and gifted education. Published by LMS Associates of Baltimore, the magazine has a circulation of 70,000.

CHANNEL 9 SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENTS - Two current students and another who plans to attend the new Saturday Campus this fall are the recipients of \$3,000 in scholarships donated by Lindenwood to KETC-TV for use in its recent community auction. Successful bidders are Sherri Grothaus, a freshman from Silex, MO, who won a \$1,500 scholarship; Kathleen Emery of St. Charles, an undergraduate at the West Port Center, who received a \$1,000 scholarship; and Carolyn Golden of Hazelwood, the recipient of a \$500 scholarship for the Saturday Campus.

This is the third year Lindenwood has shown its support for public television with participation in Channel 9's fund-raising event. In return for its contributions, the college receives on-air promotional messages during the auction which are seen by several hundred thousand viewers. This year's awards, which provided KETC with nearly \$1,900 in cash for operations and programming, were arranged by the Public Relations Office in cooperation with the Scholarship Committee, chaired by Larry Sackman, financial aid director.

THINGS WENT BETTER WITH COKE - At the suggestion of junior Kelly Wright, the Public Relations Office arranged for promotional items to be donated by the Coca-Cola Bottling Co. of St. Louis for last weekend's Spring Fling.
