

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Dr. Franc L. McCluer to be Inaugarated On Founders' Day, October 23

Representatives of Leading Colleges and Universities of Nation Will Participate in Impressive Ceremonies on Campus As Lindenwood's Twelfth President Is Installed

D. R. Franc Lewis McClure will be inaugurated as Lindenwood College's new president and the twelfth administrator in the college's 121 years in an impressive ceremony on the campus on Founders' Day, October 23. Representatives of the nation's leading colleges and universities will march in the academic procession and with the alumnae of the college will participate in the inaugural ceremonies.

Invitations have been sent to colleges and universities in all parts of the nation and acceptance have been received from more than 100 institutions, which will be represented. A special invitation is also extended to all alumnae of the college to return to the campus for the occasion.

The day's program will begin with the academic procession under the linden trees and into Roemer Auditorium at 10 a.m. The invocation for the inaugural program will be given by the Rev. Dr. Harry T. Scherer, pastor of the Webster Groves Presbyterian Church and a member of the college's Board of Directors. Special music will be provided by the Lindenwood Choir.

The Rev. Dr. James W. Clarke, pastor of the Second Presbyterian Church and president of the college's Board of Directors, will welcome the delegates and introduce Dr. Guy Snavely, executive secretary of the Association of American Colleges, who will give the inaugural address.

Dr. Clarke will preside at the investiture of Dr. McCluer as president, and the Rev. Dr. B. Frank Hall will give the dedicatory prayer. The charge to the college's new president will be given by Dr. Nelson Vance Russell, President of Carroll College, Waukesha, Wisconsin.

Dr. McCluer will respond to the charge and following his address greetings will be extended by the faculty and student body. The benediction will be given by the Rev. Dr. Jonathan C. Hollyman.

A luncheon will be held at noon in Ayres Hall. Dr. Clarke will preside and the invocation will be given by the Rev. Dr. Elmer B. Whitcomb. At the luncheon greetings will be extended to the new president by representatives of many of the organizations which will participate in the inaugural ceremonies.

The Lindenwood Alumnae Association will hold a meeting on the campus at 2 p.m. Mrs. H. K. Stum-

At 3 p.m. there will be a reception for the alumnae and guests in honor of Dr. and Mrs. McCluer in the Fine Arts Building.

Guy C. Motley, secretary of the college and assistant to the president is general chairman of the committees in charge of the inaugural program. With Dr. Clarke as co-chairman, he will head the committee in charge of the luncheon. Dr. Alice E. Gipson, academic dean, is chairman of the committee in charge of the reception and Mrs. Stumberg is chairman of the committee arranging for the alumnae meeting.

Dr. McCluer, who is one of the nation's outstanding educators, was elected president of the college last spring to succeed Dr. Harry Morehouse Gage, who retired in June, 1946. For the last fourteen years, Dr. McCluer has been president of Westminster College at Fulton, Mo.

Dr. McCluer was graduated from Westminster in 1916 and received his Master of Arts degree in 1920, (Continued on Page 6)

News From and About Members of The Class of 1932

FIFTEEN years after graduation from Lindenwood, the members of the Class of 1932 report busy and interesting lives. This month we present the first installment of the roll call of the class:

Gladys Crutchfield (Mrs. Joseph Clark Ferguson), Mill Pond House, Zwolle, La.: "To hear from Lindenwood and the Class of '32 at the same time will be of more therapeutic value than a vitamin tablet. It was my privilege from '32 to '34 to be associated with the college as secretary of the Academic Dean, Dr. Alice E. Gipson. How I loved her-and still do! In the fall of '34, I married and lived in St. Louis until '39 when we crossed the Mason-Dixon Line to come south. We have two children, Joseph Jr., 12-known as Jody, and Elizabeth Lee, 8-known as Betsey. My husband is president and general manager of the Sabine Lumber Company, manufacturers of Yellow Pine. We live in Zwolle, La., a typical southern saw-mill town. Our part of Louisiana is not the Ante-bellum South you read about. This is the pine belt, devoted strictly to the major timber industries. A large proportion of the population is Spanish speaking and directly descended from the younger sons of such families in Spain as the Sepuloados, Y'barbos, and Nigervilles. From my sun porch I can look across the water of the Mill Pond to the big log deck where the pines are dumped from the trucks and floated to the rafts. On the north side the piney woods raises its branches to the sky. Directly across the pond, tucked in among little roads and chinaberry trees is the colored quarters, and dotted all around the water I can see innumerable cane poles flashing in the air as the negro children fish. This lovely, lazy picture means a lot to me for I have been crippled with arthritis since 1943, and it is one of my greatest pleasures to sit here and watch this unending drama unfold its quiet story day after day."

Charlotte Ann Abildgaard (Mrs. Eli H. Worden), 1320 Hackney St., Winfield, Kan.: "After graduating from Lindenwood, I worked for my father until I was married in 1934. My husband and I came to Winfield in 1938 and started an appliance business of our own. Mr. Worden served in the Army Air Forces for three years during the war. I spent part of the time in San Antonio with him, and the rest in managing our business. Since the war I have been a housewife and now a mother. We have an adopted daughter, Mary Anne, now 3 months old. We hope she will want to attend Lindenwood."

Mary Winifred Bainbridge (Mrs. Robert Lee Hudgens), 409 Calument St., Marion, Ill.: "I started teaching art in our public schools the year after my graduation from Lindenwood and continued doing so until 1938 when I married Dr. R. L. Hudgens. Dr. Roemer, who was a fraternity brother of my husband and President of Lindenwood at the time, married us in the college club rooms. I will never forget how lovely the campus was at the time. After that the years were taken up with building a new home and teaching part-time in a rural school. Soon the war came, and I became an "Army-wife" and a camp follower. We were fortunate, though, in that Major Hudgens was not sent overseas. While in Rapid City, So. Dak. our first baby, Sherry Ann, was born. A year and a half later, our second daughter, Pamela Pane, was born. I hope both will want to go to Lindenwood and will be as happy there as I was."

Tearle Seiling (Mrs. Burt Gove), Route 4, Jefferson City, Mo.: "After I graduated from Lindenwood, I became vocal music supervisor in the public schools of St. Charles. While teaching, I spent several summers in California and studied at U.C.L.A. one summer and at Northwestern one year. Both times I was fortunate enough to meet former classmates. I held this position in St. Charles, which was also my hometown, for ten years. During this time I worked with a great many Lindenwood "practice teachers." In June, 1942, Mr. Gove and I were married, and I settled down to being a house-wife for a few years, but returned to the schools during the war to teach in the kindergarten, a very fascinating work. We have been living just five miles from Jefferson City for the last two years, and I expect to teach in one of the kindergartens this winter. It looks as if I have a hard time keeping away from the schools, but I am especially happy with young children."

Gretchen Milde (Mrs. Henry A. Loos), 121 East First North St., Jackson, Mo.: "Upon leaving Lindenwood I taught for two years in the grade school in Jackson. I had always secretly regarded the teaching profession as quite dull and was overwhelmed to find it was quite strenuous and eventful. Owing to the depression, every teacher was allotted as many youngsters as she could say grace over, and I found my classroom bursting at the seams and anything but dull. I was married in 1934. When the war came along my

New Member of Sociology Department Is Refugee from Germany

Lieut. Karen Rugaard, Now Mrs. F. W. Lurting, Rejoins Faculty in Home Economics Department — Other New Faculty Members

M iss Ilse Nelson, who joins the faculty of Lindenwood's Sociology Department this fall, comes to the campus with a broad background of study in both Europe and the United States. Born in Germany, she has spent many years in Switzerland, France and other European countries. She fled to England at the outbreak of the war and spent several months there before coming to the United States.

She comes to Lindenwood from the University of Chicago, where she has completed all the requirements for her doctor's degree except her dissertation, which she expects to complete by the end of this academic year. At the University of Chicago she was a research assistant in the Department of Political Science and also worked as an editorial assistant on the American Journal of Sociology. She has held several fellowships and is now an Edward Hillman Fellow in the Department of Political Science. She holds an M.A. degree from Butler University and has also studied at Anderson College in Indiana and at Cambridge University in England.

Lieut. Karen Rugaard, who resigned from the faculty during the war to accept a commission as a Lieutenant in the Army Nursing Corps, has returned to the campus this fall as a faculty member in the Home Economics Department. Her terminal leave from the Army expires on October 24.

Lieut. Rugaard served as a dietitian at the O'Reilly General Hospital at Springfield, Mo., and at Army hospitals in New Jersey and Denver before being assigned overseas duty in Japan as a member of the 364th General Hospital Unit. In Japan she was stationed near Hiroshima, where the first atomic bomb in history was dropped in August, 1945.

While in Japan she attended the Japanese war trials and had time for several sightseeing trips through the islands. On October 6, 1946, she was married in Hiroshima to Capt. F. W. Lurting, a surgeon of the Army Medical Corps. Capt. Lurting is still in Japan, but is expected to return to this country next spring. They have a son, Frêderick, born last summer.

Lieut. Rugaard received her A.B. degree from Coe College and has done graduate work at Iowa State College.

Another new member of the faculty this year is Hugo J. Bauer, who has been appointed assistant professor of German. Prof. Bauer holds A.B. and M.A. degrees from Northwestern University and has recently returned from military service. He has charge of the courses in German and some of the courses in Spanish. With Mrs. Bauer and their two young daughters, he

two years after he had joined the faculty of the college. He taught sociology and economics at the University of Chicago in 1923 and 1924. In 1925 and 1926 he was visiting professor of sociology at the Southeast Missouri State Teachers College and he has also been on the faculty at the University of Missouri.

At Westminster he founded the Westminster Institute of Public Affairs, which attracted international attention by bringing former Prime Minister Winston Churchill and President Truman to Fulton where Mr. Churchill delivered the now famous "Fulton Address." An autographed photograph in color of Mr. Churchill now hangs in Dr. McCluer's office.

Dr. McCluer is a member of the Board of Directors of the Association of American Colleges, a member of the Board of the Louisville, Ky., Presbyterian Seminary and president of the Board of Curators of Lincoln University. He has served as Moderator of the Presbyterian Church, a position seldom accorded to a layman.

He was a member of the Constitutional Convention which drafted Missouri's new Constitution and was director of the committee which campaigned for its ratification. Dr. and Mrs. McCluer moved to the president's home on the campus in August.

Thirty-four States Represented on the Campus This Fall

Thirty-four states, Hawaii and Mexico are represented in Lindenwood's capacity enrollment this fall. There are six students from Hawaii, the largest student group ever to attend the college from the territory which may be the forty-ninth state. Mexico is represented by two students.

Missouri leads the list of states with 148 students, Illinois is second with 74 and Iowa third with 48. Other states well up on the list include Kansas, 20; Texas, 26; Arkansas, 22; Tennessee, 19; Kentucky, 17, and Oklahoma, 15. From the Far West there are four students from California, two from Idaho and one from Montana. Eastern students include five from New York state, three from West Virginia, one from Washington, D. C., four from Virginia, and two from New Jersey.
