Assessment Tip of the Week

Closing the Loop: An Example from the Belleville Campus (March 29, 2019)

A variety of methods can be used to collect assessment data, including surveys, exit interviews, standardized exams, individual coursework, and portfolios. Each method has its own advantages and disadvantages that must be weighed by programs when deciding how to collect program assessment data. Portfolios, for example, can be used to view learning and development over time as students progress through a program, and reduce test anxiety and time pressure factors that can affect a student's performance on a one-shot assessment method (Rogers, 2019 – Emerging Leaders in Assessment Resources, HLC Workshop).

In Belleville, students with an interest in graphic design often find a home in the Interactive Media and Web Design program. One of the assessment methods that has been used by the program is student portfolios. The data from the portfolios over several years indicated to the program that the broad nature of the program was not adequately preparing students with particular interests in visual design to work in the design field professionally. As a result, the program faculty, led by Prof. Derek Dadian-Smith, went through a lengthy process of evaluating and re-designing the Interactive Media major. The new major now offers students the choice of several emphasis areas, such as user interface design, web development, and game design. Redundancies in the curriculum were eliminated, and the core requirements and prerequisites were revised so that more focus is put on design principles. Program faculty hope that emphasis areas will give students the ability to delve deeper into their particular areas of interest, improving their preparation for success after they graduate. The program will continue to assess student portfolios to be sure that the new major is producing the desired


results and to identify places in the major and courses that can be further improved.





Wesley Bell Speaking April 10



Wesley is an advocate for ending mass incarceration, eliminating 'debtors' prison' practices, and rebuilding trust between communities and the prosecutor's office. He is the first African American to serve in this position and hopes to achieve his goal of ensuring equal justice to all residents of St. Louis County.



Wesley Bell, prosecuting attorney for St. Louis County, will speak at Lindenwood University on April 10 from 6 to 7 p.m. in Harmon Hall's Dunseth Auditorium. Bell is an advocate for ending mass incarceration, eliminating "debtors' prison" practices, and rebuilding trust between communities and the prosecutor's office. The topic of his speech is "Achieving economic vibrancy through data driven public safety policy." Wesley Bell is also an alumnus of Lindenwood University.
