CONGRESSIONAL CANDIDATE TO SPEAK . . .

A visit by Jack Buechner, Republican candidate for the 2nd District in the U.S. House of Representatives, is the first presentation of the Lectures & Concerts Committee for the 1986-87 year. Buechner, a former state representative from the 94th District, is scheduled to speak September 17 at 2 p.m. at the Gazebo (or Young Auditorium in case of inclement weather).

A senior partner in a Manchester law firm, Buechner served 10 years in the Missouri General Assembly where he held the position of Minority Floor Leader and served on the Appropriations, Rules and Judiciary committees, among others. He sponsored legislation providing tougher penalties for sex offenders and a new criminal code, as well as the Rape Victim's Privacy Act and the Lobbyist Regulation Law. He is a former assistant prosecuting attorney in Franklin County, MO, and Chief Condemnation Officer for the St. Louis County Counselor's Office.

'ALL-COLLEGE READING LIST' ANNOUNCED . . .

This year's "All-College Reading List" contains four books suggested for reading and discussion. The list includes Tillie Olsen's 1983 book, SILENCES, which draws on the lives, diaries and testimonies of several writers and on the author's experiences in examining the experience of creation; Howard Nemerov's INSIDE THE ONION, a 1984 collection of poetry by the well-known St. Louis poet; Michael Gold's A CONSPIRACY OF CELLS: ONE WOMAN'S IMMORTAL LEGACY AND THE MEDICAL SCANDAL IT CAUSED, a 1985 book about how a few cells taken from a fatal tumor continued to live; and HABITS OF THE HEART: INDIVIDUALISM AND COMMITMENT IN AMERICAN LIFE, a 1985 book by five authors that analyzes the consequences of America's fusion of capitalism and protestantism.
