WISCONSIN DEAN NAMED TO V-P POST - Daniel N. Keck, dean of Carthage College in Kenosha, WI, has been elected Vice-President of Academic Affairs and Dean of Faculty. Elected by the Executive Committee of the college's board of directors upon the recommendation of President Spainhower, Keck will assume the position, the second-ranking administrative one, on July 15. He will be in charge of all faculty and academic programs at both the undergraduate and graduate levels in addition to the Admissions Dept., Office of College Life, Registrar's Office and Butler Memorial Library.

One of nearly 90 candidates considered, Keck was recommended to the Executive Committee following extensive interviews among faculty, staff and students as well as Spainhower. "During those interviews," Keck said, "I was impressed at what seems to be a wide-spread desire for Lindenwood to be a quality institution. This seems to be an exciting time in the institution's history, and I would like to be a part of it."

A 1960 graduate of Miami University in Oxford, OH, Keck holds graduate and doctoral degrees in political science, both awarded from the University of Connecticut. In 1978 he received a certificate from the Institute for Educational Management at Harvard University.

Keck, who also serves as professor of political science at Carthage, has served as dean of the college since 1977. Previously, he was acting Vice-President for Academic Affairs and Dean of the College at Baldwin-Wallace College in Berea, OH. Married, Keck and his wife, Marilyn, have three daughters.

He replaces James F. Hood who has been serving as acting Dean of Faculty following the resignation of Aaron Miller in 1985. Hood, one of the top four candidates considered for the vice-president's post, will return to his position as professor of history.

TWO FORMER PROFESSORS TO BE HONORED - Lindenwood will award two honorary degrees to Martha M. Boyer of Tucson, AZ, professor emeritus of communications arts, and Jessie S. Bernard of Washington, DC, a former professor at the college and internationally-recognized sociologist, at commencement Saturday.

Boyer, who served 26 years on the communications faculty until her retirement in 1972, is the founder of the college's on-campus radio station, KCLC-AM, and its community radio station, KCLC. She is credited with many innovations that have built the communications curriculum into a well-respected degree program.

Bernard, who served as professor of sociology from 1940-47, has been an educator for more than two decades. She has been on the editorial boards of four major sociology journals and is the author of more than 20 books in the fields of marriage, family behavior, women's roles and American community behavior.

Boyer is being cited for her numerous contributions to the broadcasting profession while Bernard is being honored for the merit she has received in the sociology field.

JAZZ COURSE FOR INSTRUMENTALISTS - CASA Lindenwood will present a summer jazz improvisation course for instrumentalists June 23 through August 2 on campus. The class will meet for two hours each week for the six-week session, and it is open to all band instrumentalists as well as guitarists and pianists. It will be taught by Michael Karpowicz, a jazz musician who is well-known for his performances with professional groups in the metro area. Summer registration for the six-week course begins the week of June 16 at CASA Lindenwood in the MAB. Tuition is \$48, with a \$5 registration fee for new students. FACULTY MEMBERS RECEIVE TENURE, PROMOTIONS - Gene M. Henderson, professor of education; Arlene Sakahara, assistant professor of English as a second language; and James A. Wilson, assistant professor of communications have received tenure by the administration based upon a recommendation from the Faculty Council.

Ann Canale of the English Dept.; Solon Chervitz, professional librarian; Rebecca Glenn of the LCIE faculty; Hans Levi of the Art Dept.; Judith McMahon of the Psychology Dept.; Ray Scupin of the Anthropology Dept; and Richard A. Wier of the Political Science Dept. have been promoted from assistant to associate professors. The promotions stem from recommendations by the Faculty Council which were approved by the administration.

WALLICK REVIEWS COLLEGE TEXT - Randy L. Wallick, public relations director, has been retained by the Wm. C. Brown Co., a Madison, WI-based publishing firm, to review the final manuscript of a textbook on publication design used by colleges and universities throughout the country. The text, PUBLICATION DESIGN, is written by Roy Paul Nelson of the University of Oregon faculty. It is being revised and updated for reprinting by the Brown Co. this summer.

Wallick, who also serves on the adjunct communications faculty, was retained last fall to review the text currently in use at colleges and universities. "Nelson has revised the current edition in light of the comments Wallick and other reviewers made," publishers said. PUBLICATION DESIGN is the required text for Lindenwood's course, "Production and Layout," which Wallick teaches. Considered one of the best texts on the subject, it is used in similar courses at other

schools as well as courses dealing with graphic design, typography, magazine and newspaper editing, book publishing and business and industrial journalism.

SWIMMING POOL OPENS MAY 25 - Lindenwood's pool opens May 25 for college employees, their families and guests as well as students, alumni and conference attendees. The pool is not open to the general public. Fees for useage are \$1 per person per visit for employees, families, guests and alumni, and 50 cents for children 12 years of age and younger.
