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Lindenwood Now Has Two Modern Broadcasting Studios

*New Equipment for Speech Department Installed in Fine Arts Building
—Will Be Ready for Use By All Departments This Fall*

LINDENWOOD College now boasts of two modern, completely equipped radio studios.

The new equipment, installed during recent months in the Fine Arts Building under the direction of Charles R. Orr of the speech department, includes a control room, two studios, both acoustically treated, a Western Electric control panel of the latest design, two cutting machines for recordings and two play back turntables.

Everything is available to Lindenwood students in these new studios except the facilities for actual broadcasting. The microphones and other equipment are all of the same high standard used by broadcasting stations.

The studios are intended primarily for the speech department to enable students to work under conditions comparable with actual broadcasting. Recordings are made of their programs for study to correct their mistakes.

For several years the speech department has sponsored a regular program over Radio Station KFUE in St. Louis. The radio production class, with the assistance of the voice and diction classes, presents the "Children's Theater of the Air" on Saturday mornings during the college year.

The radio equipment is also used by other departments of the college. Last semester recordings were made of selections by the college band and choir and of both instrumental and vocal solos. These recordings enable the student artists to hear their presentations and are used by the music department to point out errors.

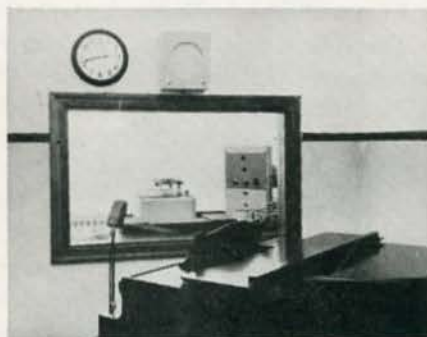
The French Club also used the recording equipment as a club project in the study of French.

Because of delays in securing some of the equipment the full facilities of the two studios were not available last year, but they will be ready for extensive use this fall.

PAINTERS and decorators are busy this month preparing Lindenwood's campus for the opening of the 120th collegiate year. The fall term will open with a meeting of the faculty on September 9. Registration and student conferences with counselors will begin on September 12.

The college will have a capacity enrollment again this year. With many more applications for admittance than could be granted, the college closed its enrollment early. Every effort has been made to admit the daughters of Lindenwood alumnae.

Guy C. Motley, secretary of the college and assistant to the president, has announced that applications are now being received for the 1947-48 year.

No major improvements are being attempted on the campus this summer, but the buildings are being repainted and redecorated and new equipment is being added.

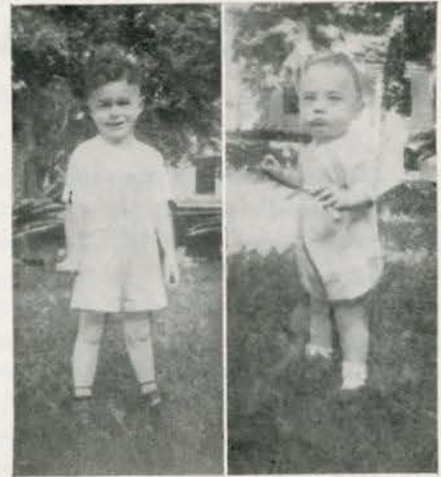
